### Guards To Be Put On Road To Falls

There will be 1200 feet of guard rails built at dangerous spots along the Klamath Falls-Ashland highway within the next few months, according to officials of the state highway department. It has been the plan of the highway department to build guard rails on this highway and several accidents during the past few weeks have spurred the department to action. The cost of guard rails is estimated at \$1 a foot. C. C. Seeley is warning motorists that they must proceed slowly while the approaches to Klamath Falls are being oiled during the next two weeks. There will be three applications of oil. If, while the oil is fresh on the road and the surface slippery, motorists speed and expect to use their brakes, accidents are certain to happen. Cars will skid and turn around on a freshly oiled road if brakes are applied suddenly, warns Seeley.

### "Bootleg Horses" Are Liquor Runners

CIUDAD JAUREZ, Mexico, (UP)—American prohibition enforcement officers are confronted with a novel problem and a new foe in the latest bootlegging development on the border, which involves the use of trained horses and mules as the medium of transportation of contraband liquors across the line. Inspectors near here recently saw a horse heavily laden with what appeared to be cases of whiskey carefully picking his way across the river some distance below the city. They rushed out to capture him, but he succeeded in gaining the bank on the American side and carrying his cargo off into the sagebrush. At other points between here and the gulf officers have detected burros and mules being used for the same purpose. It is believed that the animals are trained to go to a given point across the line, where confederates of the men who packed the whiskey are waiting for its delivery.

### Effort To Miss River Mud Flow

McCLOUD, Cal., June 12.—The McCloud River Lumber company has built dams to divert mud creek into the old channel running into McCloud river. This guarantees that there will be no repetition this season of the disastrous mud flow from the eastern slope of Mt. Shasta, experienced in 1924. The flow covered several square miles north and east of McCloud, some places being ten feet deep in muck.

### NEW SORORITY HOUSE UNIVERSITY OF OREGON.

Eugene, June 12.—(Special)—Construction on the new \$40,000 Chi Omega sorority house is to start immediately the contract having been let, sorority officers announced. Plans were drawn by Roscoe D. Hemenway, Portland architect, University of Oregon graduate and advise on the architecture was given by Julia Burgess, of the English department faculty. It is expected that the house will be ready for occupancy next fall.
