SUSPECTS IN TRAIN HOLDUP UNDER ARREST

Three Men Held at Danville, Ill. for Siskiyou Tunnel Dynamiting

MEAGER INFORMATION

Local Authorities Get No Direct Word Concerning Men Who Are Held

DANVILLE, Ill., June 26. — (UP)—Three men believed to have been implicated in the dynamiting and holdup of the Southern Pacific train at Siskiyou tunnel, south of Ashland, Ore., three years ago, were under arrest here today.

The suspects are Otis Alexander of Texas, William Marty of the state of Washington and Cecil Nelson of Oregon. The men were with a carnival company when taken into custody. They denied they were implicated in the hold-up and murder.

DANVILLE, Ill., June 29. — (UP)—That Marty would confess before night was the belief of Chief of Police Ryan. The prisoner when grilled today told the chief he would "talk when the time came." Chief Ryan is confident that the men held are those wanted in Oregon. Samples of their hand-writing are being rushed to Oregon.

Although no direct word of the arrest of the suspects was received by Chief of Police McNabb today other than that contained in the United Press dispatch, authorities in this part of the state have always suspected that there might have been others implicated in the robbery in addition to the three DeArment brothers.

JUROR BRIBER SENT TO FEDERAL PRISON

Paul Bradshaw of Portland Given Five Years by Federal Judge Bean

PORTLAND, Ore., June 29. — (UP)—Paul Bradshaw, who was convicted of attempting to bribe a juror during the prosecution of the Smith brothers and Arthur Christiansen in the prohibition conspiracy trial, was sentenced to five years at the federal prison at McNeil Island yesterday afternoon when he appeared before Federal Judge Robert S. Bean.

LINE OF MARCH FOR BIG PARADE TO START ON VAN NESS

Many Entries Promised for Monday, According to Parade Committee

One of the largest Fourth of July parades that ever swung into the line of march in Ashland is the promise of the parade committee of the Kiwanis club as a result of a committee meeting last night.

Not only are many civic, fraternal and church organizations going to have floats in the parade, but many private cars will be entered, but committee has been promised.

The parade will form on Van Ness avenue, facing North Main street, starting at 10 o'clock Monday morning. All entries for prizes will be closed at 10.45.

The line of march will be from Van Ness to North Main and thence out the Boulevard to Morton street and back to the Plaza where it will disband.

All cars are urged to enter at Helman and North Main from which point they can be properly placed according to classification in the line of march.

BRITISH ADMIRALTY WILL NAME VESSELS

LONDON, (UP)—The British Navy has again returned to the traditional naming of submarines in place of the letter-number method following the outbreak of the war.

The change in the method of naming submarines is the result of a growing sentiment in Naval circles in connection with underwater craft. An Admiralty official said: "It is felt that since the submarine has increased in size and fighting power and has taken its place beside other types of warships, they should bear names as other boats do."

School Children Become Thrifty

NEW YORK, (JP)—School boys and girls of the United States now have upward of \$30,000,000 on deposit in school savings banks it was disclosed today by Arthur H. Chamberlain of San Francisco, who tomorrow will preside at the opening of the National Congress for Thrift at Philadelphia.

"In the last decade remarkable progress has been made toward planting in the minds of America's younger generation a repugnance for waste and a respect for thrift," said Chamberlain.

"During the school year just closed approximately 8,000,000 boys and girls received thrift instruction. School savings systems became available to nearly 4,000,000 pupils, and were taken advantage of to the extent that, according to our preliminary estimates, their aggregate balance, including deposits and accrued interest, overtopped the 30 million dollar mark."

Fugitive Slain By Armed Posse

COALGATE, Okla., June 29.—After holding a posse of 40 armed men at bay for more than two hours tonight, Emmet Bales, former grocer at Tupelo, Okla., was shot and killed by members of the posse.

Earlier in the day, Bales kidnaped John Simpson, manager of a wholesale grocery here, and held him captive in a house on the outskirts of Coalgate.

Pneumonia Takes Gerald Beaumont

HOLLYWOOD, Cal., June 29.—Gerald Beaumont, noted for his short stories on race track and sporting life, died here after a long illness of pneumonia.

