TO PROSECUTE VIOLATORS OF WATER RULING

Special Inspectors Hired to Keep Close Watch on all Consumers

SUPPLY IS SUFFICIENT

Earl Hosler Denies Rumor That All Water Will Stop After Next Week

Following reports of several flagrant violations of the new water restrictions, special inspectors were put on the job today and will make a careful check of all water consumers. It was announced this morning by Earl Hosler, superintendent of the municipal water department.

Mr. Hosler made it plain that the water hours will be rigidly enforced and all persons detected using water in violation of these hours will be prosecuted in the city court.

Can Pull Through

"If consumers will obey these regulations to the very letter I feel sure that the supply will be sufficient to carry us over the dry period," he said. "It is possible that we may have to make other restrictions, but from the present outlook, we will not have to shut off the water completely. Observance of the rules will mean sufficient water for gardens and lawns during the rest of the summer."

SOUTHERN PACIFIC ANNOUNCES CHANGES

Resignations and Promotions Alter Staff Organization of Railway

Several changes in the traffic organization of the Southern Pacific have been announced by William Sproule, president. These are incident to resignation of T. M. Schumacher, vice-president in charge of traffic at Chicago, who has accepted the chairmanship of the executive committee of the Western-Pacific and of the Denver & Rio Grande railroads.

Other changes incident to the reorganization in San Francisco will be the retirement September 1 of G. W. Luce as freight traffic manager, to be succeeded by J. T. Saunders of Los Angeles. Luce is ill.

STANFIELD'S TAX MEASURE IS APPROVED

Jackson County to be Reimbursed for Money Lost in O. & C. Grant

LARGE SUM INVOLVED

Junior Senator Now Ready to Gain Further Relief for This State

Senator Stanfield's bill to reimburse 18 Oregon counties for taxes lost when the Oregon and California grant lands reverted to the government, was passed by congress last night, according to a telegram received by The Tidings this morning from Senator Stanfield.

For More Relief

With this bill finally passed, Senator Stanfield, during the few remaining months of his tenure promises to devote his efforts toward procuring for Oregon 40 percent of the money received from the sale of these Oregon and California land grant lands, which would give the counties additional revenue.

Senator Stanfield's telegram to The Tidings follows:

"Congress last night passed my O. and C. tax relief bill. The enactment of this law should give an average tax relief of approximately 20 percent of taxes now assessed in the 18 counties in western Oregon. Tomorrow I shall introduce an amendment to the Chamberlain-Ferris law providing that the 40 percent from the receipts of the sale of the O. and C. lands, which now under the provisions of the law goes to the reclamation funds shall be divided equally between the state of Oregon and the counties wherein the land grant lies, and hope that during my brief remaining tenure as chairman of the public lands committee I will have time to provide this further relief.

Head of Local Land Settlement Work is Confined to His Bed Today

Mr. Foster came in contact with the poison oak Wednesday while out on land settlement work with Olin Arnsperger, manager of the Palout irrigation district. Within a few hours after he had handled some of the poisoned brush his eyes were swollen shut and he was suffering from much pain.

During the time he is incapacitated from work, F. M. Carter is handling his work here.

HIKERS MAKE CHEAP CROSS-COUNTRY TRIP

Mother and Two Daughters Travel 3000 Miles for \$6.66 Each

PORTLAND, Ore., July 2. — A journey of 3,000 miles at a cost of \$6.66 per person was the feat accomplished by Mrs. Desrae Anest and her two daughters, Phyllis, 13, and Sirela, 12, who have arrived in Portland from Newark, N. J.

In spite of this low cost the hikers didn't miss a meal and slept in a bed every night.

A valuable asset to the travelers was a ukulele which was played by Sirela while her sister danced the Charleston.

Mrs. Anest was headed for her former home, Marshfield, Ore. She said she had tired of the east and although the family had but \$20 they put on hiking suits and started.

They were on the road but 14 days as many long rides were given them.

Three Burned to Death in Blaze

TWO DEAD AND TWO DYING IN AUTO TRAGEDY

Tacoma, Wash., Man and Wife Killed in Accident South of Grenada

YOUNGSTERS MAY DIE

Spending on Sharp Curve Held Cause of Fatal Crash Late Wednesday

YREKA, Cal., July 2. — Antonio Anderson, Tacoma, Wash., contractor, was instantly killed, his wife Marie Anderson, was fatally injured and two of their three children are expected to die as the result of an auto crash on the state highway two miles below Grenada late Wednesday afternoon.

Mrs. Anderson died a few hours after the tragic accident. Their daughter, Elaine, aged 4, and son, Seth, aged 12, are still unconscious, while the other daughter, Marguerite, aged 10, is still suffering from shock and calling for her parents.

Anderson had a clear road when he approached the curve at Roy's farm. According to witnesses he was making at least 45 miles an hour as he swung into its crescent. The marks of his wheels show that he was hugging the inside of the road and that one wheel slipped into the soft gravel. For at least 50 yards he struggled to get it back on the hard road. At last with a sudden swerve the car swept back onto the road, skidded, turned almost a complete somersault, and rolled into the ditch, throwing little Elaine clear of the wreckage.

Anderson, cut by glass from the windshield crushed by the weight of the car, the steering wheel a mass of jagged spokes that impaled his body, died almost instantly. His wife, her head crushed and body a bruised mass, was brought to the county hospital, where she died unconscious a few hours later. Little Elaine and her brother, Seth, are likely to die and only Marguerite seems to have a fair chance of recovery.

Sulphur Water to Be Used on Lawn

Harry Harrison of the Claycomb Motor company decided he would beat the summer water shortage and get a home-grown supply for his lawn and garden. Consequently, he started digging a well yesterday. After it got down eight feet, 18 inches of which was through rock, water began to shoot through, and within a few hours he had nearly five feet of water. The water has a trace of sulphur in it but will do admirably for lawn purposes.
