FORMER LOCAL WOMAN BADLY HURT IN AUTO

in Portland

BRIDE OF AN HOUR

Was Returning From Vancouver
Marriage When Car Goes
off Grade

Within an hour after her marriage at Vancouver, Wn., last night, Mrs. O. J. Bruett, formerly Mrs. Cleo Mast of this city, was seriously injured in an automobile accident in an automobile accident as was returning to Portland. Mr. and Mrs. J. L. Barnhouse, parents of the injured woman first learned of the accident through a United Press dispatch to The Tidings and planned to leave immediately by auto for Portland to be at the bedside of their daughter. According to the Portland dispatch, the car went off the grade at the Portland end of the Interstate bridge and turned over. Mrs. Bruett was caught beneath the wreckage. Her condition this morning was said to be critical. Other members of the wedding party were only slightly hurt. The injured woman had lived in Ashland for years but had been in Portland for the past two years.

KLAMATH CHICKENS ARE SLAIN DURING HEAVY HAIL STORM

Kessler Ranch Near Kamoo
Has Loss of 750 Fowls
in Few Minutes

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., July 8.—Seven hundred and fifty blooded chickens were killed in a terrific hail storm which struck the Kessler chicken ranch, located just below McCollum's mill on the Klamath river Tuesday evening. Hail stones the size of walnuts crashed down on the chicken yards, spreading instant death among the huddling fowls, none of which were able to reach shelter before they were pelted to death by falling chunks of ice. This is the first time in the history of Klamath county that a loss of this kind has been sustained in such proportions. The Kessler chicken ranch, which had been doing a good business selling products in the Klamath market, was practically wiped out of springers in a few seconds' time.

OREGON CAVES, Ore., July 8.—Ashland visitors at the Oregon Caves resort over the holidays and past week-end were: Mrs. W. C. Gibson, C. E. Inghram, John Inghram, Mrs. Ella Oxford and Roy S. Yoder. These people made the trip through the caves and all reported good times. Many tourists are using the new Redwood highway to the coast as the improvements are rapidly being opened to travel. With the exception of a few miles of construction work between Kerby and Selma the road from Grants Pass to Crescent City and the Oregon Caves is in perfect condition. With 1466 persons already registered and making the trip through the caves during the first six days in July this month starts as a record breaking month. July 5 was the heaviest day of the season with 362 persons making the trip through the caverns and many others coming up to the resort to get away from the heat of the valley.

PENNSYLVANIA PRIMARY COST LARGE AMOUNT

Nearly Three Million Dollars
Spent by Republican
Candidates

REVISED LIST SHOWN

Senate Committee Experts Give
Out Total Used by All
Concerned

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 8.—The Pennsylvania primary last May cost \$2,793,583.02, according to a revised list announced today by accountants in the employ of the senate primary investigating committee. William Vare, the successful wet republican senatorial nominee, spent \$800,143.60, the accountants' tabulations showed. Senator Pepper, who was defeated for re-nomination, spent \$1,844,971.25; it was revealed. Governor Gifford Pinchot spent \$188,469.17 in his pre-primary campaign. These figures are somewhat in excess of the amounts originally tabulated.

REFORESTATION IS SHOWING PROGRESS

Long Bell Company Replants
150 Acres of its Logged-
Off Land

LONGVIEW, Wash., July 8.—Some 50 acres of logged-off lands have already been replanted with trees of various species by the Long-Bell Lumber company in pursuing its reforestation program, which is still on an experimental basis. The most unique of the plantings was the setting out of approximately 20,000 two-year-old Redwood trees over 75 acres. A five-acre area was planted to Port Orford cedar, while another plot of 70 acres was planted direct from seed with a variety of species. In addition about 1,600,000 seedlings have been planted in the company's nursery at Ryderwood, not far from the location of the reforested areas. It is hoped by John B. Woods, chief forester for the Long-Bell Lumber company, to have 1,000 acres of logged-off lands reseeded or reset next year. A Douglas fir will develop from seed to a tree from 18 to 24 inches in diameter in about 50 years, according to Woods. Other of the soft wood trees show a similar growth.

Prison Break in Seattle Foiled

SEATTLE, July 8.—(UP)—A carefully planned jail break by 35 prisoners in tank number 3 in King county jail was foiled today when an investigation and search of jail conditions revealed that two chilled steel bars and a screen on the tank had been sawed completely through and only two outside bars and another screen remained between the group and liberty.

New York Strike Enters 3rd Day

NEW YORK CITY, July 8.—(UP)—For the third consecutive day New York went about its business today impeded but far from paralyzed as a result of the strike of subway motormen and switchmen on lines carrying 2,000,000 people daily. The company affected, the Interborough company, announced that it is well pleased with the situation.

Governor Fires Liquor Officer

SALEM, Ore., July 8.—(UP)—The commission of W. W. McMills, special state prohibition officer, was revoked yesterday afternoon by Governor Pierce, following the arrest of McMills at Roseburg on a charge of drunkenness. McMills has been doing prohibition work in Klamath county.

