GRANTS PASS COMING HERE NEXT SUNDAY

Torrid Ball Game Expected at Jackson Hot Springs Day After Tomorrow

VICTORY IS PREDICTED

Locals Now Out to Climb to Top of Ladder in Southern Oregon League

One of those torrid ball games that are fought right up to the last of the ninth is in prospect for the local park at Jackson Hot Springs Sunday afternoon when Ashland's club hooks up with Grants Pass.

Local fans still remember the game at Grants Pass two weeks ago which Ashland won but which the directors called no-contest because of a Grants Pass protest over a close decision at the home plate in the eleventh inning.

The directors were agreed that Ashland was right and should be awarded the game, but "Back" Stemon, who was then a Grants Pass director, had to have his own way. He said his team would withdraw from the league unless the protest were allowed, so the Ashland club agreed to play the game over in order not to disrupt the league.

Regular Game

The game Sunday, however, is not a play-off of the postponed game. It is a regular scheduled game, but after that bit of piracy at Grants Pass two weeks ago, the local athletes are going out to beat Grants Pass decisively.

Last Sunday the boys outplayed Medford from start to finish, and had it not been for a flock of wild-heaves, the score would have been much more satisfactory from Ashland's standpoint. Stan Pillette, the speedy third-bagger for the locals, uncorked a pair of wild throws that were wholly unusual for him. BEN H. STEVENSON TALKS TO KIWANIANS

Head of Tourist Bureau at Junction Tella Club About His Plans

Ben H. Stevenson, manager of the Southern Oregon Tourist Bureau at the junction of the Pacific and Klamath highways, appeared before the Ashland Kiwanis Club today and urged co-operation between all the Southern Oregon communities in building a permanent tourist booth at the junction.

Although the idea originated in Klamath Falls and is being financed by Klamath Falls business men, Mr. Stevenson said Ashland, Medford, Grants Pass and other Southern Oregon cities will be permitted to make use of the facilities and advertise their own communities without cost to them.

At the suggestion of V. O. N. Smith the Kiwanians voted to recommend a conference between the various towns to determine definitely whether or not the information bureau might prove worthwhile for cities other than Klamath Falls.

By unanimous vote the Kiwanians decided to have a float in the Fourth of July parade. The members will not march as an organization. The parade committee, of which W. M. Wright is chairman, reported splendid progress in getting organizations and individuals to take part in the parade.

RELICS OF ANCIENT BATTLE UNEARTHED

Indications of Naval Fight at Entrance of San Diego Harbor Found

SAN DIEGO, Cal., June 25.—(UP)—Indications of an unrecorded naval engagement fought at the entrance to San Diego harbor several centuries ago were dredged from the floor of the harbor by the government dredge MacKenzie, officers of the vessel reported today.

An ancient anchor, fragments of copper an d brass and an old cannon ball are among the relics sucked up from the silt of the harbor by the pumps from the dredge.

SECRETARY JARDINE TO BE INVESTIGATED

Reported Connection With School for Gambling Will be Under Probe

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 25.—The senate today adopted a resolution of Senator Caraway, democrat, calling up Secretary of Agriculture Jardine to explain his reported connection with a school for "gambling on grain exchanges," in Chicago.

The resolution cited an advertisement in the Chicago Tribune stating that Secretary Jardine was a member of a college scientific forecasting of grain prices.

"I want to know how much Secretary Jardine is being paid to teach gambling on grain exchanges," said Senator Caraway.

Seek to Defeat All Farm Bills

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 25.—(UP)—Convinced that defeat of the McNary-Haugen bill has eliminated the only relief bill in congress, the senate farm bloc today moved to shelve all pending substitute farm bills.

HEAT CAUSES FOUR DEATHS ALONG COAST

Persons Seeking Relief From Sun's Rays Drown While in Swimming

RELIEF IS IN SIGHT

Cooler Weather Predicted; Many Accidents Reported in Northwest

PORTLAND, Ore., June 25.—(UP)—With the weather man promising a respite which an early sun seemed to deny, the Pacific northwest today faced the second day of unusual summer heat.