GRASS BLAZE MENACES BIG ASHLAND AREA

Several Acres Burned at Noon Today, Starting on Vista Street

NOW UNDER CONTROL

Fire Department and Volunteers Have Hard Fight With Flames

A grass and brush fire which for a time threatened to prove serious broke out at noon today near the J. H. McGee home on Vista and was not full under control for more than an hour.

With a brisk wind blowing from the north, the flames spread rapidly and jumped the high drive, eating their way through the dry grass and brush toward Carter Heights.

Fire apparatus made a quick run and aided by a large number of volunteer workers, the fire finally succeeded in staying the billows of flame.

More than 60 feet of hose were used in combating the fire, while workers under Fire Chief Baughman were building fire trenches and watching the smouldering fire at various points this afternoon.

Had the fire spread beyond control of the fire fighters numerous homes in that section of the city probably would have been destroyed.

SEATTLE GIRL WILL GO TO PENITENTIARY

Ethel Dow, University Co-ed Sent to Prison for Stealing Clothes

SEATTLE, Wash., June 29. — (UP)—Ethel Dow, 24, University of Washington co-ed, must spend the next six months to three years in the state penitentiary at Walla Walla because she loved fine clothes and stole them.

Judge Robert M. Jones imposed that sentence late yesterday afternoon after considering the case for nearly a month. Lorenzo Dow of Tacoma, father of the girl and former prosecuting attorney of Pierce county, began a dignified plea for her liberty but emotion forced him to stop.

Conservative to Form New Cabinet

OTTAWA, Ont., June 29. — (UP)—Rt. Hon. Arthur Meighen, conservative leader, has informed Governor-General Byng that he will undertake the responsibility of forming a new cabinet following the resignation yesterday of Premier McKenzie King. Meighen may be sworn in today.

Deakin Seeking Realty License

A hearing on the application of J. J. Deakin for a license as a real estate dealer was conducted at the Lithia Springs hotel today by W. M. Mullins, deputy real estate commissioner. Following the hearing Mr. Mullins announced his decision would be announced from Salem within 10 days. A score of witnesses gave testimony both for and against the applicant.

Nevada Murderer Is Found Guilty

VIRGINIA CITY, June 29.—Joe Goretti was found guilty of murder in the first degree by a jury today. He was convicted on circumstantial evidence, charged with the killing of Paul Peaniti, who disappeared three years ago and whose decapitated remains were recently found in an abandoned well.

H. McArthur, secretary to Senator Nye, an entry in the republican senatorial race in North Dakota.

Italy to Repair Napoleon's Villa

FLORENCE, (UP)—Villa San Martino in Elba, where Napoleon lived during the Elban exile is to be restored and repaired at the expense of the Italian Government following the initiative taken by the Fascist deputy, Esio Gray. Deputy Gray who visited the island of Elba in order to preside at the recent Fascist congress held there was struck by the state of abandonment and disrepair into which Napoleon's villa has been allowed to fall.

LINCOLN, Ill., June 29.—(UP) How Abraham Lincoln used the core of a watermelon which he squeezed in his hand until the water trickled through his fingers to the ground, to christen the town of Lincoln, Ill., during the sale of the first town lots in 1833, is related by John L. Stevens, of St. Louis, former resident of Middletown, and a great admirer of the martyred president, who he knew intimately when he was but 13 years old.

'BOB' GAINES IS HELD FOR GIRL'S DEATH

Father of Sylvia Charged With Murder at Seattle This Afternoon

WARRANT IS ISSUED

Arrest Follows Extended Probe Into Seattle's Slaying Mystery

SEATTLE, Wash., June 29. — (UP)—Prosecutor Ewing D. Colvin this afternoon announced that a warrant is being issued for the arrest of Wallace "Bob" Gaines as a result of the investigation of the mysterious slaying of his daughter Sylvia.

This action came after Sheriff Matt Starwich and deputies spent almost two weeks working on the theory that the father himself might be guilty of her murder. Sylvia was slain on the night of June 16th. The body was found the following morning on the shores of Green Lake where the girl had been beaten to death.

Gaines was charged with the murder shortly after the warrant had been issued and the murder information filed in superior court.

Blood Spot Found
SEATTLE, Wash., June 29. — (UP)—A large blood spot on the wooden basement floor of the home of Wallace Gaines was attracting attention of authorities today in their investigation of the murder of Sylvia Gaines, 22, a daughter of Wallace Gaines.