Lumber Mill in Portland Burned

PORTLAND, Ore., July 8.—(UP)—The Northern Pacific lumber mill burned to the ground here early today with an estimated loss of \$50,000. The mill had been idle for two years and had been condemned as a fire menace.

Marshall Dana is Given High Honor

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., July 8.—(UP)—Marshall N. Dana, associate editor of the Oregon Journal, was elected president of the Pacific Coast Advertising Clubs association at a meeting here today. Portland was named for the 1927 convention.

Franco Remero, a long term prisoner, turned the thumb screws in the vice while the gruesome machine tightened until his breath could no longer pass.

Former Traffic Cop is Pinched

ROSEVILLE, Cal., July 8.—When Myron Lacky was a Placer county officer he was tough on speeders. So numerous victims, whom he had arrested for speeding and violation of other traffic regulations, chortled gleefully when Lacky was arrested here for driving through Main street 35 miles an hour. "Lacky didn't care whom he arrested," one of his friends said, "in telling about his record. He probably would have arrested himself when he was a traffic officer if he found himself violating some law."

Brother John is Willing to Face Insanity Charge

SAN FRANCISCO, July 8.—"Brother John," whose surname is Nash, and who styles himself the Israelite Messenger of God, has returned to the United States, willing to face the chance of being locked up on insanity charges. "Brother John" has been confined twice because people got the idea that he was a "little off," he declared today upon arrival from Honolulu, where he engaged in a two-year preaching campaign. Barefooted and bareheaded, "Brother John" was dressed in loose white robes, and carried a banner perched on the end of a six-foot staff. A trumpet was slung about his neck.

Wild Wine Orgy Results Fatally

COLOGNE, Germany, July 8.—(UP)—Five persons are dead, 20 are in Cologne hospitals and a ship on which the 25 were traveling on the Rhine was wrecked as the result of a wine orgy aboard the vessel when it was nearing Cologne. During the drinking bout, two fell overboard and were drowned and one was killed in a fight. Two died later from delirium tremens.

Sister Asks For Brother's Freedom

LINCOLN, Neb., July 8.—(UP)—Leta Ringer, 16, appeared before the state pardon board here to plea for the life of her brother, Donald, who is sentenced to be executed Friday for a murder which he committed at the age of 19. Donald was convicted of killing Carl Moore, a Hastings automobile salesman, in 1924.

Head of Prohi Enforcement Work Wants to Tighten Smuggling Net

WASHINGTON, July 8.—After announcing plans for intensified enforcement and denying that he intends to resign immediately, Assistant Secretary of the Treasury Andrews left yesterday for London to negotiate an agreement for further suppression of rum smuggling. "Rumors of Andrews' imminent resignation have been current here for several days. He indicated a few days ago that he was disappointed at the failure of congress to extend the enforcement powers contemplated in the Goff bill and that he would resign probably in the fall. Today the report was circulated that he had resigned. But after a conference with Secretary Mellon he denied this.

Los Angeles Will Annex Small Town

LOS ANGELES, Cal., July 8.—Los Angeles is due for an overnight increase of population to the number of 10,000. The city of Bell, peopled with approximately three square miles, recently voted almost two to one to cast its lot with the mother city. The district involved lies in the industrial section southeast of the city bordering on Huntington park.

3 Suspects Are Nabbed in Texas

SAN ANTONIO, Texas, July 18.—(UP)—Four men suspected of being the ones who dynamited the Ashland at the Siskiyou tunnel in 1923, were arrested here today. Three of them resemble the three DeAutremont brothers, officers declared.

Detroit Lumber Yard is Burned

STUDENT BODY IS ORGANIZED THIS MORNING

Southern Oregon Normal
School Activities Given
Official Start

TO ELECT OFFICERS
Constitution Submitted Today;
Will be Ratified and Meet-
ing Monday

The first student body organization of the Southern Oregon state normal school got under way officially today when a previously appointed committee of constitution and by-laws submitted an extensive report and a complete draft of the proposed constitution. Copies of the constitution will be placed in the hands of all students and the meeting for its ratification will be held next Monday. At that meeting the first set of officers to guide the destinies of the student body also will be selected. Members of Committee Miss Augusta Parker, a teacher of Klamath Falls, was chairman of the committee which drafted the constitution. Other members were Mrs. Cora Burns of Portland, Mrs. Eva Harris of Grant county, Mrs. Norma Reeder of Ashland and J. F. Burkhardt of Marshfield. The constitution provides for a president, vice-president and secretary. It also provided for a board of directors which will be composed of these three officers, together with one representative from both the junior and senior classes and two faculty members. An assessment fee of \$1 is charged against all students and the beginning of each quarter and this is the only student body assessment which will be made during the school year. All student body activities will be under the direct supervision of the officers and directors.
