STOCKHOLDERS OF NEW HOTEL HOLD MEETING

Finances of Lithia Springs
Hotel Company in Good
Condition

OUTLOOK IS PROMISING

R. W. Price Predicts Bright Fu-
ture; Directors Elect
Officers

Stockholders of the Lithia Springs Hotel company were given assurance that the city's community project is in good financial condition with bright prospects lying ahead, at the annual meeting of stockholders and directors yesterday afternoon.

The financial report of J. H. Hardy, treasurer, showed liabilities of \$199,351.57, with assets of \$274,452.63.

Price Optimistic

Richard W. Price, pastor of the hotel, spoke briefly to the stockholders and predicted that the Lithia Springs Hotel within a short time will be one of the best hotel propositions in Oregon outside of Portland. He called attention to the fact that extensive publicity is now reaping the desired returns. He likewise praised the work of the hotel directors for the cooperation they had given since the day he had taken hold of the property.

Mr. Hardy's report further showed that all of the directors had signed waivers on salaries due them for meetings they attended, thus saving the corporation more than \$1000 in salaries. Directors are entitled to \$2.50 each for every meeting attended. Local firms which supplied furnishings also were generous in waiving the 5 per cent commissions which it was agreed they should have when the project was started.

Waive Commissions

Firms which sold furnishings at cost, without commissions of any kind, were J. H. McGee, H. G. Enders, Jr., Golden Rule Store, Ashland Furniture Company, Swenson, and Peebler, E. R. Isaac and company and Provoost Brothers. This saved the company \$906.84 in commissions. This left the sum of \$1029.75 still due J. P. Dodge and Sons for commissions on hotel furnishings.

Following a decision reached when the corporation was first organized, three of the 10 directors were dropped from the board by vote of the stockholders. Those who retired were T. H. Simpson, Louis Dodge and F. F. Whittle.

Directors Chosen

On motion of T. H. Simpson, the following were named as directors for the ensuing year: H. G. Enders, Jr., J. H. Hardy, V. O. N. Smith, J. W. McCoy, H. J. Tomlinson, O. F. Carson and J. H. McGee.

At a directors' meeting following the stockholders' session, V. O. N. Smith was elected president to succeed H. G. Enders, Jr. J. W. McCoy was chosen vice-president and J. H. Hardy, treasurer. William Briggs was re-elected by the directors as secretary.

ANOTHER STRIKE IS DISCOVERED IN OLD GRANTS PASS MINE

Jewett Property on Mt. Baldy Has New Vein With Rich Assays

GRANTS PASS, Ore., July 14.—Opening up a new vein in the old Jewett mine, four miles from this city on Mt. Baldy, may result in this mine again becoming a big producer. Under lease to a company composed of J. F. Coats and Joe McFadden, this mine is revealing high grade ore, which runs heavy to gold and sylvanite, some assays of the high grade going between \$550 and \$1300.

Prospect work along the new vein is being carried on. This is 16 inches wide at the place where it was struck and carries a large amount of free gold. It was struck on a drift north from the old vein, which has turned out many thousands of dollars. If the vein proves extensive, machinery will be put on the property to handle the ore. The Jewett mine has been working since 1882. Work was abandoned some years ago and was not resumed until this year when the Present company took hold.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., July 14. (UP)—"This telegram is another frame-up," Mrs. Minnie Kennedy declared today in commenting on receipt of a message from Oakland three days after Mrs. McPherson disappeared. "I thought it was a spiritual message and turned it over to the police with the best of intentions."

LOS ANGELES, Cal., July 14. (UP)—District Attorney Asa Keyes announced today that he had learned that a telegram stating that Mrs. McPherson was alive was sent to her mother several days after the evangelist had disappeared from the beach at Venice on May 13.

The wire was sent from Oakland, Cal., and the sender was partially identified as Kenneth G. Ormiston, missing radio operator, who formerly worked at Angelus Temple.

The telegram was sent on the night of May 21. It bore the signature of Dr. Murton, and said: "Daughter O. K. Don't worry. Communication proven. Am signing for J. H. A. whom I believe O. K. Detail in mail." Handwriting experts have declared that the message was in Ormiston's handwriting.

SCHOOL NOT WORRIED AT SMALLPOX SCARE

There is no cause for alarm over the lone case of smallpox which has been reported at the Southern Oregon state normal school, officials of the institution reported this morning. A student from Medford contracted the disease but it was detected and isolated before it could spread generally among the student body. As a precautionary measure, however, all students and faculty members who desire it are being vaccinated.

VISALIA, Calif., July 14.—A tame bear, with an increasing appetite for young fawns and does, came to a bitter end in Giant forest near here.

