## LOST TEMPLE LEADER FOUND SAYS MOTHER

Mrs. Aimee Semple McPherson Located at Douglas, Arizona This Morning

### POSITIVE OF IDENTITY

Mrs. Minnie Kennedy Tells Officials She Talked With Daughter by Phone

LOS ANGELES, June 23.—(UP)—A wave of rejoicing swept over Angeles Temple today and its twenty five thousand members when reports were flashed from Arizona that their leader had been found. Maimed and disfigured men and women bowed their heads in thanks giving for the rescue of Aimee Semple McPherson, safe and alive. Crowds gathered in front of the temple to pray.

DOUGLAS, Arizona, June 23.—(UP)—A woman who is said by police here to be Mrs. Aimee Semple McPherson, missing Los Angeles evangelist, was found in a dazed condition early today at the Mexican city of Agua Prieta.

She was brought here by a taxi driver and taken to a hospital where she is being treated for bruises and hysteria.

LOS ANGELES, June 23.—(UP)—Mrs. Minnie Kennedy, mother of Aimee Semple McPherson, missing evangelist, announced today that her daughter had been found alive in Douglas, Ariz. Mrs. Kennedy said she talked to the evangelist on the telephone this morning and that she was positive it was Mrs. McPherson.

"She told me she had been kidnapped by two men and a woman and taken to Mexico. She was found in Douglas this morning, after a trip across the border with a taxi driver," Mrs. Kennedy said.

LOS ANGELES, June 23.—(UP)—Mrs. McPherson, nationally known evangelist, disappeared while swimming in the surf at Ocean Park on May 19, last. The woman told a vivid story of kidnapping at the beach and subsequent slavery in the hands of Mexicans across the border.

"I was taken from the water on pretext," she said. "A woman came to me and said, 'Sister, Mother wants you to go and see a sick child. A wrap was placed around my shoulders and I was hurried to a waiting automobile. The last I remember for many hours was being dumped rudely into the car and dope placed over my mouth."

The woman, whom police declare has been positively identified as Mrs. McPherson, said she had been carried across the line.

## "BUD" FISHER SUED FOR SEPARATION BY HIS JILTED SPOUSE

Noted Cartoonist Accused of Hitting Bride of a Year in Jaw Too Often

NEW YORK CITY, June 23.—(UP)—The Countess De Beaumont, wife of H. C. "Bud" Fisher, noted cartoonist, today accused her husband of using tactics typical of the characters of his cartoons, namely, that he struck her in the jaw.

She filed suit today for separation from her temperamental cartoonist husband and asked the court to grant her \$10,000 attorney fees, \$5000 for expenses and \$3000 in monthly alimony pending the outcome of the suit.

The two were married a year ago following a steamship romance in which the youthful son of the countess by a former marriage played a prominent part by winning the affection of the cartoonist.

## AGED PIONEER WILL BE BURIED THURSDAY

Mrs. Ellen Giddings Had Lived in Same House Here for Over 60 Years

Funeral Services for Mrs. Ellen Giddings, who died yesterday, will be held from her home on North Main street, where she lived for over 60 years, at 2 o'clock Thursday afternoon, with the Rev. Henry officiating. Services are in charge of H. C. Stock Undertaking Parlor.

Ellen Giddings was born in Wisconsin, July 3, 1842, and died yesterday of an apoplectic stroke. She came to Ashland, with her parents, Bennett and Armilda Millou in 1854. This had been her home since. She was married July 3, 1859 to A. F. Giddings, and to them were born three children, of whom two survive, Henry Giddings of Crescent City and Millie Donnelly of Ashland. Her husband died in November, 1905.

Mrs. Giddings was the oldest of twelve children, seven of whom are living, Mrs. Sarah Kentner, Martha Morgan, Laura Howard, Esther Littleton, William and Charles Millon of Ashland and Mrs. Alice Baldwin of Klamath Falls.

## DARING FLIER TO WIN AWARD FOR AIR TRIP

Lieut. Commander Byrd Arrives at Washington for His Decoration

RECEIVES GOLD MEDAL Naval Aviator Who Flew Over North Pole is Given the Hubbard Trophy

WASHINGTON, June 23.—(UP)—Lieut. Commander Richard E. Byrd today reported to his superiors and prepared to receive at their hands an award for his achievement as the first aviator to fly over the North Pole. President Coolidge and Secretary of the Navy Willbur were to present Byrd with the Hubbard Gold Medal. Floyd Bennett, who accompanied Byrd on the flight, will likewise receive a gold medal. The presentations were arranged by the National Geographic Society.

It was the improved type of sun compass presented to Byrd by Dr. Gilbert Grosvenor, President of the National Geographic Society, which guided the daring pilot on his successful flight to the Pole and back from Spitzbergen. It likewise enabled him to determine his exact location at the pole.

