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## NEW PARALLEL PARKING PLAN DISCONTINUED

City Council Votes to Return to Old Head-in-Angle System Here

### NOTE IS UNANIMOUS

Delegation of Business Men Win Fight For Traffic Rule Change

Head-in-angle parking returned to Ashland last night like a lost sheep returning to the fold. After a delegation of Main street business men had appeared before the council and urged discontinuance of the recently adopted parallel parking, the council, with Councilman Burdick as its chief spokesman, voted unanimously to return to head-in parking on Main street. The change back to the old system will be put into effect just as soon as the police department gets a new barrel of yellow paint and re-marks the parking lines.

Hardy is Spokesman  
J. H. Hardy, president of the Kiwanis club, led the delegation of business men from both East and North main street. Without exception, they declared that parallel parking is working a real hardship on them and they felt that the city could well afford to return to the head-in parking system.

"We have no intention of starting a fight with the council," vouchered Mr. Hardy. "As business men we have simply come here to you to plead our cause. If it should be your decision that parallel parking should be continued we will abide by your ruling."

Similar sentiment was expressed by Henry Sanders, Jr., T. H. Simpson and Sam McNair.

Mayor Urges Caution  
Although Mayor Johnson urged the council to continue the present system for a week or two until a complete investigation could be made, Councilman Burdick thought the wishes of the business men should be followed and his version was upheld by all other members of the council.

Both Chief of Police McNabb and Fire Chief Baughman declared that the present parallel parking system is safer than the other plan, especially in case of fires. Both said they had no other interest except to safeguard the public.

## STUDENT SOLDIERS ENTITLED TO BONUS

Supreme Court Holds Members of S. A. T. C. Were U. S. Soldiers

SALEM, Ore., July 7. — (LP) — Members of the student army training corps are entitled to the privileges of the Oregon state bonus law, according to a supreme court opinion handed down here. In a test case the court held that the provision excluding the students from the bonus is unconstitutional and that students of the army training corps were a part of the United States army.

Referendum by Voters on Nov. 2 Ordered by Vote of City Council

The resolution was prepared by City Attorney Briggs at the request of council members, and it was adopted without argument of any kind and by unanimous vote of the council.

After a rattlesnake had struck at Patrick Patterson, night operator at the railroad station, the fire engine was called out. The firemen burned a field which contained a nest of the reptiles and then extinguished the blaze. Fire department heads are perfectly willing to rush out on calling clanging songs when someone sees a poisonous reptile, but they warn that there must be no false alarms. ## NEGLECTS RAID WHEN FOREST FIRE STARTS

Prohi Sleuth Gives up Liquor Search to Help Save Trees

WEED, Cal., July 5. — (LP) — How a federal prohibition agent came to raid, but remained to fight fire was related here by the officer, W. E. Corley, enforcement head for Siskiyou, Shasta, Modoc and Lassen counties. Corley was on his way to serve a warrant on a brewery reported operating near here. As he was driving from Yreka to the alleged brewing plant the structure caught fire. The flames, Corley said, first destroyed his prospective evidence and then spread to the nearby brush and timber. Forest rangers gave Corley a shovel and a grub hoe and told him to go to work.

## CITY COUNCIL BATTLES WITH CLYDE MALONE

'Barred Door' Session of City Dads Results in Verbal 'Scrap'

### NOBODY IS INJURED

Councilman Taylor Kicks on Bills Submitted; Mayor Also Fights

Storm clouds which have been hovering over City Manager Malone and members of the city council broke last night when the council went into executive session by barring newspaper representatives and the public generally and then went to the bat with the city manager.

Three verbal indictments were brought against City Manager Malone by Councilman Taylor, chairman of the finance committee, but according to reports emanating from those who held ringside seats, the battle was a draw and nobody got hurt.

### Taylor Objects

During the open session of the council, Councilman Taylor announced that his finance committee had failed to approve three bills as submitted by the city manager. One of these was for lumber. Another was for an electric fan and the third was for a set of shock absorbers for the city manager's new Chevrolet coupe. "I don't think we should discuss these in public," offered Mr. Taylor, who asked the council to exclude the public while they battled it out with the city manager.

