Lecture Given Last Week—
To those privileged to hear the lecture on Art given at assembly Thursday last, at the Normal school, it was a rare treat and well worth the earnest attention and enthusiastic praise given.

Stanley G. Brenner, teacher in the Ashland School of Art and head of the Art Department in Junior and Senior High schools in Saint Marie, California, spoke to the assembled students of the Normal, his general theme being Art.

After a happy introduction, the splendid address, with his topic forcefully presented, followed.

"Art is a quality, not a thing," said the speaker. "It is not relegated to the select few—called artists, but is the highest expression used by any one in any field of endeavor."

"It is the quality that is exhibited between a worker and his material."

"Art is a natural expression of man's desire to create, and is useful and practical as well as beautiful. It is not a man-made training that can be injected into consciousness but a God-given talent that must be developed by study and application."

"The earliest forms of art are found in the caves of France and Spain, and are traceable as far back as six thousand years B. C."

"This art quality should be applied in the form of design to the home, dress, advertising, and to life in general. Design is choice and arrangement."

"Progress and art are almost analogous and the art of any nation is the index to the character, development and lives of the people. All wonderful physical inventions and developments are the result of orderly artistic thought. Examples of these are: the Acropolis at Athens; the Forum and Aqueducts at Rome; the Brooklyn Bridge and all modern inventions."

"For a nation to progress and to hand on a history of real development it must study and apply the 'Art Quality' in every day life."
