BIRDNEST BUILT ON GOLF COURSE

Action of Portland Killdeer Saves Killdeer From Destruction

PORTLAND, Ore., June 23.—If there isn't any human interest element in wild animals and birds there is something so akin to it that has just as much of an appeal, and in some cases perhaps even more so. Ask no one can doubt that such qualities as instinct, motherly love and self-protection are less pronounced in wild birds than in humans.

A case in point has been brought to the attention of members of the Lake Oswego Country club during the past few days. In the middle of the third fairway a killdeer built its nest. The operator of the mowing machine made the discovery just in time to save the nest and the three small speckled eggs from being ground to pieces. To preserve the temporary bird home he gathered some stones and placed them around it.

The operation was most distressing to the mother bird, but after she had found that the nest and eggs were intact and undisturbed she settled down peacefully to the business at hand.

But at frequent intervals during the days following the mother killdeer has had much to contend with. At the approach of golfers she fits from her nest and runs in front of the players, pretending that she has a broken wing. She then flops from one side to the other to attract the attention and sympathy of the unwelcome visitors, all the time drawing them farther away from her nest.

Weird sounds to denote that she is in pain and distress accompany her gyrations on the fairway.

After the players are lured away to what seems a safe distance to her she calmly returns to her nest and again takes possession. Several times a day she repeats this performance—every time golfers pass along the fairway. The ruse is so cleverly done that one wonders whether this another bird really thinks or acts by instinct of the highest order.

All the players who frequent the course are now most interested and are hopeful that the three little killdeer soon will be hatched out.

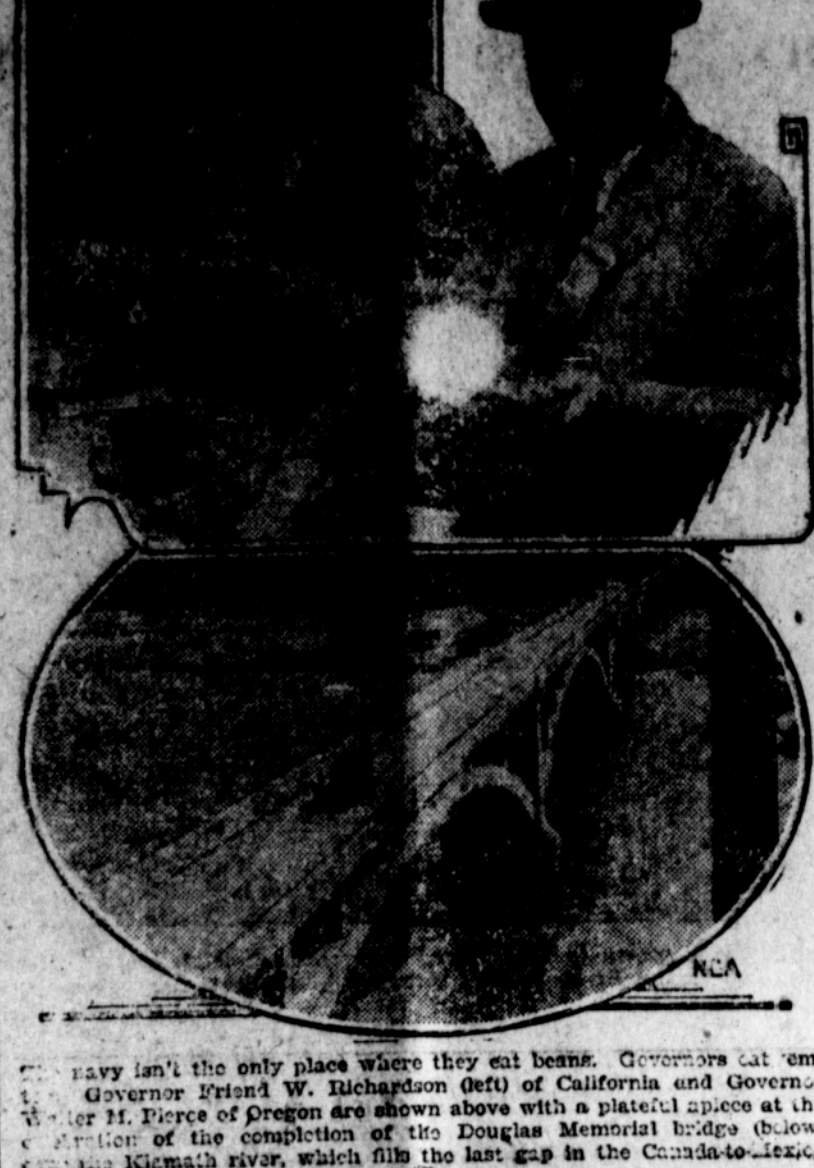

Youths previously accused of attacks on Carlson were exonerated by this latest development.

HUNGARY LEADS WORLD IN NUMBER OF SUICIDES

BUDAPEST, (UP)—Hungary leads the world in suicides. Although the total population of the country is less than eight million; 2313 persons killed themselves during the past year.

The figure for the next twelve months promises to be even greater. Despite every effort on the part of "anti-self-murder" societies and even greater preventative work on the part of police to drag suicides candidates from the Danube the number of self-inflicted deaths is increasing each week.

Among the latest suicides was Eugene Balla, Chief of the Police Statistical Bureau, which keeps the record of suicide cases. He used the method most popular with his fellow-suicides. Avoiding the watchful eye of the bridge policeman, whose job it is to hinder such acts, Balla jumped into the Danube from the Margaret Bridge, one of the principal connecting links between the two cities of Buda and Pest.
