COUNTERFEITER THANKS JUDGE FOR SENTENCE

KANSAS CITY, Mo., July 9.—The fascination which Jimmy Nolan, who is 76, found in making ten dollar bills out of ones explains why several times he faced judges. While serving sentence for an

old offense he was visited in the penitentiary at Fort Leavenworth the other day by Samuel M. Carmean, an assistant district attorney, who brought along two indictments.

The indictments accused Jimmy of succumbing to the lure of the greenbacks while in a Missouri county poor farm in 1921 and of stuffing the pockets of crippled down-and-outers with "phony" ten dollar bills.

"Now," said Carmean, "if you come down and plead guilty maybe the judge might be lenient, considering your age."

Jimmy nodded affirmatively and in a few hours he hobbled between guards down the corridors of the federal building and into the court room of Judge Albert L. Reeves.

"What's a sentence to an old bird like me?" Jimmy inquired humorously of his guards.
