BAD CHECK IS DOWNFALL OF KLAMATH MAN

Laundry Employe Gives Reported Bad Paper for Expensive Sedan

WARRANT IS ISSUED

Employers Have Books Audited Following Disappearance of Worker

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., July 9.—A warrant for the arrest of Paul J. Joubert, bookkeeper and cashier of the New City Laundry, was sworn out last night by J. H. Brett, proprietor of the Overland-Knight Sales Co., following the alleged disappearance of Joubert on Monday, July 5, with a Willys-Knight sedan, the property of Brett's garage.

Joubert is alleged to have tendered the Overland-Knight company a check on a Portland bank for approximately \$2500 in payment for the car, the check subsequently being reported of no account by the institution upon which it was drawn.

Wanted Special Car

On July 5 Joubert is said to have entered negotiations with the local auto concern for a new Willys-Knight sedan. The particular type of car desired by Joubert was not available on the sales floor of the garage here at the time, so it is claimed, Mr. Brett stated he would obtain one of the machines from an agent in Ashland or Medford.

Joubert is said to have shown unusual anxiety to obtain immediate possession of a car, finally stating that he would try out a demonstrator sedan in Mr. Brett's possession, and if the car was satisfactory he would buy it.

Then Disappears

Joubert was given the car and, it is said, has not since been seen in Klamath Falls.

An audit of Joubert's books at the New City Laundry is being made today by officials of that concern.

Joubert had been employed here about two months. He was a native of South Africa and the son of a Boer general, killed in the Boer war, he told acquaintances.

He represented himself as having extensive property interests in Southern California.

HENRY ENDERS ALMOST GETS HIMSELF IN BAD; MISTAKEN IDENTITY CAUSE OF MIX-UP

Ashland's police force almost had a real job on its hands yesterday, and Henry Enders, Jr., figured he came dangerously close to the city's "hoosegow" as the result of a practical joke that proved a bit too practical.

As Mr. Enders entered the Citizens' Bank he noticed a woman standing by the window counter whom he took for Mrs. John Fuller, wife of the chamber of commerce secretary. On the desk beside her lay a well-filled hand bag and purse.

Thinking he would play a joke on her, Mr. Enders grabbed up the hand bag and purse and started to walk away with it. The woman noticed his "light-fingered" act and turned a startled and frightened gaze upon him.

To his horror and amazement, Mr. Enders discovered it was a case of mistaken identity. He had grabbed up the purse of a stranger!

Before the woman could shout for the police or bank officers for help, Mr. Enders returned the "loot" with profuse apologies and explanations.

The near-victim of his own joke confessed quite solemnly this morning that he now knows how it feels to possess the haunted fear of the criminal and that from now on he will be ready—aye, anxious—to walk the straight and narrow trail.

COOLIDGE IS PLEASED WITH ECONOMY PLAN

Federal Budget for Next Year is Somewhat Lower Than This Year

DEMOCRATS PROTEST

Claim is Made That Present Administration is Real Spendthrift

WASHINGTON, July 9.—Appropriations for the normal running expenses of the government during the current fiscal year ending June 30, 1927, total \$3,046,483,929, a slight reduction below last year.

This figure includes an appropriation of \$738,805,303 for the post office department which will be repaid by postal receipts, leaving the net cost of the federal government for the current year at approximately \$2,300,000,000.

Fabulous Figures

The total appropriation figure of \$3,049,483,929 compares with \$3,063,705,332 for last year, showing a slight reduction in operational cost. In addition, the government this year expects to apply \$1,392,000,000 toward reduction of principal and payment of interest on the public debt as against \$1,329,000,000 last year.

These figures are regarded by those having to do with the fiscal affairs of the government as indicating satisfactory progress in holding down the total cost of the government.

However, the democratic national committee, takes exception to some of the administration economy claims. A statement issued by headquarters of the committee here lets appropriations for the district of Columbia as having been \$24,466,000 the year Coolidge became president and this with the appropriation of \$33,918,571 just made by congress for the current fiscal year.

"Expenses of many states, counties and cities can and should be reduced" the committee says. "But the federal government is still the greatest spendthrift of them all. A million is a bagatelle in budgets nowadays."

President Coolidge in his recent budget address, said the government payroll in Washington has been reduced 5000 in the last year at a saving of \$8,000,000 a year.

Despite the agitation for farm relief, appropriations for the department of agriculture were reduced from \$126,075,000 to \$137,924,573 this year.

Expenses for national defense went up slightly. The Navy department's appropriation was increased from \$302,862,000 last year to \$319,659,075. The army was increased from \$339,765,000 to \$342,609,000.

TOURIST TRAVEL TO CRATER LAKE BREAK ALL RECORDS

Early Opening, Together With Splendid Record, Brings Visitors

The growing popularity of Crater Lake National Park is reflected in the figures showing the heavy travel which has already set in to Oregon's national playground! Up to the evening of July 8th 7,567 cars entered the park bearing 24,491 visitors as compared with 2,670 cars and 9,468 visitors on the same date last year. This increase is due largely to the early opening of the park, but day after day travel this year is exceeding last year's figures for the same date by about 40 per cent.