Shock Absorbers Needed  
The electric fan, it developed according to reports, had been purchased for the city manager's office during the hot spell last month. The shock absorbers, it was hinted, were attached to the coupe in order that the city manager might weather any attacks on him by the council. The lumber bill was for a bridge the city manager had been ordered to build.

Then, to top it all off, it developed that the city manager had retained an engineering expert to make a survey of the city's possible water supply, starting next Monday. Councilman Taylor thought the city manager should have advised with the finance committee and council before going ahead with his water survey plans.

## SALARY OF POLICE JUDGE ELIMINATED

Council Votes to Put City Official on Fee Basis From Now On

One city official lost his salary but retained his job last night when the city council, at the behest of the finance committee, passed an ordinance doing away with the \$50 per month salary of the police judge. By suspension of rules and without a dissenting vote the council introduced and finally passed an ordinance eliminating the salary and putting the police judge on a fee basis, the same as is paid a Justice of the peace in Oregon. It was declared to be an economy measure because of the small amount of business transacted by the office.

The bid of the Ashland Sand and Gravel company for furnishing crushed rock for the C street improvement was accepted. Its bid of \$1.63 per yard was the only bid received. Calvert, Calvert and Schroeder were awarded the contract for putting in the new curb and gutter on C street. They bid 80 cents per lineal foot for the work. The bid of M. J. Olson of 74 cents per foot was rejected because it was incomplete.

## ABDUCTION STORY IS TO BE SIFTED BY GRAND JURORS

Mrs. Aimee McPherson and Others Subpoenaed by District Attorney

LOS ANGELES, Cal., July 7. — (LP) — Subpenas were served Aimee Semple McPherson and 13 other persons today, preliminary to the grand jury investigation of her kidnaping story. In addition the Mexican officials of Agua Prieta, a Mexican village where Mrs. McPherson made her dramatic reappearance, have been requested to appear. The decision to have the grand jury sift every phase of the story came as a result of a conference between District Attorney Asa Keyes and Chief of Detectives Herman Cline. Not only Mrs. McPherson, but her mother, Mrs. Minnie Kennedy and others who figured in her disappearance, will be called before the grand jury. The district attorney said the case is being brought before the grand jury on the theory that Mrs. McPherson's story is true. Every angle of the case will be considered, he said.

## MUSTARD PLASTER STARTS QUARREL; OLD CRONY SLAIN

DAWSON, Y. T., July 7. — In a lonely cabin 106 miles from here, Harry Davis put a hot mustard plaster on the chest of his friend, Charles H. Smith, who had a bad cold. The mixture was so strong that it blistered Smith's skin and the two old friends fell to quarreling. Finally Davis hit Smith over the head with a club and killed him. Although he pleaded self defense, Davis has been sentenced to life imprisonment for manslaughter.

## 3167 TOURISTS IN PARK DURING JUNE

## PROBERS WILL INVESTIGATE IN ILLINOIS

Senate Primary Committee Completes Pennsylvania Inquiries

### LAST WITNESS HEARD

Western Manager for William S. Vare Tells of Campaign Funds

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 7. — (LP) — The senate primary investigating committee today closed its four weeks inquiry into the \$3,000,000 Pennsylvania primary campaign and adjourned to meet in Chicago on July 29, at which time it will present a probe into the expenses of the Illinois primary.

The Pennsylvania probe was closed with the testimony of Representative Morin, west state manager for William S. Vare, who won the republican senatorial nomination.

Morin, who had been long sought as a witness, told how he handled about \$46,000 in cash for the Vare campaign, paying off workers for Vare in the western counties of Pennsylvania. He denied there had been any violation of the primary law so far as his connection with the winning candidate was concerned.

The Illinois investigation is expected to produce similar results as the one which covered the Pennsylvania senatorial fight.
