THE DANCE REFERENDUM
Last night the city council diverged from routine business long enough to stir up another turmoil within our city.

Further than this, The Daily Tidings states that the people of Ashland should take definite action at the earliest possible moment to get this question settled definitely and finally, and that then we should work forward, not backward, that we should construct, not try to tear down the few attractions and advantages which we have.

More will be said in connection with this question by The Daily Tidings wants to extend to the Lithians and the other progressive, clean, constructive organizations of Ashland, who conduct most of the dances in this city, its complete and unequivocal support in their effort to get this question, which creates a spirit of unrest and uncertainty in our city, settled once and for all time.

REFERENDUM ON DANCE ORDINANCE

the ordinance immediately into effect, without giving the voters the right to express their opinion.

Carl Nims, spokesman for the Lithians, told of the early history of the organization and of the financing of the construction of the dance pavilion in the park.

He told of his boy who wanted to dance and plead with the councilmen not to pass any law which would force his son to leave the clean, orderly, moral atmosphere of the Lithian dance pavilion for dances in other sections of which the councilmen had complained as being otherwise, and told of the predicament the Lithians and other organizations planning the Fourth of July celebration would be in if the dance was prohibited.

Councilman Taylor, in response to Nims' questioning, said he never attended a pavilion dance and agreed that it was proper to submit the question to a vote of the people, as he did not want to push anything through with an emergency clause, which would make it appear that the council was afraid.

Councilman Wiley candidly stated he favored the ordinance because he did not approve of public dancing and said he felt that, if the dances were permitted in the park, they would prove a temptation to people taking their children into the park. He admitted he had never seen anything objectionable at the dances.

Councilman Peters stated it was only fair to submit the question to a vote of the people, and Mr. Nims did not question Councilman Burdick, who it was known opposed the ordinance.

Councilman Taylor moved that council go into executive session to discuss the question, but Mayor Johnson stated this was not necessary. J. H. Fuller reported that the directors of the chamber of commerce had definitely decided to cancel their participation in the Fourth of July celebration if an ordinance making it impossible to hold the dances in the park was passed.

Councilman Burdick explained the difference between the old and the new ordinances, stating that the new one was worded merely to give the council the opportunity to refuse dance licenses.

Councilman Taylor made a motion that the emergency clause be eliminated and the ordinance thus passed. Wiley seconded this, and with the assistance of Councilmen Wright and High, this was raised.

passed, with Councilman Burdick and Peters voting no. Of second reading the same vote prevailed. Mayor Johnson then gave notice that he would veto the ordinance.

In order to settle the question, the council adjourned and reconvened within a few minutes, when the ordinance, with the emergency clause eliminated, was passed on final adoption over the veto of the mayor, with the same vote prevailing as in early actions.

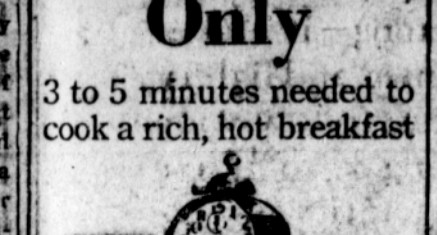
The directors of the chamber of commerce met in special session this afternoon and, after a very careful consideration of the circumstances in connection with preparations already made for the Fourth of July celebration, again unanimously voted in favor of holding the celebration.

No meeting of the Lithians had been held today, but a session of the executive committee will be held tonight. Expressions from various members of this organization indicated that the organization was in favor of constructing the platform in the park and of conducting dances there as long as this was legal and not forbidden. It was understood that this question would be settled tonight.

In a nut shell, the situation is status quo, as the lawyers state, until the referendum decision is made. Petitions will be circulated within a few days to procure the necessary signatures.

Intense discussion of the dance question prevailed throughout the city today. The important sections of the ordinance passed last night on final reading and then over the

mayor's veto, were as follows:
Section 1. "That the term 'public dance hall' is hereby defined for the purpose of this ordinance to be any building, room, hall, platform or pavilion, or other place kept or maintained for public dancing, or in which men and women are permitted to engage in dancing for compensation paid directly or indirectly either by admission charge or donation to the owner or operator of said public dance hall."
Section 2. "It shall be unlawful for any person, firm, corporation, organization or association to operate or maintain any public dance hall or halls as defined in this ordinance without first obtaining a license therefor from the Common Council of the city of Ashland, the license fee to be one dollar for each public dance or the applicant may take out a license for a period of one year and pay a license fee therefore of \$10. The license shall in no case be transferrable."
Section 3. "Application for the license herein required shall be made in writing to the Common Council at least two days before any public dance is to be held in any public dance hall, and if granted by the common council, the same shall be issued by the city recorder."
"That any license issued as herein provided shall be revocable at any time in the discretion of and by order of the common council, or upon the recommendation of the mayor or chief of police, or upon evidence satisfactory to the common council that either, the laws of the United States, the state of Oregon, or the ordinances of the city of Ashland are being violated."
The fifth section provides a penalty of not exceeding \$100, or imprisonment in the city jail for a maximum of 30 days, or both for an infringement of this ordinance.
