## ASHLAND AND GRANTS PASS SETTLE FIGHT

Last Sunday's Protested Game to be Played Over Here on July 4th

### COMPROMISE REACHED

Local Club Gives in to Opponents in Order to Save Ball League

Rather than take a chance on seeing the new Southern Oregon Baseball League break up in disension, the directors of the Ashland ball club, at a meeting of the league directors last night, agreed to annul the game which Ashland won, 11 to 10, at Grants Pass last Sunday and play the game over here on July 4th.

"Buck" Seimons, manager of the Grants Pass club, filed a protest with the directors over a decision at the home plate in the ninth inning, in which the umpire ruled a Grants Pass player was out at the plate. Grants Pass claimed that an Ashland fielder had blocked the base runner and that the run should have scored.

The meeting of the directors last night was a fiery one, but all the directors, with the exception of Grants Pass, took the position that Ashland was right. However, when it appeared that Grants Pass might withdraw from the league, John Enders, business manager of the local club, agreed to play the game over, and thus saved the league directors from having to vote on the Grants Pass protest.

A discussion of the umpire question resulted in the directors authorizing President Nininger to give umpires absolute control on the playing field. Hereafter if heated arguments start on the field, the umpires are not only authorized but have been directed to put all offending players out of the game and off the field.

Medford will play Ashland here next Sunday while Grants Pass will go to Klamath Falls.

## GEOLOGIST TO TRACE SHORES OF OLD SEA

University of Oregon Man to Seek Data in The Blue Mountains

BEND, Ore., June 18. — The shore line of an ancient sea that lapped the foothills of the Blue Mountains will be traced out this summer by Dr. Earl Packard, University of Oregon geologist, and students at the summer camp in Crook county for advanced geological work, the professor announced today.

Dr. Packard hopes to find in the eroded country near headquarters of Crooked river fossil forms which lived millions of years ago in Chicco sea.

## SOLON HURLS FIERY CHARGE AT ACCUSERS

Senator Schall, Blind Minnesota Republican, Causes Big Uproar

### REFUSES TO RETRACT

Other Senators Fail to Quiet Him Down During Bitter Denunciation

WASHINGTON, June 18. —The senate was thrown into an uproar yesterday afternoon when the blind Senator Schall, republican, Minnesota, had a statement read by the clerk assailing in unparliamentary language his accuser in the recent election contest against him.

Senator Robinson, democratic floor leader and Senator Ashurst, democrat, Arizona, attempted to have Schall retract his statement, which accused those connected with the contest brought by former Senator Magnus Johnson as "Crooks, perjurers, assassins of character, skunks and philanderers."

Schall had just been awarded the seat by the senate. The blind leader resented the suggestion that he withdraw his remarks and, shouting loudly, said:

"It is an outrage that I can't have three or four minutes, to answer these charges. You want me to lie down now in front of men who have called me on the witness stand 'a damned lying—'"

Ashurst told Schall that the virtues of victory was magnanimity and that in years to come Schall would regret placing in the senate record his unusual language against his accusers.

## FATHER'S DAY WILL BE HELD SUNDAY; ANNUAL TRIBUTE NOW GROWING THROUGHOUT NATION

Sunday is Father's Day. It is the day which is coming to be nationally recognized as the time to honor the fathers of the United States and Canada by special service and considerations.

People will wear flowers in honor of Father; to show that the family appreciates to some extent his responsibilities and cares. It is agreed that Mother's Day observance is a beautiful custom, but it is also believed that father should come in for a share of the honor and respect due the parents, for the proper upbringing of the children and for the maintenance of the family life.

Sunday, June 21st, is the third Sunday in the month and the day observed over the United States and Canada as Father's Day. It will be observed by thousands of sons and daughters and wives who are learning to appreciate and remember father and observe his day with more love and reverence as the years go by.

Father has had a national birthday for each of the last three years. Before that time there had been celebrations for Father by various organizations, cities, towns and states throughout the nation, but no concerted

national observance. The third Sunday in June was finally agreed upon as the date for the whole country to observe Father's memory.

When Father's Day was first proclaimed it was the subject of much amusement for many persons. They couldn't get the idea of wearing flowers and keep a straight face while doing so "Just for the old man."

People gladly wore flowers for Mother on her day, but it was different for Father. They thought the "ole man" would himself be the first to laugh at the idea, but it seemed that Father did not object when members of the family wore cornflowers or dandelions and told him why, or gave him presents or held celebrations in his honor. Father, like everyone else, liked to be appreciated and taken note of once in a while.

Father has been taken too much for granted. In many families he has been considered as a sort of automatic "hand out." As long as he supplied the family wants, he received very little praise and there was no comment. However, now he is receiving just recognition on Father's Day.

## MAN SUSPECTED OF SLAYINGS CAPTURED

Otto Krueger, Accused of Murdering Three Women, in Held

LOS ANGELES, Calif., June 18.—Suspected of the brutal slaying of three aged women, two in San Francisco and one in San Jose, within the past two weeks, Otto Krueger, 63, was arrested here after he disembarked from the steamer Admiral Flske.

Detectives who made the arrest said Krueger appeared very excited and irrational. He answered in detail descriptions of the murder and admitted being in the two cities at the time of the slayings, it was said.

Krueger, however, denied flatly he had anything to do with the murder.

## POLICE SEEK SOLDIER FROM CAMP JACKSON

Man Wanted as Robbery Suspect Reported in Ashland Early Today

### MEDFORD MAN ROBBED

Joe Carroll Accused of Taking \$220 From R. B. Wolfe Last Night

Ashland police this morning were conducting a search for Joe Carroll, aged 34, a corporal in a Portland national guard company, who was being sought in connection with \$220 robbery in Medford last night.

