ASHLAND WINS SPEEDY GAME OFF MEDFORD

Local Ball Tossers Take Measure of League Leaders by 5 to 3 Score

Just write it down in the book that Ashland's baseball team is on its steady climb to the top rung of the ladder in the Southern Oregon Baseball League. Poor old Ashland that everybody felt sorry for at the opening of the season dug its spikes into the turf yesterday and defeated the ever confident Medford club, 5 to 3, in a speedy ball game at the local park which was never in doubt from first to last.

More than 900 howling fans crowded the bleachers and sidelines and witnessed a beautiful pitching duel between Emory Davis, whose ancient arm had perfect control of the spitball, and young Art Schoeni, the southpaw chucker who was making his first start for the league leaders.

Davis was flinging 'em over like a big league and Medford was able to loft only two high ones out of the infield. Although they fielded faultlessly, the Ashland infield, with the exception of Morgan, was a bit erratic on throws, and these wild heaves were responsible for two of Medford's scores. Davis' spitball got the horsehide too slick at times and accounted for the wild throws. Aside from these few wild throws it was a pretty game to watch. In fact, it was one of the cleanest games played yet this year. There was a total absence of wrangling, while Umpire in Chief LeRoy of Medford kept the players hustling from the first inning to the final play.

Medford scores one in the opening frame when Bannister hit safely and was advanced around the circuit on hits by Markle and Dunn. The leaders scored again in the second when Blair took first on an error, advanced to second on a sacrifice and scored on one of the wild heaves into the crowd along first base line.

Ashland came back in its half of the second with one run when Morgan hit one over the right fielder's head for two bases and scored when Marlow shot one to shortstop which was too hard to handle. Ashland got two more in the fourth, one in the fifth and another in the eighth.

Medford's only other score came in the fifth on a hit by Bannister and two infield errors. It was in this frame that Marlow grabbed

KLAMATH MAN ARRESTED ON CHECK CHARGE

Ray Hennessey Held at San Francisco for Alleged Theft From Friend

DRIVES TO ASHLAND

Is Alleged to Have Stolen Checks and Cashed Them in Pool Rooms

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., June 21.—Ray Hennessey, former employee of the Pelican Bay Lumber Company, was arrested in San Francisco Saturday on a warrant from the district attorney's office of Klamath county, on the charge of obtaining money under false pretenses.

On his return here by an officer from the local sheriff's office, when proper extradition papers have been arranged, Hennessey may face the additional charge of theft and forgery.

Alleged Crime

The alleged crime responsible for his arrest occurred here about ten days ago, when Hennessey, it is claimed, cultivated the friendship of R. Redich, a fellow employe at the Pelican City plant, who had two checks in his possession, one for \$30 and one for \$58.

Passed Checks Charge

Hennessey is alleged to have shared Redich's room with him at a local hotel at that time. Hennessey subsequently obtained possession of the checks made out to Redich, forged the latter's signature, then passed the checks, one at the Arcade hotel and one at the Past Time pool hall, it is charged. Immediately after obtaining the money he is accused of hiring a local taxi and making his way to Ashland, where he boarded a stage for San Francisco.

From information in a letter from a San Francisco woman to Hennessey, local officers assisted in effecting his arrest.

COURT ACTION UPON WINE IMPORT STARTS

Department of Justice to Take Action Against Oriental Liquor

WASHINGTON, June 21.—The department of justice announced today receipt of a report from the California northern district United States district attorney that he has instituted libel proceedings for forfeiture of 11,000 cases of Chinese wines held in customs warehouse at San Francisco and valued at \$1,000,000. The case will test whether the wine is admissible and a sharp contest is expected. The government claims it contains 47 to 5 per cent alcohol; the importers hold it is medicine.

Shasta Route To Retain Identity

The Southern Pacific Shasta route between Portland and San Francisco via Ashland will be known as the Shasta route, Siskiyou line, while the route via Black Butte and Klamath Falls will be known as the Shasta route, Cascade line, according to a telegram received this morning by A. S. Rosenbaum, district freight and passenger agent for the Southern Pacific.

Residents of this section of the state will be gratified to learn that the Southern Pacific plans to keep its Shasta route identity even on the new line via Klamath.

