### 1926 TOURIST TO ESTABLISH HIGH RECORDS

As the past, the trend or direction of this flow of travel by motor vehicle largely has been from the south, with Ashland leading in number of registrations with no less than 1,689 for May and 4,972 since the first of the year. May showed a sharp gain over the same month of 1925, as 810 more out-of-state automobiles were registered in that month this year than in the corresponding month of the year previous. From January 1 to May 31, inclusive, registrations of this character were 14,933 in 1925 and 30,372 in 1926, or a gain for the first five months of 1926 of 5,439.

### Clear idea of the trend of travel into Oregon is afforded

through examination of the following figures prepared by Secretary of State Koser showing the registrations during May, 1926, of non-resident motor vehicles at the several designated points. Albany 90, Ashland 1,689, Astoria 48, Baker 60, Bend 77, Brookings 1, Corvallis 30, Eugene 262, Gold Beach 10, Grants Pass 754, Hillsboro 7, Hood River 43, Huntington 458, Klamath Falls 452, La Grande 119, Lakeview 30, Marshfield 32, Medford 906, Milton - Freewater 148, Newport 9, North Bend 7, Nyasa 57, Ontario 171, Oregon City 34, Pendleton 149, Portland 681, Roseburg 240, Salem 342, Seaside 4, The Dalles 90, Vale 4, Inspectors 2. Total, 6,997.

## This Contest is For Real Sailors Only

Yachting's Greatest Race, Los Angeles to Hawaii, To Test Amateur Skippers to the Limit

LOS ANGELES — The greatest race in the history of yachting began at this port on June 12.

Ten of the latest yachts on the Pacific coast will spread their sails before the northeast trades and follow the old blue trail down the track of the vanished clipper ships, bound for Honolulu harbor in a contest that will bring out every bit of seamanship their amateur skippers can display.

And at the end of the race a resplendent silver cup, gift of Sir Thomas Lipton, of which of them all, will go to the winner.

While the favorable trade winds are expected to hold good throughout most of the journey this race is distinctly no event for landlubbers. Severe storms may sweep the path of the yachts, alternating with dead calms and treacherous tropical squalls. A yachtsman who can make this cruise can call himself a sailor.

It is predicted that a new cruising record to Honolulu will be set. The present record is 11 days, 14 hours and 46 minutes, set in July, 1923, by the 106-foot two-masted schooner Mariner, then owned by L. A. Norris, but now the property of John Barrymore, the actor. Barrymore has entered it in this year's race and is confident that it will lower its own mark, although he himself will not be able to make the trip.

Among the favored contenders are two new boats, larger than any competing in any previous races to Hawaii. They are the Invader, a 137-foot boat owned by Don Lee, and Enchantress, 136 feet over all, owned by Morgan Adams. These boats can spread

a tremendous amount of canvas and are good sailors in either light or heavy winds. Another favorite is Talaya, a 102-foot black yawl sailed by Lazzard Lippman of the Catalina Island Yacht Club.

The two smallest boats in the race are J. T. Dickerson's Jubilo, which flies the pennant of the Los Angeles Yacht Club, and Ray Cooke's Glarible. Both measure only 40 feet over all.

Other entries are Clem Stose's 56-foot yawl, Teva, from the San Diego Yacht Club; Mollitou, 55-foot yawl owned by M. Hesselberger of the Los Angeles Yacht Club; Alice A. Will Meyer's 50-foot mahogany-colored yawl from the Catalina Island Club, and Dr. John Harper's 44-foot yawl, which flies the pennant of the Royal Victoria Yacht Club.
