FILTERED SUNSHINE DECLARED HEALTHFUL

WOOSTER, Ohio. (UP)—Experiments conducted at the Ohio Experiment Station here indicate that sunshine filtering through window glass, upon infants and invalids fails to build health and vitality.

Dr. R. M. Bethke, conducting the study, is using three groups of baby chicks, a hundred to a group. Each group is housed and fed exactly alike—the only difference being in the sun porches attached to each of the three houses.

One sun porch is covered with window glass; a second with a substitute for glass, and the third with an ordinary wire screen. Results carefully kept and recorded by Dr. Bethke have revealed that the group of chicks kept under the wire screen and the glass substitute, are even in size and all healthy and scratching.

But the group securing its share of Old Sol's rays, strained through the window glass, is a sore and motley crew—some, larger, some smaller than others, many of them sickly, puny, weaklings, and almost all of them afflicted with "stiff-legs" or rickets, causing the to fall over themselves as they walk.

The lesson to be found from these tests, Dr. Bethke points out, is that window glass prevents the passage of the all-important ultra-violet rays, necessary to life and health.

"Sun parlors, especially where they are to be used for babies," Dr. Bethke advises mothers, "should have on section of some other substance than glass through which the sun's rays can reach the infant direct. The crib can be moved as the sun passes westward."
