

### SAILOR OBSERVES HIS RESURRECTION

SAN FRANCISCO, (UP)—Peter Hansen has celebrated his "resurrection" through no irreverent fancy. Thirty-eight years ago he experienced what observers concluded was death, and he has celebrated his "resurrection" every June since.

As usual, he was host this year to a select few members of the "St. Peter's club." This name, too, is significant.

At each "resurrection" time Hansen, now secretary of the Masters, Mates and Pilots of the Pacific, turns back to a June day in 1858.

Peter Hansen, sailor, was gripping a rope with his feet and one hand, while with the free hand he painted the sides of the cage. Peter was none too sure of his hand at his feat. He had imbibed with great enthusiasm the night before.

Suddenly he hurtled into the water 22 feet below. Whether he missed his grip or his footing, or whether the rope broke, is not known.

His fellow sailors made frantic efforts to bring him to the surface. They dived, threw ropes and life boats, but Peter remained at the bottom.

Thirty-four and a half minutes later, after someone had obtained a grappling hook, Hansen was pulled to the surface. To all appearances he was dead.

With an inherent stubbornness he still appeared dead an hour or more later when coroner's men arrived. But the sailors who labored over the inert form refused to relinquish their companion, waterlogged and "dead" though he was.

It was about five hours after they had recovered Hansen from the water that the coroner's deputies returned with policemen.

"He's dead—and dead enough to spoil," declared the deputies, after their professionally brutal fashion. "An' we're going to take him."

And then a white hand plopped, palm down, upon the wet boxes. It was Peter's hand and it moved of its own strength. A moment later Peter grunted, and the deputies admitted that they might have been mistaken.

"It wasn't long Peter recalled, "before I was back on my feet. "Maybe the liquor had kept me down, and maybe it had kept me alive. But whether or no, I've not touched a drop since."

Which is all given on the word of a good sailor man.

### NEW TEST DEVELOPED FOR PLANE PROPELLERS

WASHINGTON, July 25—(UP)—An air stream, blowing 700 miles an hour, has been perfected by the Bureau of Standards for testing airplane propellers.

The experiments with the new high pressure air stream have shown that thin metal propellers, now coming into use, are more efficient at very high speeds than wooden propellers.

### COAST STATES ARE BEST FOR SCHOOLS

OLYMPIA, Wash., (UP)—Pacific coast states are spending relatively more money for educating their children than are eastern schools, and they are outstanding in efficiency, according to statistics of Dr. Frank W. Phillips of the George Washington university, chief statistician in the United States bureau of education.

Phillips has ranked Washington first in general excellence in his biennial survey. Washington ranked similarly in 1918, 1920, 1922 and 1924.

California, with the highest annual cost per child of any state, \$159.35, ranks second to Washington, according to the report. Ohio ranks third, New York fourth, New Jersey fifth and Minnesota sixth.

### PROHIBITION HELD DANGEROUS PROBLEM

BY C. F. WILLIAMSON (U. P. Staff Correspondent) LONDON, (UP)—Prohibition is the most dangerous problem America now has to confront, Sir Charles Higham, advertising and trade expert here, told the United Press on his return from his 31st trip to the United States.

"Liquor is freely sold in America and is not difficult to buy," Sir Charles declared. "It is, however, of poor quality. On my last trip I found people who had been total abstainers 25 years ago, calling their bootleggers for a regular supply."

"While the people of the United States are hindered by the prohibition law, the whole attitude of the people seems to be one of warning against interference with their right to drink."

"The American people have become a great playing nation and the quest for the 'mighty dollar' which is so often misunderstood by the foreigner, is for the sole purpose of earning that it might be spent on the better things of life."

Sir Charles declared that the United States and the Republic of Argentina are the best markets for British goods and the markets that Great Britain must exploit to survive the present economic depression.

"Great Britain can learn many lessons from the United States," he continued, "for although America has faults, just as all peoples do, she has learned the secret of success in international trade—the secret of selling. While the English manufacturer is sitting in his office groaning about 'depressed conditions,' the American is sending cables to remote parts

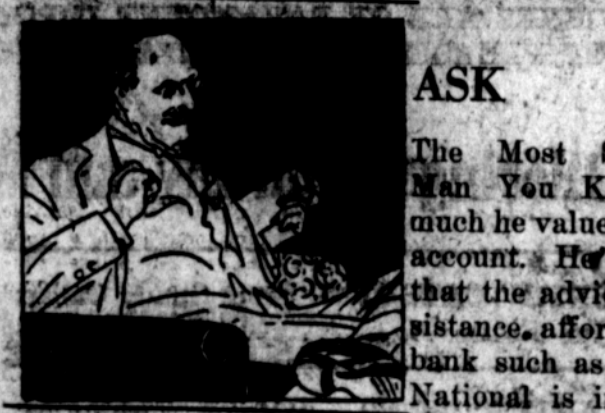

### Sets New Half-Mile Mark

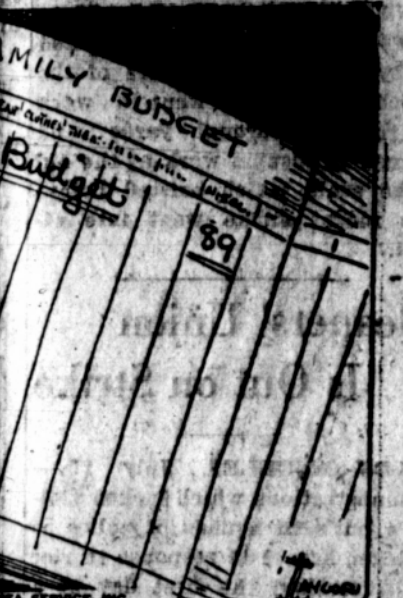

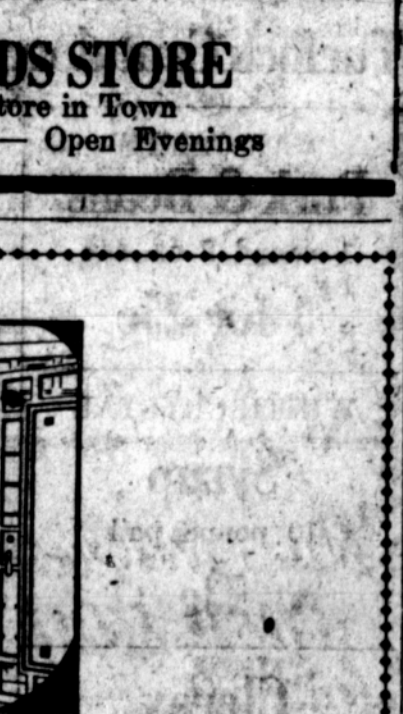
