 had been permitted, it would have tied the score. Following the settlement of this the next batter was fanned, and Ashland won, 11 to 10.

Local players state that this decision may have had something to do with the filing of the protest, although the formal protest is based on an ineligible player. It seems that up until last Sunday the teams entered players at any time they desired, but that it was decided last Sunday that thereafter players had to be on the list 15 days before they could play. Morgan, the new second baseman of the Ashland team, was procured this last week, and it is thought that he is the player which inspired the protest by Grants Pass.

It was stated that the game may be called off, being marked in official records as a tie game and that it might be played off later.

 a two run lead. In the ninth inning Ashland evened the score, and the fans settled down for a long struggle.

Grants Pass came within an inch of bringing in two scores in the 10th inning, but Pellette, local third baseman who has developed into one of the most valuable players on the Ashland team, ruined their chances when he ran back and speared a potential hit.

The 11th inning brought the leading run for Ashland, but Grants Pass came back in their half determined to either tie the score or creep ahead. However, clever pitching and fast field work cut them off, and Ashland had won its second straight victory.

One of the outstanding features of the game was the playing of Morgan, a new man, at second. Besides fielding his position splendidly, he got a home, a three-bagger and a single in the first three times at bat. His homer went to deep center and was followed immediately by the bag circuit clout of Pellette, the ball bounding over the fence. In the next inning, Pernoll, Grants Pass pitcher, knocked the longest hit of the game, the ball clearing the center field fence. He had been taken out of the pitcher's box

early in the game and went to left field, where he muffed a fly, letting Ashland score two runs.

The schedule next Sunday calls for the meeting of the Ashland and Medford teams on the local grounds. Medford is said to have strengthened their team and, with the Ashland aggregation hitting the ball and fielding like winners, this game is sure to be a battle.

The result of the game at Klamath Falls yesterday, where Medford won 6 to 1, was a surprise to the local fans, as it had been figured that Klamath Falls would win.

According to reports reaching Ashland, there was a blowup in the Klamath Falls team during the last two days, this team having lost their first baseman and two other of their best players.
