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PLANS PAGEANT AT OUR EVENT

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, June 10. (Special)

When the big transportation pageant "Klatawa," the central feature of Eugene's celebration in honor of the completion of the Eugene-Klamath Falls branch of the Southern Pacific, is presented on Hayward field, August 19 and 20, it will present numerous evidences of University of Oregon cooperation in the "Trial to Rail" festivities.

Hayward field itself is the scene of the University's athletic contests. In its grandstand and bleachers will sit the thousands who will view the pageant which will tell the story of the development of transportation in Oregon, through a series of dramatic episodes from the day of the Indian on the primitive trail to the day of the motor locomotive and the airplane. The field has a seating capacity of close to 20,000 but not more than about 12,000 seats will be available at a pageant whose action takes place for the most part at one end of the field.

The pageant itself has been written by W. F. G. Thacher, professor of English and journalism in the University. Doris Smith of Portland, author of the pageant "Rosaria" and herself a director of large pageants with years of experience in the middle west, on her visit to Eugene to start preliminary arrangements for the production, complimented Mr. Thacher on his grasp of the pageant problem and expressed her satisfaction with Hayward field as a place for the production.

University students living in and about Eugene are expected to figure prominently in the cast of the pageant, in which several hundred persons will take part. One of the students in the department of drama is to be cast for the title role of Klatawa.

Lecture Crop Is Now Being Shipped

SEATTLE - Puget Sound lettuce farms are beginning to turn out their huge annual crop for the season.

The first carloads of the crisp heads of lettuce have already been dispatched. Before the season is over it is estimated that approximately 1200 carloads will be shipped east from the Puget sound area.

The total number of heads of lettuce to be shipped will reach almost 150,000,000, valued at approximately \$1,500,000.

Puget Sound territory has become one of the largest lettuce producing districts in the country.

SOLDIERS ARE MADE INTO GOOD CITIZENS

ST. LOUIS, June 10. - (AP) - The United States army was described as an educational institution making soldiers into citizens, rather than a mere machine turning citizens into soldiers, by Secretary of War Dwight F. Davis at Washington University commencement exercises here recently.

"Over 40 per cent of our enlisted men spend at least part of their time in attending courses in our army schools or in performing duties which fit them directly for civil occupation after they leave the army," Davis said.

"I feel that to give some 45,000 citizens training in nearly 500 useful trades and professions is a real public service. Most of the men come into the army as raw recruits without much education and with little knowledge of any useful trade. Many of them leave it as trained specialists - disciplined, self-reliant, qualified for success in civil life."

General John J. Pershing, who began at West Point, and General James G. Harbord, who began as a private soldier, were cited as outstanding products of army education.

LIVERPOOL, England, June 10. - (AP) - George Gadd, of Rochampton, England, today won the Northern England Professional golf championship from a large field, which originally included nine American stars. Finals score today was seventy-seven, despite a dislocated bone in his foot.

TENNIS STARS WILL COMPLETE JUNE 12TH

SAN FRANCISCO, June 10. - (UP) - An imposing list of tennis stars from all parts of the Pacific coast will complete on the thirty-seventh annual Pacific coast tennis championship tournament at the Berkeley Tennis club courts June 13 to 20.
