A new style trend has been set in motordom. The radiator cap of the car is no longer an uninteresting metal object, but a very distinctive ornament that adds both style and beauty to the automobile.

The fashion was started by Rolls-Royce builders and other manufacturers have adopted the idea until the new style trend is now seen wherever fine motor cars are displayed.

Everyone admires the lovely Diana, gracefully posing on the radiator cap of the car that bears her name. The graceful wings of the Chrysler, the flying "J" of the Jewett and the silver helmet of the Willys-Knight are likewise looked upon with approving eyes.

Grotesque ornaments that were seen a few years ago have rapidly declined in popularity and beautiful emblems have taken their place. The Teddy bear kewpie doll, flag holders and billiken have all given over to the graceful speed nymph, surfrider, winged messengers and similarly skillfully wrought emblems.

Many motorists are following this new trend, according to information from the Western Auto Supply Company, and are equipping their cars with the new motor heat indicator that attaches to the dash and leaves the radiator free for an ornament of pleasing design.

This new indicator is known in accessory circles as the safe-t-stat. It registers the actual temperature of the motor from a thermostat attached directly to the engine instead of depending on the vapor in the radiator to register on the cap meter.

Attached to the dash, in plain sight of the driver, it is easily visible both day and night. When installed it actually becomes a part of the car, a permanent fixture that defies theft.

New Map of Wallowa Lake District Issued

A new folder map of the Wallowa national forest in north-eastern Oregon is now available at the offices of district forester Granger and the forest supervisor in Wallowa. It is issued by the forest service for free public distribution in single copies.

In addition to showing the location of towns, roads, trails, rivers, lakes and other features within and surrounding the forest, the folder contains on the back interesting descriptive matter and other information of particular value to forest visitors. A special innovation is the listing of all the more important fishing streams, or sections of streams, with the species of trout found in each.

Attention is also given to the fact that the Wallowa region is rich in the pioneering history of

the Oregon country, and possesses unique and attractive scenic values. The name is of Nez Percé Indian origin, mean a small pole fish trap. Chief among the scenic features touched on are the Snake River canyon, the four main mountain peaks—Matterhorn, Anderson, Pete's Point, and Eagle Cap, all around 9700 to 9800 altitude, and a number of mountain lakes.

The forest fire control organization is briefly outlined, and suggestions are furnished for the guidance of sportsmen and other travelers in the matter of outdoor sanitation and proper use of the forest, with special reference to fire prevention.

Japan as a whole is taking the greatest interest in the "Invasion" by Stanford's baseball team, inasmuch as the trip was financed by Waseda university and the Japanese government, after it has been sanctioned by the university.
