

SALEM, Ore.; June 1 .- Apend ing state funds to send inspect ors into road construction camps to check up violations of the humane laws when the state high-way commission apparently is a party to the offenses. Fas deplor ed by members of the Oregon state humans society who held a conference with Governor Pierce.

The meeting was called primar fly to take steps to the end that contractors engaged in state highway construction work may be forced to treat their horses and mules kindly or surrender their contracts.

It was pointed out by Color Hofer, president of the Orego numane society and other offi ials of the organization, that it aumerous grading camps horses have been abused to the exten that they have died without P celving proper medical attention few weeks ago an inspector was sent into a grading camp in Curry county in response to com plaints filed with the state humane society. Sixty-two horse were found to be suffering from sores and were suspended from reinstated without the knowledge of the humane society officials.

In another camp located in Linn county where 75 horses were employed representatives of the hu mane society found that 40 horses were suffering from sores and other allments.
