ASHLAND WILL STAGE GREAT CELEBRATION

City in Holiday Attire For Two-Day Observance Starting Sunday

FEATURES OUTLINED

Patriotic Service Tomorrow; Monday to be Busy Day For Everybody

Ashland today is in gay holiday attire in readiness for the big two-day celebration of Independence Day. Streets and store fronts are alive with patriotic colors, while scores of workmen are busily engaged in preparing floats for the big parade which will be the morning feature of the day.

The official program will get under way at the Chautauqua building at 4:30 tomorrow afternoon with the patriotic ceremonies, to which all citizens and visitors are invited. Rev. H. P. Pemberton, pastor of the First Methodist church, will deliver the patriotic address. Special music will be furnished by the Crater Lake D. P. K. K. band.

For those who enjoy sports there will be a baseball game at the Jackson Hot Springs park, starting at 2:30 tomorrow afternoon, although the game is not included in the official program for the day. Grants Pass will meet the Ashland team.

Parade Monday

The parade, of course, will be the chief feature during the day Monday. The parade will form on Helman street, just off North Main, at 10 o'clock Monday morning, at which time the various divisions will be placed in line and numbered for the convenience of the judges. All entries for the parade will close promptly at 10:45, and the line of march will start promptly at 11 o'clock.

The parade will swing down Main street, where it will turn and come back over the same route to the Plaza, where it will disband.

From the noon hour until 2 o'clock picnic lunches will be enjoyed at Lithia park, with a band concert starting at that hour. There will be a program of children's games and races from noon until 2. There will be dancing during the afternoon and evening in the open air pavilion at the park under the auspices of the Lithians.

At 2:30 Monday afternoon will be the baseball game between the Ashland club and Mt. Shasta.

FIRECRACKER BAN WILL BE ENFORCED

Chief of Police McNabb Warns People Against Use of Fireworks

Chief of Police McNabb today urged that all parents be warned against permitting their youngsters to play with fireworks. There is a city ordinance which forbids it and the police will exercise every precaution to see that the law is rigidly enforced.

A federal law prohibits the shooting of firecrackers on any public road or in any forest reserve.

Laborite Takes Rap At Royalty

POSSES FAIL TO GET TRACE OF CONVICTS

Four Men Who Fled Prison at Salem Yesterday Still Missing

IN BROAD DAYLIGHT

Climb Over North Wall in View of Guard Towers; Many False Reports

PORTLAND, Ore., July 3. — An S. P. and S. conductor told officials today that three of the escaped convicts from Salem had boarded his train early today at Coos, Wash., paying their fares to Cascade where they left the train.

SALEM, Ore., July 3. — (AP) With every available man pressed into service with several posses, the man hunt for the four convicts who escaped over the north wall of the state prison yesterday afternoon was being vigorously prosecuted today. Up to a late hour this morning no trace of the fugitives had been uncovered.

The men escaped late in the afternoon with a sight of three guard towers. They got over the wall by using a ladder and later cut a hole through the wire entanglements which was the last obstacle in their flight for freedom.

The escaped men are Richard Moore, Elliott Michael, Richard Franzen, all of Multnomah county, and Walter Fisher of Jefferson county. All are men under 25 years of age and had served but a small time of their sentences for assault while armed with a deadly weapon. All were serving 10 years except Fisher, who was serving 15 years.

The men are thought to have fled from Salem in a Ford car which was reported stolen. They have been reported at Woodburn, Oregon City and various places along the Pacific highway, but there is no definite trace of them. They were not armed when they left the prison.

Bryan Paid Big Amount By Drys

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 3. — (UP)—The late William Jennings Bryan received \$11,000 from the Anti-Saloon League in 1919 for making dry speeches, according to the testimony of Wayne H. Wheeler before the senate investigating committee yesterday afternoon. The league, which is the virtual framer of the Volstead law, also paid R. P. Hobson, "father of the dry amendment," \$173,249.68 since 1914.

SHIPPING BOARD TO AID GRAIN EXPORT

Vessels Will be Placed at Disposal of Shippers Now, in Word

WASHINGTON, July 3. — The Shipping Board has decided to place immediately at the disposal of grain shippers 27 vessels and to condition 28 others at a cost of \$300,000 in 90 days to take care of anticipated record crop shipments.

This action followed urging of Secretaries of Commerce and Agriculture Hoover and Jardine before the board, at the instance of President Coolidge that it would be disastrous for American farmers if needed bottoms were lacking to move their crops.

S. P. TERMINAL AT KLAMATH FALLS TO BE BUILT SHORTLY

Preliminary Work is Now Under Way; \$800,000 Plant to Rise

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., July 3. — As evidence of the fact that the Southern Pacific is prepared to rush construction on the local \$800,000 terminal and yards is the fact that work was begun this morning by the Sawmill Engineering and Construction company on a bridge at Esplanade and Main.

The bridge will support a narrow gauge track which will be used by dirt trains in hauling filling material to the yard and terminal site.

By the time formal permission to proceed with the work is received from the state rail commission, the Southern Pacific will be in a position to begin filling operations at once.

The bridge is being constructed for the Utah Construction company, which has the filling contract.
