

MOTOR ASSOCIATION WILL DEMAND PAY OF OUTSIDERS

Motor touring has assumed such tremendous dimensions and the demand on motor clubs for information has become so heavy that it would work great hardship on members who have dues to continue free service to all and sundry, according to an announcement made today by Geo. O. Brandenburg, Secretary of the Oregon State Motor Association.

Mr. Brandenburg called attention to the resolution recently adopted by the Executive Committee of the American Automobile Association of which the local club is one of the affiliated units and in which the Committee unanimously went on record against A. A. clubs giving free service to non-members and non-affiliated bodies. The text of the resolution follows:

"Resolved, that free service by the American Automobile Association and affiliated clubs and associations shall not be rendered to motoring organizations and members thereof that are not affiliated with the American Automobile Association; and the Committee further recommends that a minimum charge of \$1.00 be made for service rendered non-members."

In connection with this resolution, the Secretary of the local club declared that the policy hereinafter enunciated received the support of the recent conference of A. A. secretaries held in Washington and at which the 592 clubs affiliated with the national motoring body were directly or indirectly represented.

"It stands to reason," he said, "that the motor club must first and foremost think of its members who pay the dues that make the service possible. The services rendered by A. A. clubs, which now constitute 96 per cent of all the actively-functioning motor clubs in America, has now been placed on a highly standardized, nation-wide basis. It costs a great deal of money to do so and to feed it out indiscriminately to the information moocher and to the man who does not think enough of his local club to join

it and give it his support would be to dissipate the dues of the club. As it is, our policy is to give the members more than a dollar's worth of service for every dollar in dues.

"Of course, as heretofore, the club will continue to give service to all applicants. To the stranger within our gates our policy will be one of liberal aid. But when he seeks maps, routings and tour books to carry him to his destination a modest charge will be applied. This would not necessarily apply to the man who merely seeks information about our own town. As a civic agency, we feel that this courtesy can always be extended. What we are getting at is the professional information smoother. To him we say 'service costs us money; it's your job for the asking but you must pay for it.'"

TEUTON INFLUENCE DOMINATES MOVIES

HOLLYWOOD, (UP)—Germany an genius industry is invading Hollywood with steadily increasing force, and today the Teutonic influence all-but dominates picture-making in some of the city's studios.

With the shammoth UFA, in its great film studio, as an example, American companies are drawing upon Germany for stars, directors, technical men and writers.

The effect is already noted in several studios, where the types of stories and the technique employed in the pictureizations are fast becoming Germanized, with German actors and technicians making the films.

Emil Jannings, Ernest Lubitch, Hans Kraly, Pola Negri, Ley de Putti, F. W. Murnau, and many others, all graduates of the German School, are playing foremost positions in American motion picture production. Other German picture personages are arriving each week.

Famous Players-Lasky has just brought to Hollywood the former-producing chief for UFA, Eric Pommer. He will be a producer for the Paramount firm, making three super-specials as a starter, featuring Miss Negri and Jannings, who was formerly a great dramatic star in Germany.
