PROGRAM FOR CELEBRATION MADE PUBLIC

Independence Day Observance Starts With Patriotic Address Sunday
PARADE BIG FEATURE
Monday's Activities Will Be Crowded from Morning Till Late at Night
The complete program for the Independence day celebration in Ashland was announced today by the general Fourth of July committee. The celebration starts Sunday with patriotic ceremonies at the Chautauque building where the patriotic address will be given by Rev. H. F. Pemberton.
On Monday, July 5th, the street parade will be the chief morning feature. It is scheduled to start promptly at 11 o'clock.
From noon until 2 o'clock there will be a program of sports in Lithia Park, where the crowds are expected to enjoy picnic lunches.
At 2:30 in the afternoon will come the baseball game at Jackson Hot Springs, with the Ashland baseball club meeting the Mt. Shasta team, now leading the Northern California league.
There will be a band concert during the afternoon in the park as well as dancing in the open air pavilion under the auspices of the Lithians.
Dancing, music and the big fireworks display will be the features for Monday evening.

CRATER LAKE GETS HEAVIEST TOURIST TRAVEL THIS YEAR

Advance Traffic is Greater Than Ever Before, Says Col. Thomson
KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., July 1. — In advance of the official opening of the Crater Lake National Park more than 14,000 persons have passed through the three entrances on the east, south west, to view the beautiful creation of nature. This announcement was made last night by Colonel C. G. Thomson, who is at the park making final preparations for the summer season of 1926, to be officially opened Thursday.
"All formalities will be cut down this year at the formal opening due to the strenuous road program," stated Colonel Thomson last night.
"All travel records have been broken so far and the roads will be without detours after Thursday when the park is opened. The trail to the lake has been improved and opened, the boats will be functioning normally.

BIG BUILDING PROGRAM WILL GET STARTED

Ten New Edifices Will Be Constructed in Washington, D. C., Soon
GETS APPROPRIATION
Total of \$165,000,000 Allowed for Work; Senator Smoot Hopeful
WASHINGTON, July 1. — (UP) — Ten great new buildings to house thousands of government workers, who now labor here in flimsy, ramshackle temporary wartime structures, are to be built in the next five years.
Fifty million dollars has been made available for it in the \$165,000,000 public buildings bill passed by congress and Sen. Reed Smoot, Republican, Utah, chairman of the public buildings commission, today promised it would bring a more beautiful capital city.
Smoot Gets Busy
Smoot expects construction to start within a year and if he is re-elected to the Senate he will see them all completed before the end of his next term.
Due to a provision that not more than \$1,000,000 can be spent in a single year on one building, it is expected that several will be under construction at the same time. A maximum of \$10,000,000 may be spent in the District of Columbia each year.
Smoot's commission has made no promises as to which departments will have the right-of-way on construction, but the department of justice, commerce, agriculture, and a building for government archives, especially the important state department records, are considered to have preference, and sites have been tentatively decided on.
All the new buildings, with the exception of the proposed U. S. supreme court building, additions to the government printing office and some warehouses, will be built south of Pennsylvania ave. in the "ellipse" district, carrying out as far as possible the plans of Major Charles Peter L'Enfant, the Frenchman who laid out the capital for George Washington.
In Leased Buildings
High rents, will be in this district, which is near to the Washington Monument and Lincoln Memorial.
The justice department will face Pennsylvania avenue across the street from the great treasury building. The commerce department will be a neighbor. The agriculture department is to have a modern building on its hilltop site a stone's throw from the Washington Monument. The government owns these three sites already, although a theatre and several business houses will be eliminated to make room for them.
The archives building will be placed near the National Museum about halfway down Pennsylvania avenue from the treasury to the capitol. A site must be acquired.