Although there was but one direct victim of the heat yesterday, four persons were drowned while seeking relief in lakes and rivers. The heat victim was Frank Hamilton, aged 30, who was taken to St. Vincent's hospital from heat prostration. He was still in a serious condition today.

Four Drowned

Persons who were drowned are Raymond Johnson, 19, Portland, who was drowned in the Willamette river; Jack Orchard, age 10, of Longview, who was drowned in Lake Sackewa; Kenneth Cook, Hoquiam, Wash., who perished in the Humpulps river; Will Davis, 15, of La Grande, who lost his life in the Grand Ronde river.

The mercury soared the highest in Oregon yesterday at Pendleton, where 120 degrees was reported. Astoria was the coolest with 90 degrees. Accidents were frequent yesterday.

At Raymond, Wash., Mrs. Eva Bissinger was killed in an automobile accident when she accepted an invitation of strangers to take her into town after she had been abandoned by an unidentified man with whom she had been riding.

At Orgon City five occupants of an automobile driven by Mrs. Zoda H. Ballard were injured when the car collided with a truck. At Grants Pass Arthur Connelly, a fireman, was killed when he touched a high voltage wire. At Kelso, Wash., Tommy Barr, aged 3 years, fell from a cherry tree and broke his neck.

WILKINS EXPEDITION MEMBERS IN SEATTLE

Detroit-Arctic Party Arrives in States Aboard Vessel From Alaska

SEATTLE, Wn., June 25.—"We'll do better next summer, profiting by our experience this year," members of the unsuccessful Detroit Arctic expedition declared here today after arriving from Alaska aboard the steamer Alaska.

The party included Major Thomas G. Lanphier, A. Malcolm Smith, Lieut. Charles M. Wisely, Fred L. Earp and Howard F. Mason.

Captain George H. Wilkins, head of the expedition, remained in Fairbanks but will return to the states in a fortnight.

"We're going to try again next year," Major Lanphier said.

"We learned a lot and we are sending up supplies to be ready for us next season. Captain Wilkins still hopes to find some land in the great unexplored area north of Alaska."

PORTLAND, Ore., June 25.—(UP)—Contracts amounting to approximately \$25,000 were awarded today at a meeting of the Oregon state highway commission. The contracts are for the most part on the Roosevelt highway.

Bologna is Used To Rout Robbers

NEW YORK, June 25.—(UP)—Armed only with a length of bologna, Samuel Reustrom, proprietor of a delicatessen, routed three young robbers who attempted to hold him up in the store. When one of the youths levelled his gun at Reustrom, the proprietor flung a sausage in his face. Reustrom turned on the others and his onslaught of sausages caused the three to flee.

ANOTHER DRAMATIC CUT IN USE OF WATER FOR LAWNS AND GARDENS TO BE MADE

Another drastic cut in use of water for garden and lawn purposes will become effective tomorrow, according to announcement today by Earl Hoeler, superintendent of the municipal water department. He is mailing out notices to all consumers today.

The water situation is becoming more serious each day, but it is hoped that the present schedule of hours can be maintained for another two weeks. It is possible that other changes may be made necessary some time next month.

Mr. Hoeler urges that all citizens read the notices which he is mailing out today and observe the new regulations at all times.

Substantial Cash Prizes To Be Offered Winners in Big Fourth of July Parade

Even the Newcomers Club has promised to have a float in the Fourth of July parade.

This organization, which to all outward appearances has been defunct for the past several weeks, awakened long enough this morning to promise V. O. N. Smith that it would have some kind of a float in the big Fourth of July parade a week from next Monday.

But this is but one of many organizations of the city that will be represented in what is planned to be the biggest Fourth of July parade Ashland ever witnessed. The Kiwanis committee, which has complete charge of the parade, announced this afternoon that its plans are going forward even better than expected.

Many clubs, lodges, churches and other organizations are now planning floats, while individuals are asked to have their decorated cars in the line of march.

