ROSEBURG FESTIVAL BOOSTED BY "VOLT"

The Strawberry Carnival which takes place each year at Roseburg, Oregon, is a real event and is attended by many visitors from all parts of Southern Oregon. This year's celebration was a record-breaker, thanks to the combined efforts of the Umpqua Chiefs, Roseburg's unique booster club, and proved such a success that the VOLT saw fit to give it prominent mention in the June issue which is just off the press. The article is illustrated by numerous photographs of the parades, stunts and prize-winning strawberries and is most interesting

from beginning to end as is evidenced by the opening paragraphs which are quoted as follows:
"We may say of angling as Dr. Boteler said of strawberries, 'Doubtless God could have made a better berry, but doubtless God never did'; and so, if I might be the judge, God never did make a more calm, innocent recreation than angling." —Isaac Walton

Thus, as quoted above, the quaint, lovable author of "The Complete Angler," while sounding the praises of his favorite sport, paid his respects to the strawberry, nearly two and a half centuries ago. And now, in this epoch, Roseburg, Oregon, expressed its appreciation of the strawberry by holding a threeday celebration once a year—for more than twenty years Roseburg's annual Straw-

berry Carnival has been the springtime Mardi Gras of southern Oregon. It takes place late in May or in early June—depending on the time when the abundant strawberry crop of the Ump-

qua Valley reaches its peak. The 1926 celebration was held last month, sponsored by the Umpqua Chiefs, the booster tribe (Continued on page six)
