TRUTH BEATS FICTION

Colorado Congressman Has Yarns of Old Days That He Can Hardly Believe



Frozen to death in blizzard on July 4

Killed by shot from revolver which he fired

WASHINGTON, July 20.—Fact is so all-fired much stranger than fiction that often it has to be diluted or avoided entirely if the story teller's yarn is to sound convincing.

This somewhat shopworn truth is the practical hard luck of Congressman William N. Valle of Denver, Colo. He takes his relaxation from politics by writing short stories and novels of the western scene. He finds a rich ore of literary material in the gulches, mountain peaks and mining towns of his district, but many of the old legends, Valle believes, are too good to sound true.

Sees Man Frozen

"Take, for instance, the case of a man standing in his office doorway in his shirt sleeves on the Fourth of July and watching another freeze to death," says Valle. "It would take a lot of qualifying and explaining to use that in a story. But it actually happened, and the man who saw the sight was John R. Smith, a Denver lawyer, and friend of mine. It was up at Westcliff, Colo., where the mountains tower very sharply

above the town and one easily sees what is going on at a mile greater altitude.

"On this warm summer afternoon Smith saw two men on the mountain side overtaken by a storm. One kept to the road, the other was confused in the snow squall. They sent up rescuers from the town, and when they got to the second man he was frozen.

"The exploits of expert marksmen and the freaks of accidental shots are even more incredible. In one of my stories I hinge the plot on a remarkable pistol shot. But there was my tentmate, Jack Bahlene, when I was a lieutenant in the national guard on the Mexican border. He would set the sling of his rifle firmly around his arm and fire one or two shots into the bullseye of a target.

Ballseyes, Blindfolded.

"Then he would allow you to blindfold him by holding a card back of the sights on his rifle, so he could not see either the sights or the target. And he would fire the rest of his clip, hitting the bullseye every time. You would turn up your nose at such steadiness if you met it in fiction, wouldn't you?

"One of the best of all is the famous boomerang bullet which actually went its course in a Denver saloon. It missed the man it was aimed at and killed the one who fired it. It took a billiard ball course, ricocheting from two onyx balls and the brass bar rail and back to the heart of its author.

"The old-time mining camps and tough frontier towns developed characters, too, which bordered on the incredible. There was Jack Maynard in Denver. He was a sort of king of the underworld and had a big diamond set in his front teeth, but he died broke." Chapters in the authentic political history of his state are colorful enough, Valle points out.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., July 20. (UP)—Jack Dempsey wants Jim Griffin, veteran San Francisco referee, as the third man in the ring if the champion meets Gene Tunney in the proposed 12-round bout in New Jersey in September. Dempsey has made known.

Dempsey has seen Griffin referee a number of times, and has stated that he considers the San Francisco man to be a very capable official. If Griffin is finally selected he will be the first Californian to referee a heavyweight championship fight since Jack Welch of San Francisco called the breaks for the Willard-Johnson fight in Havana in 1916.

FLOUR COMPANY FIGHTS GRADE CROSSING BILL

Cooperating with railroads to prevent grade crossing accidents, Sperry Flour company has ordered all its drivers to come to a full stop before crossing railroad tracks.

In addition to truck drivers, all salesmen and employes driving company machines will be required to come to a complete stop, with gears in neutral, not less than nor more than 50 feet from any interurban, steam or electric railroad crossing.
