Congregationalists Report Increase

Council of the Congregational Churches in the United States; its statistics are compiled from the annual reports of the individual local churches for the calendar year of 1925.

An increase of 10,423 in Sunday school enrollment and of 2,423 in the membership of Young People's societies is reported; the total Sunday school enrollment is 797,987 and the membership of the Young People's societies totals 121,910.

The number of new church members received upon confession of faith was 45,722, and the

whole number of new members received, including those added by transfer and restoration, as well as by confession, was 74,930.

over-advertising. He declared that a town that advertises and can't make good every part of the advertising, will soon suffer. Already the west indulged in so much braggadocio, he said, that easterners discount all Oregon and California advertising fifty percent to start with, and discount western speakers 75 percent.

MORE FIRES IN THE U. S. FORESTS

Forty-seven forest fires were reported up to June 1, for the twenty-two national forests in Oregon and Washington involving a total area of 2,670 acres, as shown by figures compiled in the office of district forester C. M. Granger, Portland, Oregon. For the same period last year, only twenty fires were reported, and the total area burned was less than 100 acres.

The very early spring this year carries with it the necessity for more than usual care with fire in the woods, according to forest officials. Every possible precaution should be taken by the public to prevent the starting of serious forest fires, it is said.

Of the 47 forest fires reported this spring, 22 were less than one-fourth acre in size when extinguished, 12 were between one-fourth acre and ten acres, and 13 reached in excess of ten acres. Most of the fires over ten acres did not, however, kill green merchantable size timber, according to the reports. They were largely confined to "old burns," and fern or brush patches. The serious aspect of such fires is that they usually destroy young tree growth, or "natural re-stocking," it is stated.