SMALL GIRLS ATTACKED BY SEATTLE MEN

Unusual Wave of Beastiality Breaks Out as Result of Gaines Case.
THREE ARE ARRESTED
Revolting Crimes Reported to Police During Night; 4th Man Sought
SEATTLE, Wash., July 1. — (UP) — A wave of unprecedented beastiality swept through Seattle last night with the result that three men are under arrest facing charges of attacking little girls, while the fourth man is being sought.
Authorities declare it is the psychological reflection from the brutal slaying of Sylvia Gaines, for which her father, "Boi" Gaines, has been officially charged with murder.
Adolph Walters, 37, was arrested on complaint of his wife who accused him of molesting his own two small daughters, aged 10 and 11 years. Carl J. Peoples, 49, was arrested on a charge of attacking an eight-year-old girl who had wandered into his yard. Thomas H. Thomas, a coal miner at Black Diamond, was arrested at Enumilaw on a charge of pursuing a six-year-old girl. Another small girl was attacked here by a man who is still at large.

SUPREME EFFORT TO ENFORCE NATIONAL BOOZE LAW STARTED

Dry Czar Andrews Given Huge Sum of Money in Big Liquor Drive
WASHINGTON, D. C., July 1. — The government today began a supreme effort to enforce national prohibition when \$3,000,000 became available for use against rum runners.
Dry Czar Andrews plans to put about 900 new agents in the field in a new drive against organized bootlegging.
He also has an appropriation of about \$11,000,000 to carry out the general provisions of the Volstead act.
With this increased amount of money available, prohibition authorities here are hopeful that the drive against the illicit liquor trade can show immediate gratifying results.

DRY LEADERS START FIGHT ON DR. HALL

New President of State University is Storm Center of Hot Battle
PROBE IS DEMANDED
Reported Reputation of 18th Amendment Drive's Wife of Prohibition Forces
PORTLAND, Ore., July 1. — (UP) — Dr. Arnold Bennett Hall, president-elect of the University of Oregon, is the storm center of a state prohibition controversy today as dry organizations were considering his reported reputation of the eighteenth amendment.
Dr. Hall was quoted as saying at Iowa City, Iowa, that national prohibition is wrong, and that it was either a state or local question.
The Anti-Saloon League, the Portland Ministerial Association and the Dry Legion of America adopted resolutions demanding that the board of regents investigate the alleged remarks of the new university president.
The resolutions set forth that he is unfit to serve as head of the state's university if he made the statements as quoted from Iowa City.

SALVATION ARMY IS REAL AID TO GIRLS

Envoy Lillian Gray, Here for Drive, Tells of Rescue Activities
The White Shield Home, located in the suburbs of Portland, is one branch of Salvation Army social service work that reaches out to women and girls in every county of Oregon, according to Envoy Lillian Gray who is here collecting for the Home Society fund of The Army.
"To many the White Shield is simply a maternity home where misguided girls are cared for during their trouble. Some go further and condemn a movement to shelter girls who have done wrong. But there is more to the work of that splendid social service hospital and home than the physical care of girls gone wrong."
This is the way Mrs. Gray puts it—earnestly and convincingly.
"Just the fact that 95 per cent of the girls who enter The White Shield 'make good' should answer the questioning mind of any doubter who feels that young girls should be kicked down instead of helped up when they make their serious mistakes—and those who do not give thought to the innocent children brought in to the world through such mistakes on the part of girl mothers," she states.
"To begin with, these girls are treated with understanding and with kindness—which always seems to surprise them. They become accustomed to the real happiness that comes from a Christian life. Gradually their

FRANCE NOT READY TO PAY HER DEBTS

Another Crisis in Cabinet Looms as Result of New Developments
PARIS, July 1. — (UP) — Three important developments in the French crisis stand out prominently following the first official appearance in parliament of the tenth Briand ministry.
First, ratification of the Beauger-Mellon agreement for settlement of the French debt to the United States is now definitely postponed. Secondly, it has been revealed that France has been forced to appeal for foreign financial aid in the same manner that she appealed to her friends for military aid during the world war. Finally, as a result of Tuesday's developments, another cabinet crisis appears probable.
