BONDS VOTED FOR KLAMATH RAIL VIADUCT

Voters Are Almost Unanimous in Favor of Big Civic Improvement

TO START WORK SOON

Southern Pacific to Defray Half the Cost of \$125,000 Crossing

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., June 30.—(UP)—For the first time in her colorful history Klamath Falls was as a unit yesterday when the voters went to the polls and authorized a \$62,000 bond issue for the construction of an overhead crossing on South Sixth street where The Dalles-California highway crosses the Southern Pacific tracks.

The vote was 1225 for the bond issue, with only 21 votes in opposition. Both Klamath Falls newspapers supported the measure, which is in itself something of a record for this scrapping community.

The Southern Pacific has agreed to pay one-half the cost of the viaduct with the city paying the other half. It will cost approximately \$125,000.

The railroad company now has its engineers and a crew of workmen on the ground ready to proceed with the work, and it is reported that actual construction will get under way within the next few days.

TOURIST TRAVEL TO COAST TO BE HEAVY

Traffic Experts in Portland Say This Will Prove to be Record Year

PORTLAND, Ore., June 30.—Excellent tourist travel in the Pacific northwest this summer was predicted in Portland yesterday by two capable authorities—A. B. Smith, passenger traffic manager of the Northern Pacific railroad and Floyd S. Judah, partner of the Peck-Judah Tourist company of San Francisco.

Mr. Smith, here from his railroad's headquarters in St. Paul, declared that the volume of tourist traffic now flowing to the coast at this time last year. Improved agricultural conditions in the mid-west and east have enabled more persons to enjoy trips, he stated.

Mr. Judah came here with a party being sent through the northwest by his company. He stated that the absence of big national conventions on the coast this summer enabled the "home folks" to do more traveling since they were not kept at home entertaining visitors. He believes an unusual number of Californians will visit the Pacific northwest.

OILING OF CRATER LAKE-HIGHWAY NOT TO BE UNDERTAKEN

Direct Word From Highway Body States That Work Will be Delayed

Despite contrary reports yesterday in Medford, oiling operations will not be started on the Medford-Crater Lake highway at the present time. This is direct word received from the office of the state highway commission in Salem today.

Medford reports yesterday were to the effect that the oiling of the highway had been started between Trall and Medford, but the highway commission sends word that no oiling has been done and probably will not be done during the present summer months.

A halt in the oiling plans was made because of the heavy tourist travel to Crater Lake, and it was generally believed that oiling operations at this time would discourage many motorists who otherwise would visit Oregon's big national park.

LITHIANS WILL HOLD DANCE THIS EVENING

Larry Simpson's Noted Orchestra Will Furnish Music for Event

A special public dance will be given at Lithia park this evening under the direction of the Lithians, with Larry Simpson and his famous players' orchestra furnishing the music. Simpson and his musicians have been retained to remain here the rest of the week and furnish music for the regular Saturday night dance by the Lithians in the city park open-air pavilion.

NEW CABINET FOR CANADA IS FORMED

Hon. Arthur Meighen Names Ministers for Temporary Government

OTTAWA, Ont., June 30.—(UP)—Hon. Arthur Meighen was sworn in late yesterday as new prime minister of Canada. He formed his cabinet and will carry on a temporary administration until the next general election.

New ministers appointed are: Sir Henry Drayton, acting minister of finance and of railways, and canals; H. H. Stevens, Vancouver, B. C., acting minister of customs, trade and commerce; R. J. Manion, acting postmaster-general, and minister of health and labor; Hugh Guthrie, acting minister of defense and justice and George Perley, acting minister of public works.

Lightning to be Timed by Bend's Forest Lookouts

BEND, Ore., June 30.—(UP)—Holding a stop-watch a lightning will be one of the duties of fire lookouts in the Deschutes national forest hereafter. Time will be taken from the flash to the thunder. This time is translated into a distance of 1100 feet for each second elapsed and the direction taken by the lightning noted. This data will make possible the accurate plotting of the resultant forest fire, it is believed.

FORMER AGENT HELD IN JAIL AS HI-JACKER

M. E. Dawes, Ex-Special Officer, Carried His Bluff Too Far

STRANGE STORY TOLD

Victim of Boozie Thieves Defies Them and All Three Go to Jail

PORTLAND, Ore., June 30.—(UP)—M. E. Dawes, former special officer, and an accomplice, Mike Flangel, alleged hi-jacker, as well as Ulrich Kilbourne, a reputed bootlegger, are all in jail today because Dawes carried a bluff too far.

The two hi-jackers confessed that they had obtained money and liquor from Kilbourne by impersonating officers. Kilbourne became doubtful and later defied Dawes to take him to jail.

Dawes answered the defy by taking Kilbourne to the court house where he swore out a warrant for the man's arrest on a liquor charge. Kilbourne told his story and all three were jailed.

