NORMAL WILL GET STARTED NEXT MONDAY

President Churchill and Faculty in Readiness for Summer Session

BUILDING INSPECTED

Members of Board of Regents Here to Accept School This Afternoon

Southern Oregon's new normal school—the Ashland normal—will open its doors for its initial summer session at 8 o'clock Monday morning, with President J. A. Churchill and the 20 faculty members in readiness to start the summer work under the most favorable conditions.

All day Monday will be devoted to the registration of students and other preliminary details, while the regular class work will get under way Tuesday morning.

Faculty Arrives
Faculty members are arriving in the city today and nearly all of them are expected to be here for the first faculty meeting which President Churchill is holding this afternoon.

The new normal building has been put in complete readiness for the coming of the teachers and students. The building committee of the board of regents is inspecting the building and grounds this afternoon and is expected to accept the building by late this afternoon.

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J. J. Tranchell, contractor, and J. V. Bennes, architect, accompanied the board members on their inspection of the building.

Prospects Bright
President Churchill said today he could not estimate the number of students who will attend the summer session of the normal school although present indications are that there will be young men and women here from every section of the state.

The summer school for primary and intermediate grade students will also start next week at the new Lincoln school on Beach street, with practice teachers from the normal assisting.

Two Holes Ready On Golf Course
Here's a bit of welcome news for members of the new Ashland Golf club. Two holes are now ready for temporary use, it was announced last night by Otto Winter, chairman of the course committee.

No. 1 is tentatively complete and ready for play, while No. 9 has a temporary fairway ready. No. 9 lies opposite No. 1, which will permit members to indulge in practice on both these holes.

Mr. Winter said that members of the club could get into action at once on these two holes, and a large number of golfers are expected out tomorrow morning to test the new course which is being built.

GARAGE AT SUMMIT OF SISKIYOU GOES UP IN SMOKE TODAY

Spilled Gasoline Starts Blaze Which Destroys Big Log Building

Fire this morning destroyed the Jones garage at the summit of the Siskiyou, but the store which adjoins the garage was saved.

About 9 o'clock this morning, according to one of the employees at the garage, the vacuum tank in an automobile was drained. It was thought that in some manner the gasoline which had been spilled on the floor became ignited, setting fire to the building.

The garage, which was constructed of pine logs, heavily laden with pitch, burned within a very short time. The fire spread to the adjoining store, but men from a nearby highway construction camp, rushed to the fire and prevented the burning of the store. The men were patrolling the forest throughout and extinguished several fires which started.

E. R. Jones, the owner of the garage was not present when the fire started.

County Seat Removal From Jacksonville to Medford is Planned

MEASURE EXPLAINED

Initiative Bill Will go Before Voters at November Election

Next Monday the court house removal question will again be in the limelight, when Initiative Petitions to propose a bill to effect the removal of the county seat from Jacksonville to Medford will be circulated.

The measure, proposed by the Initiative is as follows: "Section 1. That the county seat of Jackson County, Oregon, be removed from the Town of Jacksonville, said county, to the City of Medford, in said Jackson County.

Section 2. That this act shall become operative, and be in full force and effect from and after the first day of July, 1927. Section 3. That all laws fixing Jacksonville as the County Seat of said Jackson County, and all other laws in conflict herewith are hereby repealed."

CABARETS TO CLOSE AS DAYLIGHT STARTS

New York Mayor Issues Orders for Night Clubs to Halt at 3 A. M.

NEW YORK, June 19.—Mayor James J. Walker, himself once was one of the most picturesque Beau Brummels of New York's night life, has now undertaken to close up the city promptly at 3 a. m., instead of allowing its cabarets to operate until long past daylight as at present.

Violations of a law to this effect, offered by the Mayor to the board of estimate, would be punishable by a maximum sentence of a year in jail plus a \$500 fine.

KLAMATH WILL START ON BIG IMPROVEMENT

Approximately \$100,000 Will Be Spent on New Paving Projects

DECISION IS REACHED

City Council Maps Out Ambitious Program for Coming Summer Months

KLAMATH FALLS, June 19.—An expenditure of approximately \$100,000 in street pavement was decided upon last night at a special meeting of the Klamath Falls city council, which was attended by Mayor Goddard, Aldermen Cofer, Powell and Balsiger, City Attorney Carnahan and Judge Lem L. Gaghagen.

About 50 blocks will be paved, and the campaign of street improvement will be launched just as soon as the bonds can be sold and the contracts awarded following the advertising of bids.

The paving program has been under consideration for some time and according to present plans it will be only a short time until the work will be inaugurated with a view of completing it during the summer months.

The streets to be improved are as follows:

Washington street. Second street, together with Jefferson, Lincoln and Grant to Third street. The city will put the necessary sewer lines in to the curb or property lines.

An area in Railroad addition, Oak street from terminus of present pavement to Spring street. Klamath street from present terminus of pavement to Spring street.

Broad street from Oak to Main, Market street from end of present terminus of pavement north to Spring street. Alameda street, Pacific Terrace Eldorado, Eastland, Melrose streets.

"When I find such a condition I like to let the people know that their shops are maintaining such a high standard," said Mr. Griffith prior to his departure for the north.

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LITHIANS TO OPEN DANCING

Fireman's Orchestra of Portland Engaged for Initial Function

Characteristic of the pep and enthusiasm of the Ashland Lithians, they have arranged to open the Lithia Park Dance Pavilion with a bang on Tuesday evening, June 22nd, and to give the proper send off to the event they have engaged the nationally famous ten-piece jazz orchestra known as the Fireman's Orchestra, of Portland.

The members of this orchestra belong to the 162nd Infantry Band, now at Camp Jackson, and are composed of members of the Portland Fire Department. They have toured the United States and have entertained thousands of listeners over the radio.

On Tuesday evening at eight o'clock the 162nd Infantry Band of 55 pieces will give a band concert in Lithia Park, which will be followed by the opening pavilion dance of the season.

The Lithians are extending an invitation to the troops at Medford to attend and several hundred of Oregon's soldier boys will be in attendance. It is expected that an unusually large crowd of people from Ashland and surrounding cities and towns will be present. Lithians will all be in full uniform, and will be on the platform to help take care of the tremendous crowd that will be present.
