SAN FRANCISCO HAS VETERAN CATCHERS

SAN FRANCISCO, (UP)—San Francisco clubs of the Pacific Coast Baseball league have two pioneer catchers who have served with the best of them, and who are both still "going good."

They are Walter Schmidt, backstop for the Missions, and San Agnew, slugging Seal receiver, both of whom made their professional debuts about the same time.

Agnew is one of the best-liked players on the seals' roster. At a time when many baseball stars are getting ready to retire he is doing some of the best work of his career.

The same thing applies to Schmidt, who made his entry into professional ball back in 1907, with Indianapolis. Since that time he has played in minor circuits in Nebraska, Virginia and other sections. He joined the Seals in 1911, and was rated one of the fastest catchers in the game at that time. He already had service stripes from two American league clubs, Cleveland and Philadelphia.

Boy Scouts Will Explore Mountain

SEATTLE, Wash., June 5.—(UP)—The wild regions of the Olympic peninsula in western Washington, of which comparatively little is known, will be explored this summer by an expedition of 10 picked Boy Scouts, organized by the Seattle Star.

The region to be explored lies south and west of Mount Olympus. The Scouts will be led by Field Executive Ronald R. Ryddiman, who will take the party down from the headwaters of the Queets river to Lake Quinault.

Results of the exploration will be furnished government departments for maps and records.

The Olympic peninsula, comparatively close to the heavily populated centers of Seattle and Tacoma, is isolated by many arms and channels of Puget Sound. Where the foothills merge into the rugged snow-capped mountains surrounding Mount Olympus, whose peak is 8,150 feet above sea level, almost all traces of civilization vanish. In the country are many wild animals.

Several Indian reservations are situated on the outskirts of this wild section of the peninsula.
