LOCAL NORMAL IS DEDICATED TO STATE USE

Large Crowds Attend Functions Here Saturday on Opening of School

500 ATTEND BANQUET

Educators, State Officials and Others Here for All-Day Celebrations

Oregon's new educational institution — the Southern Oregon State Normal School — was dedicated to the state and to the people of the state at impressive cornerstone and dedication ceremonies here Saturday afternoon.

The laying of the cornerstone took place at the splendid new building on the south edge of the Boulevard while several officials, educators and citizens stood with bared heads during the Masonic cornerstone ritual.

Ceremonies Placed

The pretty cornerstone of Ashland granite was placed into the building by Frank J. Miller of Albany, a normal school regent and past grand master of the Masonic bodies of Oregon.

Dr. Henry Suzzalo, president of the University of Washington, and one of the foremost educators of the west, held the large throng spellbound within the normal auditorium during his splendid dedicatory address. He spoke eloquently on educational matters and compared the opportunities to the youth of America to those of England and other countries.

Governor Speaks

Governor Walter M. Pierce expressed his pleasure at the opening of the new normal school and predicted it would within a short space of time take rank with the best institutions of its kind in the country. Both speakers directed their remarks to a large extent to members of the faculty and to the students, whose careers are being shaped by the normal school work.

President J. A. Churchill presided and introduced the several speakers.

Many At Banquet

Approximately five hundred guests were in attendance at the banquet at the Army which was the fitting close of Ashland's red letter day devoted to the dedicatory ceremonies of the Southern Oregon Normal School.

Every inch of available space was occupied by tables with that of the principal speakers at the head, at which were seated an interested audience drawn from different communities of the state, here to rejoice with Ashland, and the state in this culmination of years of persistent, patient effort in the reestablishment of the educational institution.

Vining Presides

Irving E. Vining, president of the state chamber of commerce, a former instructor in the Normal, officiated as toastmaster, introducing the different speakers and in that capacity utterly refuting the premises to be drawn from his first illustration "of being stuck and nothing to unload."

ARCTIC EXPLORERS REACH SEATTLE ON LAST LAP OF TRIP

Members of Crew of Dirigible Norge Reach Parting of the Ways

SEATTLE, Wash., June 28.—(UP)—The last day of the greatest polar adventure in all history is at hand today. The crew of the trans-polar airship, Norge, which carried 16 men over the north pole and across a hundred thousand miles of unexplored Arctic wastes, came to the parting of the ways here today.

Tonight Captain Amundsen and Scandinavian members of the crew will leave for New York and home. Lincoln Ellsworth, the only American member, leaves for Washington to deliver to President Coolidge the American flag which was carried over the pole.

Umberto Nobile, now an Italian general because of the successful trip, will take five other members of the Italian crew to San Francisco, probably leaving Tuesday. The Norge is still at Teller, Alaska, where it probably will be brought out by boat.

RADICALS REFUSE TO APPROVE DEBT PLANS

Finance Minister Callaux of France Informed Proposal is Rejected

PARIS, June 28.—(UP)—Radicals in the house of deputies, nominally the Briand government's strongest support in the lower house, today decided it could not approve the Mellon-Bavenger debt funding agreement in its present form. During today's cabinet session a delegation representing the radical deputies called on Finance Minister Callaux to inform him of their decision. Callaux is believed to be in sympathy with the radical attitude.

McGee's Store is Holding Big Sale

McGee's dry goods store is planning a material reduction in the stock of all dry goods and will devote more space to ready-to-wear goods, starting early this fall, according to announcement by J. H. McGee. As a result, he is now conducting a gigantic stock-reducing sale in order to provide space for a heavy shipment of ready-to-wear goods.

City Pipe Line To Be Repaired

All city water of the upper system or high ground of the city will be shut off tonight from 9 o'clock until about one o'clock tomorrow morning, according to announcement today by Earl Hopper, city water superintendent. This interruption of service is necessitated while a pipe line in the canyon is being repaired. All water users in the upper system are urged by Mr. Hopper to prepare for this four-hour halt in the service.

ASHLAND ART SCHOOL DRAWS PUPILS HERE

Annual Summer Course Gets Under Way at Junior High School

OFFER GOOD COURSE

Belle Cady White of Pratt Institute, New York, in Charge of Work

With the students here from Seattle, Portland, San Francisco, Los Angeles and other coast cities, the Ashland School of Art got under way at the junior high school building this morning under the direction of Miss Belle Cady White, an instructor in the Pratt Institute of New York, and one of the foremost artists of the country.

Assisting Miss White are Emily Grace Hanks, Miss Ethel Weightman and Felix Payant.

Many Register

The morning was devoted to registration and an explanation of the course, while the actual instruction was started this afternoon. The school will continue until the latter part of July.

A complete course in art work is offered by Miss White and her corps of teachers, the work in a large measure is being practically the same as that given in the noted Pratt Institute in New York. Students attending the local school will be given instruction in commercial art, head and figure work for art supervisors and high school teachers, landscape work and decorative and realistic work in both water colors and tempers.

Brings Exhibits

Miss White has brought with her complete exhibits of work which were completed last year at Pratt Institute and in the high schools of New York city, thus giving the students this summer the advantage of this advanced art work in the nation's art center.

Approximately 25 students registered for the summer's course this morning, while others are known to be enroute to Ashland from neighboring cities and states to take advantage of this attractive course.

