## Referendum On Dance Ordinance To Be Held

### FOURTH CELEBRATION WITH DANCES WILL BE HELD IN LITHIA PARK

**ORDINANCE GIVING COUNCIL PRIVILEGE OF REFUSING DANCE LICENSES PASSED OVER VETO OF MAYOR JOHNSON, BUT WILL OF PEOPLE ON QUESTION TO BE ASKED ABOUT AUGUST 1ST IN ELECTION.**

The Daily Tidings was informed late this afternoon Councilman Taylor had notified the Lithians that he was making an effort to arrange so that the referendum on the dance ordinance would not have to be held until the November election, which would permit the conducting of public dances until that date, and thus eliminate the possibility of incurring the large expense of constructing the Lithian platform for only the short period between July 4th and July 30th, the date which had been set for the referendum election, for if the dance ordinance should be sustained in the referendum election on July 30th, the dances would have to be discontinued.

Councilman Taylor stated he hoped to persuade the other councilmen to agree to this, and a special meeting of the council was scheduled for late this afternoon when the question would be decided. Besides avoiding any possible bad feelings this summer, the plan of Councilman Taylor would cut out the expense of a special election, relieving the Lithians of this.

With Councilman Taylor, Burdick and Peters supporting this and Councilmen High, Wright and Wiley possibly opposing it, the result would be a tie, in which case Mayor Johnson would undoubtedly make the postponement until November a certainty.

Ashland will celebrate the Fourth of July, and public dancing will continue in Ashland, pending the verdict of a referendum on the question of whether or not public dances will be sanctioned, according to present indications.

This is the gist of the decisions which followed the action of the city council last night in adopting an ordinance, over the veto of Mayor O. H. Johnson, to license, subject to the approval of the city council, all public dances in Ashland.

An emergency clause, which had been attached to the ordinance, was eliminated, thus leaving the way open for a referendum on the ordinance. The Lithians, around whose dancing pavilion in Lithia Park the question centered pledged themselves to sponsor a referendum on the ordinance quickly as possible so as to ascertain the consensus of the voters of the city.

Steps have already been taken to initiate this referendum and petitions will be circulated immediately to procure the required number of signatures, 10 per cent of the legal voters, to bring the question to an election. It is understood that the referendum election will be held about August 1st., the earliest possible date.

The referendum holds the ordinance in status quo, or abeyance, until the people have passed upon it. The elimination of the emergency clause automatically puts the ordinance in status quo for 30 days and would have permitted the holding of dances here within this 30 days, but the referendum will be used instead.

The city already has an ordinance which licenses public dancing, but this has not been enforced. This ordinance permits the city recorder to issue the licenses, which made it a mere matter of paying the license, whereas the ordinance passed last night changed this, making the issuance of a public dance license SUBJECT TO THE APPROVAL OF THE COUNCIL.

As the councilmen who favored the new ordinance had stated emphatically their opposition to public dances, those opposing the new ordinance acted upon the proposition that the new law was worded so that the COUNCIL COULD REFUSE any further public dance licenses. Not as an objection to the license, but because of the subtle change in the wording of the method of issuing licenses was the reason the ordinance was opposed so strongly.

W. J. Looker, court reporter of Jacksonville, was present at the request of those opposing the ordinance so as to have an accurate report of statements made and action taken.

### PARKING PLAN ADOPTED WITH MINOR CHANGE

Parallel System to be Rule Here as Soon as it Can Be Started

MORE STOP SIGNS

Plaza Business Men File Protest And Make Oral Objections To Idea

Despite the filing of a petition of protest from every business firm about the Plaza and oral objections of business men, the city council last night adopted the parking recommendations of City Manager Malone and authorized the chief of police to arrange for the institution of these parking regulations at once.

The manager's recommendations said in part, "It will be noted that parallel parking is recommended throughout with the exception of the North side of Main street from Plummer's grocery to North Pioneer and South side of Main street from alley to alley below Tidings office to South Pioneer. Also on the west side of First street from Main street to the alley between Main and C street.

The parking limit to be one hour between the hours of 8 a. m. and 5 p. m. on Main street from 3rd street to the Plaza, the Plaza and out North Main street to Helman; also on First street from Main street to alley between Main and C streets. No restriction as to parking on other streets, except that all-night parking will not be permitted on any street as specified in Ordinance No. 811.

Two cards are also submitted, one covering signals and reprint of certain sections of city traffic ordinance; the other shows diagrammatically how to handle cars to park parallel, with reprint of certain traffic regulations. It will also be permissible to double park where parallel parking is used for short periods of

### SIDEWALKS FOR NORTH SIDE IN COUNCIL ORDER

9500 Feet of Gutters, Curbs, Sidewalks in a New Project

COST WILL BE \$18,000

Recommendations of Malone Are Adopted, Covering Area of Nine Streets Here

The city council last night adopted the recommendations of City Manager Malone covering sidewalk construction in the North end of the city and authorized the city clerk to give notice of intention to construct same.

The manager's recommendations were made under authority of the council of May 18th. The recommendations covered the following proposed construction at an estimated cost of \$18,000 for a total of 9500 feet of walk, curb and gutter.

Church street Certain curbs and gutters now in place to be lowered or replaced. All sidewalks not now in place to be built.

Bush street: Sidewalks, curbs and gutters on West Side from Bush to Manzanita.

Manzanita Street: Sidewalks, curbs and gutters on both sides from North Main street to upper Almond street.

Welmer Street: Sidewalks, curbs and gutters from North Main street to Scenic drive.

Nursery Street: Sidewalks, curbs and gutters from North Main street to Scenic drive.

Coolidge Street: Sidewalks, curbs and gutters on north side of street only, from North Main street to Scenic drive.

North Main Street: Sidewalk, curb and gutter on westerly side only, from Coolidge street to the northeasterly side line of Lot No. 12 in Mayer's addition, excepting a walk where same is not in place.

Factory street, sidewalks, curbs and gutters on Northerly side only, from North Main street to Laurel street.
