took advantage of the thrift plan to accumulate a stock interest. An employee was permitted to buy at a rate not exceeding 20 per cent of his or her salary. Many devoted 20 per cent of their salary to this purpose and those in Portland who did this were rejoicing yesterday over their good fortune, forgetting the skimming they had done. The average salary deduction placed in the pool was given at 17.54 per cent.

Where the employee's share of the thrift fund amounted to an old amount over the price of a given number of shares he received the difference in cash. A major portion of them received checks as well as stock certificates.

"Our only concern," said Mr. Muncy, "is that the employee hold this stock and do not part with it in exchange for securities of less dependable value. Most of them are convinced they have a fine investment and I believe they will keep their shares."
