Herald Victory For Anti-Trust

WASHINGTON, June 12.—(AP)—Attorney General Sargent today announced a victory in another anti-trust suit when the Oregon Wholesale Grocers' association filed a consent to the decree in the Portland, Oregon federal court.

The decree provides that six corporate and 26 individual defendants will be perpetually enjoined from doing any acts to prevent or deter any firm from shipping or selling merchandise in Oregon. The case was against The Marshall-Well company, M. S. Sells and Company and Messrs. Hunt and Stanford, charging anti-trust activities.

This remarkable photograph shows the city of Dayton, Ohio, as it looks at 9:45 p. m. It was taken by an army air service photographer by the light of one of the new aerial flashlight bombs, dropped from a plane. The bomb contains 50 pounds of magnesium and makes a noise that can be heard for miles, but the flash lasts only a fiftieth of a second and is hardly visible to the naked eye.

ASHLAND FAVORS THE COURT HOUSE CHANGE

E. D. Briggs in Article States That This City Will Vote For County Seat Move

Judge E. D. Briggs of Ashland, chairman of the general committee on the removal of the court house, was in Medford yesterday to confer with Rawles Moore, president of the Bar association and the bar committee which has in charge of the legal proceedings relating to the removal of the court house, says The Medford Mail Tribune.

He reports that sentiment in Ashland is almost unanimous for the removal because of the added convenience to the south end of the county, especially in view of the fact that the removal of the court house can be effected, owing to the offer of the city of Medford to donate a temporary court house without any cost to the taxpayers of the county.

He reports that Ashland is all enthused over the new normal school and that most of the Ashland citizens look upon their city as the future educational center of Southern Oregon and consider Medford the business city and entitled to the court house. In fact, quite a few Ashland men have shown their faith in Medford as a business center by their large interests in Medford banks, stock plant and business property.

MAPS OF THE CRATER FOREST ARE ISSUED

Contains Description of This Region; Free to Those Writing for Them

Foldear maps for free public distribution have just been issued by the forest service covering two southern Oregon national forests, the Umpqua and the Crater. These maps may now be secured in single copies at the offices of district forest Granger in Portland and the forest supervisor in Roseburg and Medford.

Each map, in addition to showing the location of towns, roads trails and natural features, contains on the back a description of the region and other information of real value to the forest visitor.

The Umpqua national forest occupies the upper basin of the west slope of the Cascades. Its principle resource is timber, the estimate being approximately 23 and one-half billion feet board measure. Other resources described are grazing and recreation, and among the points of special tourist and hiking interest are listed Diamond Lake, the Oregon Sky-Line trail, Mt. Thielsen, 9,178 feet above sea level, Cape Iliaha and Soda Springs. A comprehensive table of distances is also included.

The Crater Forest covers the southern end of the Cascade range in Oregon and the heads of Ashland and Applegate Creeks. It carries a timber stand estimated at 8 and one-half billion board feet, but it is of chief interest to the average summer visitor because of its many scenic features and attractive forest camps.

Brief descriptions and directions are furnished for reaching the more popular camping places, such as the Recreation Creek area, Union Creek camp, Lake of the Woods and Mt. McLoughlin.

Within a space of seconds, all six entries, crossed the starting line with a six-pound belching signal and flags hoisted for the push off the Pacific Coast race classic. The race covers a distance of more than 2,250 nautical miles and is expected to run from 12 to 15 days.

Newsprint is Placed in the Junction

Klamath county is assured of constructive publicity and a consistent program of development through the action last night of the board of directors and representative stockholders of the Southern Oregon Tourist Bureau, with the naming of Ben H. Stevenson, newspaperman, to manage and operate the Klamath-Pacific highway junction tourist bureau project, according to the Klamath Falls News.

Public spirited citizens of Klamath county on March 1, of this year, organized a corporation and leased for a period of ten years a six acre tract at the highway junction. This property was shown to be admirably adapted to the purposes for which it was acquired.

The principal purpose of the project was to install a permanent Klamath county exhibit at an advantageous point where the many thousands of automobile tourists entering Oregon from California could be shown the great opportunities offered in the Klamath country.

The idea for such a project originated with Stevenson. He has been one of the most active members of the boosters' organization in developing the plans. The directors of the bureau have been equally enthusiastic as to the good work which could be accomplished through the medium of the bureau. They have improved the property and given their time toward getting the full plan in operation.

SPANISH WAR VETERAN HEAD VISITED HERE

Enroute to Philippines As Special Delegate For Pres. Coolidge

PORTLAND, June 12.—A denial of the reports that he was going to the Philippines to relieve Governor General Leonard Wood were made today by Col. Carmel A. Thompson, commander of the Spanish War Veterans who arrived here this morning.

He said he was making the trip to study conditions on the islands to make a report to the president.

Garmi Thompson, national commander-in-chief of the United States Spanish War Veterans, who arrived in Ashland yesterday afternoon enroute to Portland, was met here by George A. Car. Gu Gu Grandissimo of the Military Order of The Serpent, the fun-making order of the Spanish War Veterans, George Godfrey, state commander of the veterans, and Colonel Clarence R. Hotchkiss, United States marshal and a prominent Spanish War Veteran.

Thompson, who is on his way to the Philippines as a special commissioner for President Coolidge, is accompanied by Mrs. Thompson.

He born in Wayne Co., W. Va., Sept. 4, 1870, the son of a coal miner; at present a resident of Cleveland; enlisted at the outbreak of the Spanish War in the 7th Ohio Infantry as a private; served as corporal, sergeant, Captain and discharged as a Major. Ph. B., Ohio State University, 1892; L. L. B. 1895, married Lella E. Ellars, of Bement, Ill., May 3, 1899. Admitted to Ohio Bar, 1895, and practices in Iron-ton, 1896-1903; Member Ohio House of Representatives 1904-7. Speaker of House 1907-7. Secretary of State of Ohio 1907-11.