Carroll was reported seen here late last night and early this morning, but took an early morning stage for Camp Jackson, the police learned. It is thought he was under arrest at the encampment this afternoon.

### BECOMES UNCONSCIOUS

According to the complaint of R. B. Wolfe, No. 1 Park Place, Medford, Carroll is alleged to have offered him a couple of drinks early last night. Wolfe told authorities that shortly after partaking of the soldier's hospitality he became unconscious, and when he revived he found his pocket book containing \$180 in bills and the remainder in checks was missing. His suspicion was at once directed toward Carroll.

According to Wolfe the money taken was all in \$20 bills. A man answering Carroll's description entered the Bluebird Cafe here early this morning with a roll of \$20 bills, and sought to have them all changed to a smaller denomination, the local police were informed. He is said to have nine of the bills, or the exact amount Wolfe is said to have lost.

Medford police notified Chief of Police McNabb this morning that Carroll failed to return to his outfit last night and was posted as being absent without leave.

## PROMINENT LAWYER PUT UNDER ARREST

Seattle Attorney Held in Los Angeles on Embezzlement Charge

LOS ANGELES, Calif., June 18.—Moncrief Cameron, prominent Seattle attorney is being held here on a telegraphic warrant from the north charging embezzlement. Bonds were fixed at \$20,000.

Cameron told officers he was innocent of the charges, contained originally in a federal indictment returned in the northern city, and his attorney issued the following statement:

"This arrest is due to a business misunderstanding. It involves a motion picture deal which Cameron was negotiating. A settlement would have been reached in a day or two if this arrest had not been brought about."

## Home Brewers to Have Tough Luck

SEATTLE, June 18.—Home brewers and wine makers will be included in the police roundup of liquor violators under the direction of Mrs. Bertha K. Landes, new Seattle mayor, it was revealed today.

"Chief of Police Searing knows my policy for strict law enforcement," Mrs. Landes said.

"Of course, if we arrest only those who sell liquor and let those possessing it go free, we would not go very far."

## AUTO LICENSE TO BE LESS ON JULY 1

Sheriff Jennings to Open Branch Office Here Starting June 25th

On and after June 25th, Sheriff Ralph Jennings will accept applications for half-year automobile licenses, and as an aid to Ashland motorists he will establish a temporary branch office in the local police headquarters, he informed Chief of Police McNabb today.

Under the state law automobile licenses are half price starting July 1, but by opening up the office a few days in advance the sheriff believes he will be able to avoid any delay.

A deputy will be stationed here from 9 in the morning until 4 in the afternoon until after the rush is over. He also will station a deputy in the chamber of commerce quarters at Medford.

He urges that all applicants make certain they have their certificates of registration on before applying for license.

SEATTLE, Wash., June 18. (UP)—Police today believed themselves possessed of a clue to the murderer of Sylvia M. Gaines, pretty Smith College graduate, whose lacerated body was found yesterday on the shore of Green Lake. A girl who was attacked by a fiend several weeks ago in the same spot furnished a description of her assailant to the police.

## Former Portland Doctor Arrested On Attack Charge

HOLLYWOOD, Cal., June 18.—Dr. Walter R. Anderson, formerly of Portland, was arrested here yesterday on serious charges preferred by Gloria Delmore, 18-year-old actress.

The physician is said by police to have admitted entering Miss Delmore's apartments. In the struggle that followed his entrance the actress says, she struck Dr. Anderson over the head with a milk bottle, inflicting a long gash on his forehead.

Dr. Walter R. Anderson had offices in the Journal building, Portland, until recently. It was understood he left for Southern California two months ago.

## Two Men Killed In Train Crash

## PIONEERS ARE KIWANIS CLUB GUESTS TODAY

Trail Blazers Tell of Early Days in Oregon and in This Section

### E. V. CARTER SPEAKS

Dick Posey Gives Original Poem; Other Luncheon Features Enjoyed

Topped by John Helman, who came to Ashland in 1854 as the first child born in Ashland, S. Z. Patterson, who came here in 1863, pioneers of Ashland were the guests of the Kiwanis club at their noon luncheon at Lithia Springs hotel today.

The other pioneers who were the guests of the club were Messrs O. Winter, Kozler, G. O. Van Natta, G. G. Eubanks, E. L. Lowe, G. S. Butler, "Dad" Provost, G. F. Billings, Butler Walker, W. A. Patrick, Sam Evans, Dick Posey and E. V. Carter.

Mr. Carter, who stated he came here in 1884 to start a bank, gave many interesting reminiscences of the early days and the men who contributed to the upbuilding of this pioneer country. He stated he found the people of the new country honest and trusting, and told of many incidents where the word of a man was the only security they required in their financial transactions. Mr. Carter also related many humorous incidents in connection with the early work of the bank. One of the largest stockholders in the bank came to the office one day with a buckskin sack, containing gold, with the request that the money be left in the bag and that he would come in and take out as he needed it. Mr. Carter stated it required a long explanation to show the stockholder that the money had to be deposited in the regular form and checked out.

Different Atmosphere  
He said in the early days the stock growers and farmers, who received most of their money in the fall from the sale of their products, had been in the habit of leaving this money each fall with the merchants and then using as they desired. It required considerable time to break down this custom and acquaint the people with the advantage of depositing their funds in the bank.

He closed his talk with this statement that there is something in the atmosphere of the country west of the Rocky mountains which imbues citizens of this vast empire with a greater, deeper love of their country, and said the poem, "Out Where the West Begins," which he recited, explained this phenomenon.

Dick Posey, poet laureate of southern Oregon, entertained the crowd with a recitation of a poem which explained an old man's methods of keeping peace and happiness in his family. According to the formula, the old man always arbitrated and compromised—by having his way in preference to the wishes of his wife and family.
