VETERAN IS PENSIONED AFTER 62 YEAR EFFORT

COLUMBUS, O., June 24.—(UP)—Lester Cooley, 84, has finally decided to quit working. For Cooley, a Civil War veteran, through an unquenchable and unwavering spirit, has finally won a 62 year controversy with the U. S. government. He has just been informed that he is to get his honorable discharge papers for his services in the Civil War, and entitling him to a pension. He was wounded at Petersburg, Va., July 5, 1864, and was taken to a hospital in Philadelphia. He was sent home a few months later and told by hospital physicians that his discharge papers would follow. But it has taken 62 years to restore Cooley his rights as an honorable discharged veteran. Congressman Speaks of Ohio, undertaking to secure a discharge for Cooley, finally caused Congress to pass the necessary legislation, making Cooley's discharge official and entitling him to his pension.

BATTERY B. HAVING GOOD TIME AT CAMP

Battery B reports that the best camp in years is now in progress at Ft. Stevens. Captain Lynn Slack said that this is the best camp that they have had since the war. It is especially notable for the climatic conditions. The weather has been everything that could be asked for. The water compares very favorably with the city water supply at Ashland. The conditions of the barracks are better than at any previous camps in regard to equipment and sanitation. The other general conditions regarding food etc., are all that could be asked for and these conditions united with the easy accessibility of the camp make the two weeks to be spent here very pleasant.

The danger of a smallpox epidemic has passed and Battery E of Cottage Grove has been released from quarantine. However, to make doubly sure the additional precaution of having everyone stationed at the post vaccinated. The time has passed rapidly for the men as the day's program is well filled and many men have taken the additional privilege of visiting Seaside and Astoria. The present schedule calls for the firing of the sub-caliber on Wednesday and service shots Thursday. There will be one hundred of the former and eight of the latter. The program of the day's work includes three and half hours of artillery drill, one and half hours of infantry drill and mass athletics. Reveille is at six a. m. and the day is well filled until taps at eleven p. m.
