An Interesting Missionary Meeting - The regular meeting of the Baptist Missionary Society, occurred Wednesday the twenty-third at the Baptist Church. Mrs. I. N. Smith conducted the devotionals. Mrs. Proctor who was a delegate to the Baptist State Convention was called on to give a report of the Convention, on Missions. Mrs. Proctor told this most interestingly. The subject for the meeting was American Indians. The leader Mrs. Morehouse, delegated her daughter, Miss Morehouse to give the address on this subject as she has recently been in touch with investigation along that line. Miss Morehouse opened with an interesting tale of Oregon history. She then told of her visit to the Indian School at Chemawa. (The Indian name means Happy Home). There are from six to seven hundred students there. The government appropriates \$100,000 to maintain it. This school ranks third among the Indian Institutes, of the U. S. Miss Morehouse spoke of the Indian Fairs at Yainix and the Annual Celebration at Champock. The speaker personally visited the Ancient Mounds of the Calapooia Indians. She spoke of the founding of the Baptist Church in Oregon, and mentioned the Baptist Missions maintained in California, Arizona, Montana, Nevada and Wyoming. The speaker closed with some Indian folk lore tales. In connection with this Miss Morehouse and Mrs. Morehouse sang a duet in Chinook Jargon. Other speakers were Mrs. A. L. Harvey, a pioneer resident of Ashland, who related the history of the Rogue River Indian War and her personal experiences of early days. Mrs. Ella Oxford told about Aunt Eliza, the last of the Calapooia Tribe. Mrs. Frank Bewick told of her trip to Yellowstone and her visit to the Umattila and Patute Indian tribes and of the speech of Chief Joseph. Mrs. Carson gave a talk about Atoka Academy in Oklahoma, in which she spoke most interestingly of her teaching experiences there. Mrs. Canine told of the settlement of Indians at Kenpet in the old days and Mrs. Joannette Toomey closed with the story of her visit to Carlisle Institute.

STUDEBAKER CARRIES FILMS TO NEW YORK

Bound for New York City from the Pacific Coast, a Studebaker showcased its speediest was in Ashland Sunday, performing one of the most unusual missions ever given a car. To its certain performance and unquestioned dependability has been entrusted the task of delivering to the eastern metropolis the first print of Marshall Nellan's latest production, "Diplomacy." The film was made on the west coast, and will have its world premiere at the Rivoli theatre in New York on August 32. When Director Nellan was completing his film he learned of the time made by a Studebaker which set a new transcontinental record between New York and San Francisco, making the entire run in 86 hours and 20 minutes, and beating the fastest train time ever made by 6 hours and 25 minutes. He immediately wired Geo. W. Weeks, general manager of distribution for the Famous Players-Lasky Corporation in New York, and suggested that Weeks make arrangements to have a Studebaker car deliver the first print of the film to New York for the world premiere. The car was in Ashland piloted by a representative of the Studebaker Corporation of America, who is accompanied by Luther Putnam of the exploitation department of the big film organization from the New York office. While here the car visited the sales room of the Park Garage, local Studebaker dealers. The Paramount picture "Diplomacy," which the Studebaker is carrying, is based on international intrigue, laid in Deauville, France. It involves the theft of an international treaty, and is full of breath-taking adventure. When the car arrives in New York City it will be greeted by Mayor Jimmy Walker and a group of moving picture celebrities, who are keeping a daily record of the movements of the car. Both men with the car declare they have experienced one of the most pleasant motor trips in their experience. Both are veterans in motoring, each having made several transcontinental trips in various types of cars. In spite of long, hard drives, they declare they always have a feeling of relaxation, due in a great measure to an adjustable back rest which the car has as standard equipment.
