GERMANY DEVELOPS PLAN FOR AVIATION

NEW YORK CITY, July 23.—(UP)—The subway strike ended today when 300 members of the consolidated union went to work in the Westborough yards and agreed to resume work at the old wage scale which existed before the recent strike went into effect.

ous sums on military and naval aviation, Germany is concentrating entirely on the development of commercial aviation.

Forty-five percent of the total capital invested in the recently created German aviation corporation "Lufthansa" is in the hands of the government. The remaining 55 percent is divided between the Junkers company and the Deutscher Aero-Lloyd, whose amalgamation brought the present trust being. Although the exact total of the trust's capitalization has not been announced, it is authoritatively estimated at twelve to twenty million marks.

Both federal and state governments of Germany will be represented on the corporation's board of directors.

ed to the Junkers Company in Persia (whereby many Germans hope to realize in the air the Berlin-Bagdad dream which failed to come true on land) has been ratified by the Persian parliament. It grants a five year monopoly to German aviation. Leaders of British aviation are reported to be disquieted by this expansion of German aerial routes into the Near East.

Reliable estimates of the aviation subsidies to be granted by the German Government during 1926 agree on the figure of 30,000,000 marks.

As a rule, these subventions take the form of a government bonus of approximately 2 marks for every kilometer flown, while the companies' operating costs are about 2.90 per kilometer.

This clearly indicates that commercial aviation is still far from being a paying enterprise. More than two-thirds of the costs must be met by German taxpayers.

In the first eleven months of 1925, Junkers airplanes also are

said to have flown 4,500,000 air kilometers. Junkers and Aero-Lloyd together are believed to have covered a distance exceeding 5,000,000 kilometers. This would yield a direct federal bonus of 10,000,000 marks.
