Self-regulation and independence are the earmarks of the new philosophy of business as set forth by John W. O'Leary in a statement deprecating the latter-day tendency to regulate economic conditions by legislation.

"Business," said Mr. O'Leary, "has passed through the era of seeking relief through government for the cure of our economic ills."

"American business has learned that high prices do not give assurance of high returns on investment. A curtailed market because of high prices produces surplus which must be ultimately sacrificed at a loss."

"American business has learned that efficient production is essential to success."

"American business has learned that through voluntary organization and cooperation, the experience, wisdom and research of each individual unit may be made available for all."

"American business has learned that government is a valuable partner but a poor master."

"American business has learned that artificial methods of price inflation are ultimately disastrous."

"American business is witnessing daily the failure of enterprises which carry with them the loss of money and effort of the proprietors. Such failure is unfortunate but legislation won't prevent it."

"American business has witnessed the trying times and disaster which come through deflation. Business knew that legislation could not prevent it."

Don't Count The Calories, Advice

BERKELEY, Cal., June 11. (UP) — Regardless of whether you are dieting to take off weight or dieting to put on weight, don't count your calories.

"This unusual advice is given by Miss Harriet Eddy, state leader of home demonstration work for the University of California extension service, who says that five out of every six persons who claim knowledge of nutrition are worrying too much about calories. Although food problems are the daily work of Miss Eddy, she declares the extension service totally disregards that well-known food unit.

"Be sure," she advises, "that every meal contains at least one item each of fruits and vegetables, meats or meat substitutes, starch foods, sweets and fats. Use plenty of fruits and vegetables."

"But forget the calories. By themselves they mean nothing. Sensible and careful meal planning is the best safeguard of good health."
