The United States cannot bring pressure to bear on France and Italy while Russia is quite beyond responding to any influence about her domestic affairs, wherever it may originote.

The world, however, is not s badly off in this respect as the surface facts indicate because before many years have passed huge armies will have become obsolete and will pass away by the evolution of new weapons of warfare. France is the chief opponent of roposals for the reduction of

standing armies and it is probable that if France were not blocking the way, Italy would raise major bjections, too.