Cash prizes amounting to a little more than \$100 will be awarded to the best floats and other entries. The prizes will be divided into four classifications, namely: business floats, decorated cars, pioneer floats, organizations and comic entries.

In the first four classifications the best entries will get \$15 cash, and the second best, \$7.50. For the most comic float or entry in the parade there will be a prize of \$10, with \$5 for the second prize.

Members of the committee today urged all organizations to plan for the parade, and for individual car owners to get out in force for that classification.

Fred C. Homes will be grand marshal for the parade. He will name his assistants early next week. The line of march also will be mapped out Monday night and published next Tuesday.

Evangelist Will Take Her Story Before People in Open Air Meeting

TALE NOT BELIEVED

Veteran Sheriff Gives up Search for Alleged Kidnapers of Preacher

DOUGLAS, Arizona, June 25.—(UP)—Her veracity questioned by authorities here, Mrs. Aimee Sempie McPherson prepared today to take direct to the people her weird story of kidnaping by bandits who are alleged to have held her captive in Mexico for a ransom of \$500,000.

The evangelist announced she would address the public at the city park here this evening. She leaves tonight on a special train for Los Angeles where a gigantic home-coming has been arranged for her by her 25,000 followers.

Give Up Search

Sheriff J. P. McDonald of Coahuila county and his deputies have given up their search across the international boundary for the alleged kidnapers of Mrs. McPherson.

"We have been unable to find a single clue to support the tale related by Mrs. McPherson," the veteran sheriff told the United Press. "We feel it would be a waste of time to make a further search."

Sheriff McDonald declared also that he had found several discrepancies in the story told by the evangelist.

Crater Lake Will Be Filmed by Big Hollywood Concern

E. W. Price to be Host to Film Group at Lodge This Week End

Through the courtesy of Southern Pacific officials, Southern Oregon and Crater Lake will get some desirable publicity this week end through the medium of motion pictures to be taken by Senator Whalen of Michigan and five members of the Laurence Hughes Production company of Hollywood.

The motion picture group will arrive in Medford tomorrow morning from Portland and will spend some time in taking desirable views of the national park.

The company is filming an extensive travelogue of the Pacific coast and was anxious to procure some scenic attractions of this part of the state.

Dry Squad Active South of Ashland

Numerous Arrests Are Made During the Week in and Around Yreka

YREKA, Cal., June 25.—The local federal dry squad, under the leadership of W. E. Corley, has had a busy week rounding up dry law offenders and gathering in stills and mash. The activities of the week include raiding of several road houses and saloons where no evidence was found and the destruction of stills and mash where no defendant has yet been arrested.

Daniel Makris, proprietor of the Alhambra Pool Hall and saloon, was arrested for possession of flour and paid a fine of \$300.

Oscar Miller, proprietor of the Little Dutch Lunch and a wholesale liquor dealer, was held under \$1000 bonds to appear in federal court.

J. P. O'Brien, Klamath Falls, was taken on the highway near Weed, with his automobile loaded with flour, had a hearing and his case was continued.

Tiny Haddleston and Jack Shuper of the old Dynamo house, a distributing point west of Mt. Shasta, were sentenced to pay a fine of \$300 each or serve 300 days in jail. They paid the fine.

Tillie Chootil, proprietor of the Mt. Shasta Ravell Grill, paid a fine of \$300.

MOONSHINE CAUSES BIG FOREST FIRE

Forest Officials Find Gigantic Liquor Plant in Woods Near Bend

BEND, June 25.—Moonshining operations were the cause of a forest fire in the Pringle Falls section, investigations of national forest employes established today. At the apparent source of the blaze they found a series of three connected stills, 800 gallons of mash, and a small quantity of first run liquor. The operators had apparently fled when the fire passed beyond their control. It was one of the largest liquor plants ever found in Central Oregon.

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BUS SERVICE ON BOULEVARD STARTS TODAY

Regular Schedule From Hotel Ashland to Normal School is Given