GOLD FIND AT GRANTS PASS DRAWS MINERS

Strike on Robertson Property is Sole Topic of Conversation

PROSPECTORS ACTIVE

Many Old Timers Change to New Location; Many Rumors Unfounded

GRANTS PASS, Ore., June 21.—If anyone doubts that the gold fever is mounting here, he should stand around the streets for a few hours any day and listen to the stories going around. The big strike in the Robertson mine has been bringing news of other finds, some authentic and others just naturally made out of a few rumors. There is, however, a constantly increasing interest in mining circles and many old prospectors have abruptly changed the field of their labors to the scene of the latest big strike.

This morning Ed Baerlocker is showing samples of the ore brought in from the Argo mine in which he is interested. This mine has been bonded to California operators and development work is under way. This ore is from a vein running four to seven feet in width and at least 35 feet in depth, bearing large quantities of free gold. The ore assays high but as yet no large quantity has been milled. The Argo is in the Galice district, about four miles down the river from Alameda. The ore is being shown at the Waldorf billiard parlor.

CAMPAIGN EXPENSES OF CANDIDATES LISTED

F. W. Steiwer Spent Over \$10,000 for Nomination; Total is \$100,000

SALEM, June 21.—Primary candidates of Oregon spent \$100,534.90, according to figures compiled by the secretary of state here Saturday.

These expenditures were distributed among a total of 252 candidates, of which number 96 were republicans and 56 democrats. The expenditures of republican candidates aggregated \$97,792.45, while democratic expenditures totaled \$5642.45.

The largest individual expenditures reported to the secretary of state were in connection with the republican contest for United States senator. Frederick Steiwer, successful candidate for this office, spent a total of \$10,975.61, while Robert N. Stanfield, incumbent and candidate for reelection, expended \$10,010.17. Other candidates in the race for this office spent as much as 7614.86.

VOTERS BALLOT ON SCHOOL DIRECTORS

Polls Will Be Open in City Hall Until Seven O'Clock Tonight

Indications early this afternoon were that a brisk vote would be cast for school director in the annual election for the Ashland school district. V. O. N. Smith, chairman of the board, and W. H. McNair, are seeking reelection, with Karl P. Nims contesting for one of the places on the board.

The polls will be open until 7 o'clock this evening, and all legal voters who have lived in their present precincts for the past 30 days are entitled to cast their ballots.

Voting was light when the polls opened at 2 o'clock this afternoon, but with friends of the three candidates interesting themselves in the outcome, it was predicted the vote would be larger than for several years in a local school election.

BURGLAR IS SLAIN IN ROOMING HOUSE

Japanese Landlady Kills Hawaiian Caught Prowling Through Rooms

SACRAMENTO, Cal., June 21.—Hant, an Hawaiian, was shot to death today by Mrs. M. Mita, proprietor of a Japanese rooming house, when he is said to have been surprised in breaking in the room of the Ipponese woman.

Mrs. Mita told investigating officers that she shot Hant when he wrestled with her for possession of a revolver after forcing his way into her room.

73 STUDENTS REGISTER FOR NORMAL WORK

Representatives From All Over State Here to Attend Session

CLASSES TOMORROW

Training School Will Be Held in New Lincoln School Building

One hundred and seventy-three students from all over the state were registered up to two o'clock today at the Southern Oregon Normal, which opened its doors in the new building this morning for the instruction of teachers in a six weeks summer course. Registration during the day proceeded smoothly with very little interruption. Faculty members held conference with various individuals who are to start training tomorrow.

From All Sections

The majority of students who are attending the summer session have had actual experience, according to officials in charge of the registration. In addition to the large number from the southern part of the state there are representatives from the eastern and north section. There are only a few men that have come to the city in order to take the course. Of these, the majority are training for principalships.

Actual class work will start at eight o'clock tomorrow. All faculty members have arrived and are to give preliminary instructions at the regular class periods tomorrow.

Training School

Training school, which will be held in the new grade school building on Beach street will also begin tomorrow.

There has been practically no difficulty in placing the normal students in suitable locations and finding boarding places for them, says the registrar. All students must pay the \$10 registration fee before attending any classes. They must also purchase their own books.

Ashland Cherries Command Highest Price In Market

Three carloads of Ashland cherries which were shipped to Chicago for eastern distribution 10 days ago brought the highest price on the day they were sold of any cherries in the United States, according to word just received by S. D. Taylor, manager of the Ashland Fruit and Produce association. The cherries were Bing and Lambert and sold for \$3.65.

The peach crop will be packed by experts at the local plant and the same good results are expected from Ashland peaches this summer, said Mr. Taylor.