EARTHQUAKE CAUSES WIDESPREAD DAMAGE

Hundreds of Houses Torn Down by Tremor in Mediterranean Basin

ROME, June 28.—(UP)—Earthquakes throughout the eastern end of the Mediterranean basin yesterday caused widespread damage. 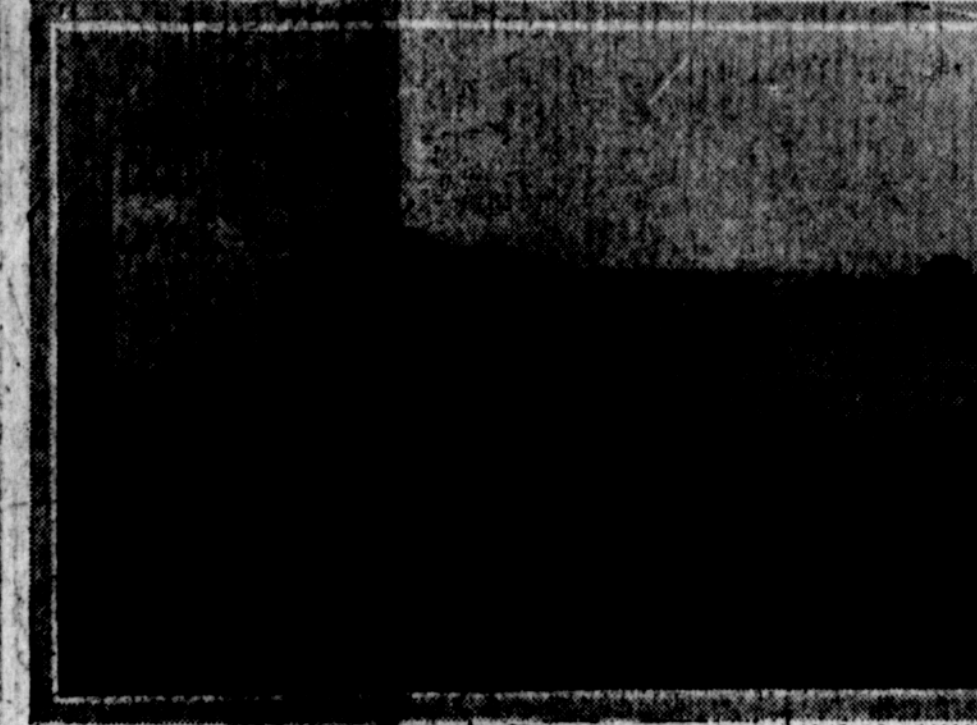
Gets Big Salary From Dry Forces

Poor old Klamath Falls, which continually suffers from too much temperance, is worried again. Every so often some rascally-brained tin-can auto tourist rumbles into that city and proceeds to put up a wall about receiving wrong information concerning the highway into Klamath Falls, and always, Klamath Falls can see, or pretend to see, a lot of malice on the part of Ashland, Medford and some more of the states in this part of the state.

Last week some motorist was advised that the road had recently been closed between Keno and Klamath Falls and he would have to drive with caution over this last 12 miles into "Spotted Town." When he arrived at Klamath he is reported to have said he was informed that the road was impassable and had been advised to stay away from that hustling town.

As a result, Ashland, Medford and a few other towns are accused of slander, malice and other unfriendly acts, according to a newspaper story in the Klamath Daily News.

SEARCH FOR WEAPON WHICH WAS USED TO SLAY SEATTLE GIRL

Officers Unable to Find Automobile Crank Belonging to Father

SEATTLE, Wash., June 28.—(UP)—While an inquest was continuing today into the slaying of Sylvia Gaines, 22, Smith College graduate, who was murdered here June 16, a more spectacular development loomed as a possibility with the search for the weapon used to kill the girl.

The murder occurred on the shores of Green Lake, where a bloody rock was found. The vicinity is being searched for the weapon. The search started after officers failed to locate the crank of an automobile of Wallace "Bob" Gaines, father of the slain girl.

SEATTLE, Wash., June 28.—(UP)—"Bob" Gaines, father of murdered Sylvia Gaines, will take the witness stand at 1:30 today at the coroner's inquest. A fight to get Louis Stern, a friend of Gaines off developed between the coroner and sheriff. Deputy Coroner Jones wished to examine him while Sheriff Matt Starwick wanted to keep him silent for fear it "would spoil my case if he talks."

Stern is the man with whom Gaines spent much of the evening of June 16, the night Sylvia was murdered.

PUGET SOUND GREET'S LARGE BATTLE FLEET

First Two Units Swinging at Anchor Today in Elliott Bay, Seattle

SEATTLE, Wash., June 28.—(UP)—The first two units of the Pacific fleet are swinging at anchor today in Elliott bay. The Oklahoma arrived yesterday while the destroyer McCauley and hospital ship Relief went to the Bell street dock.

The fleet will assemble as one of the largest fleets of fighting vessels ever seen in Puget Sound between June 30 and July 6th. In the fleet will be the battleships Maryland, Oklahoma and several destroyers and Eagle boats, as well as the dreadnaught California at Bremerton.

CANADIAN PREMIER QUILTS HIS OFFICE

Mackenzie King Resigns When Request to Dissolve Parliament Refused

MONTREAL, Canad., June 30.—(UP)—Premier Mackenzie King of Canada, resigned today. His government has been under fire for a week in parliament as an outgrowth of the Canadian-American border smuggling situation.

FOUR PEOPLE SLAIN BY "AXE MURDERER"

Greshams Find Made at Tampa, Florida, Home Early Today

TAMPA, Fla., June 28.—(UP)—An "axe slayer" battered four persons to death here early today. B. W. Rowell, 46, a carpenter, his mother, his nephew, Tru Rowell, 20, and a niece, Lena Rowell, 16, were the victims. The first three bodies were found in the Rowell home by a neighbor. Mrs. Rowell was still breathing when found but died shortly after.