Two Youths Escape State Reformatory

Sheridan Boys Climb Down Fire Escape and Leave Without Shoes

SALEM, Ore., June 30.—Floyd Franklin and Clyde Cornett, wards of the state training school for boys, made their escape from that institution early yesterday morning by breaking a window in the second story and making their way down a fire escape. Franklin is 16 years of age, five feet, eight and one-half inches tall, weighs 146 pounds, light complexion, blue eyes. He was sent to the institution from Sheridan about three months ago. Cornett is 18 years old, weighs 140 pounds, is five feet, ten and one-half inches tall. Neither had shoes, coat nor hat. He was also sent up from Sheridan.

Lightning Starts California Fires

One Known Dead and Heavy Property Damage Caused by Forest Blazes

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., June 30.—(UP)—Forest fires raged in nine central and northern California counties today, with immense property damage and one known dead.

At least 500 fires were started by electrical storms and are burning in Siskiyou, Marion and Tuolumne counties. Guy Wilson, fighting a Siskiyou county fire, was trapped and burned to death.

LIQUOR INTERESTS SPENDING LARGE SUM

Half a Million Dollars Each Year Used to Combat Prohibit Laws

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 30.—(UP)—The Association against Prohibition is raising and spending \$500,000 annually. William H. Stayton, founder of the wet organization, told the senate committee today. Contributions are accumulating at the rate of about \$40,000 a month, which is being spent for working for a change in the present dry laws, Stayton said.

PRISONER ESCAPES FROM COOS COUNTY BY LEAP FROM TRAIN

Man Caught in Billings Jumps From Fast Train Above Marshfield

MARSHFIELD, Ore., June 30.—(UP)—Leaping from a Pullman window of yesterday morning's train from Portland while the latter was travelling 35 miles an hour, Frank Lawson, bad check man whom Deputy Sheriff Sam Malhorn was escorting here from Billings, Montana, eluded his captor and escaped into the hills near Hauser.

With less than 20 miles separating him from the Coquille jail, where he was destined to be confined the much sought for swindler of North Bend business men, apparently took a long chance and made his get-away, at least for the time being. Deputy Sheriff Malhorn believes that Lawson will be recaptured soon, however, as he is without any clothes, without food and without money.

IMMENSE CARGO OF WHEAT IS SHIPPED

Grain Valued at Nearly a Million Dollars Leaves Portland Today

PORTLAND, Ore., June 30.—Almost a million dollars worth of wheat left Portland for the export trade today. The Belgium ship, Menopier, the British ship Vulcan City and the French ship Montana left with a total of 614,129 bushels valued at \$883,184. According to the Merchants' Exchange report the wheat exports for the month will total 4,000,000 bushels.

Effort to Change Booze Law Beaten

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 30.—(UP)—A proposal to increase federal prohibition enforcement funds by \$100,000,000 was made in the house yesterday afternoon by Congressman La Guardia of New York and then promptly voted down. Besides the Guardia's motion, an attempt of wets to eliminate the entire deficiency item for prohibition and to eliminate the fund for under cover agents was overwhelmingly defeated.

Grocery to Have Its Own Delivery

Beginning Thursday morning July 1, the Plaza Grocery will have its own delivery service, according to Thomas Hill, proprietor. A Ford commercial truck was purchased by the Plaza Grocery recently to enable it to make its own deliveries. Four deliveries will be made each day with orders limited to \$1 or more. Deliveries will be made at 8 a. m., 10 a. m., 2 p. m. and 4 p. m.

PROBE IS RENEWED

Arizona Authorities Asked to Conduct Another Search for O.M. Black

LOS ANGELES, Cal., June 30.—(UP)—An old fashioned Bon Ton corset may hold the clue leading to a solution of the Aimee Semple McPherson kidnaping story.

Deputy District Attorney Joe Ryan is making an extensive check today of Pacific coast stores in an effort to learn where the corset worn by Mrs. McPherson had been sold. The corset is of a special style sold only in five or six coast stores.

If the saleslady is located she will be asked to view the rouge's gallery in an attempt to identify the alleged kidnapers.

Douglas, Arizona, authorities have been asked to make another search for the shack in Mexico where the evangelist is alleged to have been held. The place as yet has not been located.

THREE PROFESSORS CHOSEN AT OREGON

Romance Language Staff Increased, Says Official Announcement

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Ore., June 30.—Two assistant professors and an instructor have been appointed to teach in the romance language department, it was announced today by Karl Onthank, executive secretary of the university. Leavitt O. Wright, assistant professor, will teach Spanish; S. R. Wadsworth, assistant professor, will teach French. L. A. Woodworth, graduate assistant, will teach romance languages.

Mr. Wright recently completed his second year of graduate work at the University of California. Mr. Wadsworth in 1920-21 won a fellowship from Strassburg university, France.

Explosion Kills Forty Soldiers

BERLIN, June 30.—(UP)—A shell explosion during military maneuvers at Kovel, Poland, resulted in a large loss of life today, according to dispatches from Warsaw. At least 40 soldiers were killed and 38 wounded, dispatches stated.