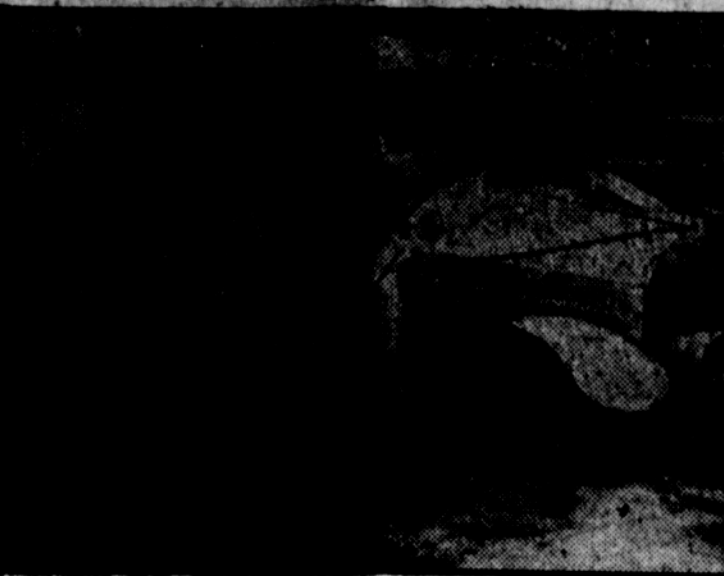

10 FIRES ARE REPORTED IN THIS SECTION

U. S. Forest Office in Medford Tells of Crater Forest Fires

ALL UNDER CONTROL

Umpqua National Forest Has More Than 40 Blazes at Present Time

MEDFORD, Ore., July 14.—(UP)—Four fires on state land and 10 fires in the Crater National forest were reported to the local forest office today. Three forest fires are burning in the Evans creek country and another is flaming between Prospect and Butte Falls. Most of the fires in Crater National forest center around Union creek. They are small and not of a serious nature.

UMPQUA BLAZES

ROSEBURG, Ore., July 14.—(UP)—More than 40 fires are burning in the Umpqua National forest, it was reported yesterday. The fires extend in a belt of about 12 miles. A large force of fire fighters has been rushed there.

KLAMATH PLANS TO BUILD NEW SCHOOL

Citizens Would Purchase Site of One of its Many Court Houses

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., July 14.—The Klamath county court at its meeting this afternoon will set the machinery in motion for the establishment of a Union High school in Klamath Falls, designed to serve not only this city but the surrounding districts of Plevna, Summers and Algoma.

The project has not yet reached the stage of establishing plans or approximating the cost of the proposed building but the Hot Springs court house site is recommended by the committee of Klamath civic clubs who have induced the county court to set the building machinery in motion. An option has been taken on this site from the Klamath Development Company.

LARGE FORCLOSURE JUDGMENT IS GIVEN

City of Astoria Wins Tax Suit Against Big Property Owners

ASTORIA, Ore., July 14.—(UP)—The largest judgment in foreclosure of delinquent street assessments in the history of Astoria was handed down in circuit court today in favor of the city and against the Peninsula Land company and the Title and Trust company. The former was ordered to pay over \$15,000 and the latter \$3000, with attorney fees. O. W. Taylor of Portland is the principal owner of the land.

ECONOMY CUT BY COOLIDGE HITS BOTTOM

Reductions in Government Reach Limit, Report Shows

MILLIONS ARE SLICED

President Trims Figures But Increased Cost Brings High Rate

WASHINGTON, July 14.—Pressure of the Coolidge administration for economy appears to have reached rock bottom so far as government appropriations are concerned and the trend again is upward. This was forecast some time ago by President Coolidge who anticipated that the growth of the country would require gradually increasing federal expenditures regardless of pressure for economy.

Confirms Forecast This forecast was confirmed today by official compilations of appropriations made in the session of congress just ended. Appropriations for the current fiscal year total \$273,693,305.34 more than those for last year, not including postoffice appropriations which are reimbursed by postal revenues.

They show total appropriations for the current year of \$4,409,377,154.15. This is a cut of \$6,802,000 under the budget estimates presented by President Coolidge. "The increase of \$273,693,305.34 for 1927 over 1926 is nothing more nor less than was expected," said Chairman Warren of the senate appropriations committee.

Bottom is Reached "At the close of the second session of the sixty-eighth congress, I called attention to what I believed to be a fact—that reductions in appropriations could not reasonably be looked forward to in the very near future, and that I believed we were then at rock bottom figures, as our appropriations had been gradually coming down since the world war and we were then on a genuine peace basis. Good times and prosperity are immediately reflected in a demand for increased as well as new governmental functions.

Increase Necessary "We have reached a point where increased expenditures are absolutely necessary. It is not economy or sound business sense to permit our barracks and quarters and other government buildings to decay for want of minor repairs and paint. It is not economy to employ people at an insufficient wage. It is not economy to house our army in tents. The time comes for governments as well as individuals to expend their money for their own protection and welfare, not extravagantly but cautiously and with a due regard for the future." Congressman Madden, chairman of the house ways and means committee, estimated that there would be a probable surplus of \$185,000,000 on June 30, 1927, when the current appropriations expire.