The spot was discovered among varnish stains and sent to Luke S. May, criminologist, who pronounced it blood, although he said he understood the blood was shed by Sylvia's mother when she tried to commit suicide last fall.

The inquest was adjourned until 2 o'clock this afternoon. It is understood that officials are preparing for an arrest.

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Ratification of Agreement Halted

PARIS, June 9.—(UP)—Ratification of the Mellon-Berenger agreement for refunding the French debt to the United States will be delayed, Premier Briand announced at a meeting of the chamber of deputies today.

Tacoma Woman is Killed in Crash

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., June 29. — (UP)—Mrs. Benjamin Knowlton, 23, was killed and her mother and sister, Mrs. M. H. Coombes and Marie Coombes, were seriously injured in an automobile crash here late last night. They are residents of Tacoma.

Find Three Dead in Summer Home

LAKEPORT, Cal., June 29.—(UP)—Riddled by revolver bullets, the bodies of Lynn McLaughlin, 29, employee of the state institution for the blind at Portland, and his wife Janet, and seven-year-old son were found yesterday in the bedroom of the wife's Lakeport home. Officials pronounced it murder by McLaughlin who then killed himself.

SCORES OF EDITORS IN CALIFORNIA FOR NATIONAL SESSIONS

Business Meetings Start on Wednesday; Many Sighting Junkets

LOS ANGELES, June 29.—(UP)—California tomorrow will begin the formalities attending its duty as host to editors from 31 states and Alaska. The National Editorial association opens its 41st annual convention here tomorrow.

Two special train loads of eastern publishers will arrive in the morning from a sightseeing tour of the citrus belt, which began two days ago at El Centro.

Governor Theodore Christensen, Minnesota, and Governor Harry Byrd, Virginia, both newspaper publishers, are among the delegates scheduled to participate in the convention. Both will bring large delegations.

Vivic organizations throughout the state have cooperated with the Southern California Editorial association in arranging entertainment for the visitors.

The entire delegation will leave for San Francisco after the final business session of the convention July 2. Five days are to be devoted to sightseeing in northern California, after stops at Ventura and Santa Barbara.

NED HARRELL PASSES NAVAL EXAMINATIONS

Ashland Youth Becomes Full-Fledged Midshipman, Says Telegram

Mr. and Mrs. Joe Harrell last night received a telegram from their son, Ned Harrell, announcing that he has passed the required physical examination at Annapolis, and is now a full-fledged midshipman at the United States Naval Academy. Young Harrell left here two weeks ago for Annapolis after passing his mental examinations in this state.

During the summer months the new midshipman "plebes" are given a course of instruction in the first rudiments of seamanship on Chesapeake bay. The four-year course of study will start this fall after the upper classmen return from their summer cruise.

ROSEBURG SAWMILL DESTROYED IN FIRE

Loss of \$15,000 Reported With No Insurance; 10 Men Out of Work

ROSEBURG, Ore., June 29.—(UP)—The William Janzar sawmill near here was in ruin today as the result of a fire of unknown origin late yesterday. The loss was placed at \$15,000 and there was no insurance. The mill had a daily capacity of 10,000 feet and employed ten men.

Aimee Semple McPherson Outlines Specifications For Her Ideal

TO TAKE LONG REST
Evangelist Goes Into Seclusion for Week Before Taking up Work

LOS ANGELES, Cal., June 29. — (UP)—Aimee Semple McPherson prepared today to go into seclusion for a week before resuming charge of Angelus Temple.

The evangelist said she wanted to avoid all rumors. "I am tired of the gossip and untruths," she said. "I am willing that every angle of the mystery be investigated, but I feel that more can be accomplished by a few people in Los Angeles who are not envious of my success."

Marriage Proposals
Hundreds of mail order suitors are proposing marriage to the returned evangelist, it was disclosed today. But Mrs. McPherson declares she is not interested, but for those who are courting her are six specifications she outlines as her "ideal." They are:

"He must be a preacher of the gospel. He must be good looking, preferably a blond. He must be six feet tall, or thereabout. He must be an eloquent orator. He must play the slide trombone, and not the saxophone."