All records were broken on July 4th when 945 cars bore 3,339 people through the park gates, almost exactly double any previous record. This throng was handled without even minor mishap. A large number of people are going on to Diamond Lake after their stay in the park. There is a heavy increase in travel over the Dalles-California Highway to Bend and thence via the beautiful McKenzie Pass. The completion of this road forms another fine scenic loop through Crater Lake National Park and this year has brought a 60 per cent increase in travel through the East entrance.

The park is functioning in every respect. All roads are open, the nature guide service is organized and all of the usual park facilities in full use. There are no detours whatsoever and there will be non throughout the season. There have been no forest fires within the park, the skies are cool and clear and the daily thermometer range is from 40 to 73 degrees, ideal weather for camping and outdoor recreation.

RUMOR STATES STANFIELD TO ASK ELECTION

Deafened G. O. P. Candidate For Senator May Run as Independent

SEEKS VINDICATION

Success of O. and C. Land Grant Bill Thought to Have Influence

PORTLAND, Ore., July 9.—(UP)—A special dispatch to the Oregon Journal from its Washington, D. C., correspondent says that Senator Robert N. Stanfield, who was defeated for the republican senatorial nomination in Oregon, may run as an independent candidate in the November election for the purpose of seeking vindication from an alleged whispering campaign of personal destruction.

Stanfield was defeated by Frederick W. Steiwer by a substantial plurality, and shortly after his defeat he succeeded in having his tax relief bill on the Oregon and California land grant passed by congress, thus procuring for 18 Oregon counties a sum of approximately \$5,000,000 which was lost in back taxes when the railroad lands reverted to the government several years ago. His success with this bill is said to have considerable weight in his purported intention of seeking election as an independent candidate.

The dispatch states that Stanfield refused to deny or confirm the report when questioned.

ROYALLY ENTERTAINED

LO ANGELES, Cal., July 9.—(UP)—An eyewitness to the purported kidnapping of Mrs. Aimee Semple McPherson has been produced by the Los Angeles evangelist.

He is Harry Swift, who claims he saw the evangelist thrown into an automobile near Venice on May 15th and whisked away by two men and a woman. Swift's story may be told to the grand jury's notorious bandit-murderer Tuesday.

It was decided at a meeting of the post this week. The delegates were given their instructions as to how to vote on various state-wide measures which will come before the convention.

The two new flags for the post have been received and were unfurled this week. One is the post flag and the other is a large American flag.

LOYALTY OF DOG LEADS SEARCHERS TO BODY OF MAN

SAN BRUNO, Cal., July 9.—A dog whose loyalty to his master kept him at a suicide's side for three days finally led police to the body of Augustine Mucchitini.

The man, a ranch helper, went to a nearby grove and hanged himself from a tree. The dog stayed there until hunger forced him to return for food. Then, by his howling, he informed ranch men that something was wrong. Police were called and the dog led them to the body.

PORTLAND, Ore., July 9.—(UP)—Mrs. John T. Moore, wife of Chief Inspector Moore of the Portland police bureau, died yesterday at Port Townsend, Wash., from injuries sustained last Monday in an automobile accident. The Moores, with Inspector Bob Craddock and wife, were on their way to Victoria, B. C., when the car skidded on a bad piece of road near Port Townsend and crashed into a bank. All were injured in the crash. The others will recover.

CHICAGO CROOKED SAYS POLICE IN

CHICAGO, Ill., July 9.—(UP)—Half of Chicago's police force is in the bootlegging business, it was charged by Defense Counsel Eugene McGarry in a brilliant closing argument to the jury in the trial of Martin Durbin, Chicago's notorious bandit-burderer. The case is expected to reach the jury tonight or tomorrow.

WRECKED SUBMARINE GIVING UP ITS DEAD

Five Bodies Taken From Underside of Vessel up to 2 p. m. Today

NAVY YARD, Brooklyn, N. Y., July 9.—(UP)—The submarine S-51 began to give up its dead today. Soon after the noon hour a slow moving morgue wagon drew up to the naval hospital morgue and carried from it the first body recovered from the interior of the wrecked submarine.

Five bodies have been recovered up to 1:30 this afternoon. Secretary of the Navy Wilbur arried soon after 2 o'clock, accompanied by Rear Admiral Plunkett. They drove straight into the yard while the bodies were still being removed.

GAINES TO ATTEND DAUGHTER'S BURIAL

SEATTLE, Wash., July 9.—Wallace "Bob" Gaines will attend the funeral of his daughter Sylvia, whom he is accused of murdering. The daughter's funeral will be held tomorrow evening, it was announced. Gaines, now in jail, was told of the funeral plans and when he announced a desire to attend it was arranged that he should do so under guard.