The Hubbard Gold Medal has been awarded to four other men, and only two other Americans, Commander Robert E. Peary received it in 1906 following his discovery of the Pole and General Goethals was given the award in 1914 by President Wilson. The last medal was awarded in 1919 to Wilhjalmer Stefansson, while Sir Ernest Shackleton was honored by its presentation in 1910. Commander Byrd will tell of his exploit at a gathering tonight which will include the President and members of his cabinet, members of the diplomatic corps, prominent scientists, government officials and fellow officers.

## HISTORICAL PAGEANT WINS HIGH APPROVAL

Large Crowd Attends Opening Performance of "Blazing The Trail"

The big historical pageant, "Blazing The Trail," in which 300 persons from all parts of Jackson county are taking part, won high favor with the opening night crowd at the fair grounds last night. The settings, lighting effects and the big final scene of the volcanic eruption were more pretentious than had been anticipated and added a finished touch to a credible performance.

## Lithian Dance Well Attended

An enormous crowd attended the first dance given at the Lithian Pavilion under the auspices of the local booster organization last night. Not only were the Lithians and a large number of townspeople there, but many from Medford and from Camp Jackson were in attendance. The dance was carefully supervised by members of the Lithians in their official costumes. ## TIMBER WASTE CHARGE MADE BY HARTLEY

Governor Demands Law to Force Advertising of Timber Cruises

ATTACKS UNIVERSITY Says He Will Oppose All Candidates Who Have Previously Opposed Him

BELLINGHAM, Wash., June 23.—(UP)—Beginning his fight to elect a state legislature favorable to his policies, Governor Roland H. Hartley addressed several thousand citizens of Whatcom county here last night. Hartley charged that public timber was being sold to a "ring" for one fourth of its true value. He demanded a law making mandatory the advertising of timber cruises in big state dailies. His main attack of the Washington University was that it served Seattle out of proportion to the remainder of the state. Hartley announced that he would oppose every candidate who had opposed him.

## WALES CELEBRATES HIS 32ND BIRTHDAY

Round of Entertainment Provided for Heir to the British Throne

LONDON, June 3.—(UP)—The Prince of Wales reached the age of 32 today but paid scant attention to the event, being wholly absorbed in a round of official entertainments. In the morning he received the customary bouquet of flowers from his staff at St. James' Palace and at noon he dined with the King and Queen at Buckingham Palace—a custom scrupulously observed by the children of the Royal Family; tonight, accompanied by Prince Henry and the Princess Ingrid of Sweden, he is expected to "look in" at a big dinner dance in Belgravia where he will probably get a big shower of confetti. In all other respects his birthday will pass like other days.

However, the Empire will celebrate with gusto. Flags were flown on all government buildings throughout the United Kingdom, the Dominions and the Colonies, and at noon sharp the royal salute of twenty-one guns boomed out at naval and military stations.

BERLIN, June 23.—(UP)—The world's first convention of polar explorers is to be held next fall, probably in Cologne, it was announced today. The purpose of the meeting will be to arrange for the scientific conquest of the Arctic.

## ORDINANCE IS REPEALED BY CITY COUNCIL

Body Defers Matter of Building Sidewalks in Northern Section

WILL VACATE STREET Contribution of \$25 Made Toward Booth to be at Lions Convention

Further discussion of the dance question by the city council at their meeting last evening resulted in the passing of an ordinance repealing ordinance No. 804, which, if enforced, would prohibit dances in the Lithian Park pavilion. The vote to repeal the ordinance was unanimous. The city attorney was instructed to prepare a resolution placing the issue as to whether or not park dances ought to be permitted on the November ballot.

The council decided to defer the matter of building sidewalks in the North part of town, after the hearing which was held last evening.

Bids were opened for the building of a rest room at the entrance of the city park. The matter was referred to the realty committee. No bids were submitted for building sewers on Elizabeth Street so the council authorized the city engineer and water superintendent to go ahead with the construction.

A detailed report on the flow of water in Cow Creek and the advisability of using it for city water was submitted by Earl Hosier, city water superintendent. Contribution of \$25 was made by the body to help defray the expenses of a booth to be erected at the International Lions Club convention to be held the last of July in San Francisco. Representatives from the Medford club were present to ask for a donation of \$100 from Ashland, \$25 apiece from the Lithians, Chamber of Commerce, Park Board and city council. At the booth there will be displays of Southern Oregon products and moving pictures showing some of the scenic spots of Southern Oregon will be featured.

Decision to vacate Hartley street after various requests from residents in that part of the city was made. The motion was made at a previous meeting to leave the street as it is, but last night the action was rescinded and the street will be vacated.

## THOUSANDS ATTEND CATHOLIC CONGRESS

Pilgrimage to "America's Holy City" in Illinois Started Today

CHICAGO, Ill., July 23.—(UP)—The pilgrimage of seven hundred and fifty thousand persons to Mundelein, America's Holy City, for Thursday's crowning and concluding ceremonies of the Eucharistic Congress began today. Lines of automobiles are moving steadily out of Chicago along various routes. Officials estimate that there will be at least two hundred and fifty thousand campers on the grounds by midnight.
