**FIRE SITUATION IN OREGON IS BETTER**  
**Only One Serious Blaze in Burning Today, Says U. S. Forest Office**

PORTLAND, Ore., July 26.—(UP)—The Chelan and Colville national forests remained the center of serious forest fires, while the situation in Oregon is growing better today. Oregon's worst fire is raging on the holdings of the Green Mountain Logging company in Clatsop county. It was reported under control today, aided by rain Sunday. Last reports from Crater national forest are optimistic, with most of the fires burning in unimportant sections.

**PALESTINE FOR THE JEW. WHY?**

The subject of the Jews' return to Palestine and their endeavors to rebuild it and make it their home-land is one of universal interest. This remarkable movement among that ancient and interesting people is more and more engaging the attention of intelligent people. It has been studied and discussed from various angles but the most interesting phase of the subject is the one which is furnished in ancient prophecies whose significance is only now becoming clear.

At the Wimer Hall, Tuesday at 8 p. m. Mr. Toufjan of New York will speak on this subject. He has gathered together in a harmonious and understandable way the various Scripture statements regarding the return of Israel to their ancient homeland, and will show how these predictions are being fulfilled in our day. He additionally enters into a discussion of what this development will mean to the whole world of mankind, claiming that the Bible, unmistakably shows that unprecedented blessings are about to come to the peoples of earth. The regathering of Israel to their native land is but one of the many, remarkable signs of the times. Other evidences of unmistakable significance tell us that the end of the old order of things is at hand, the new order is being introduced, and the time for the fulfillment of God's ancient promise to Abraham is here. That promise reads, "In thee and thy seed shall all the nations of the earth be blessed."

The Jews' right to the land of Palestine has already been acknowledged by the greatest nations of our day. Both the Senate and the House of Representatives of the United States passed a resolution to the effect that "the United States of America favors the establishment in Palestine of a national home for the Jewish people." The British Government too has signified its purpose to aid the Jew in re-establishing themselves in Palestine.

Many items associated with the return of the Jews to Palestine are of special interest. These will be taken up in the lecture. The restoration of Israel does not mean that commercialism is to be enthroned. Quite the reverse. God's purpose intends that restored Israel with its laws and institutions shall serve as a divine pattern to other nations, which they may copy and which if followed, will result in peace and prosperity, health and life to the nations.

When God promised the land of Israel to the descendants of Abraham for an everlasting possession he meant what he said. Without question, then Palestine will in due time be fully restored to the Jews. Great strides are being made in its development and preparation for the time when millions of Jews will again find their home in the land of their fathers.

And, after all, only the Jew can make Palestine what it should. "Only the Jews," said David Lloyd George, "can redeem Palestine. The Jewish race with its genius, its resourcefulness, its tenacity... can alone perform this essential." No other nation is sufficiently interested to accomplish the work of restoring the glory of the Holy Land, but the Jew with the true patriotic fervor and religious devotion is ready to make the sacrifices that necessarily involved in the great task of rejuvenating Palestine.

**Enterprise Man Cures Sickness With Long Fast**  
ENTERPRISE, July 26.—Leonard Olsen of Lostine has just finished a 30-day experiment in fasting, undertaken seriously in the endeavor to cure a stubborn case of stomach trouble. During the long period, when he took no food whatever, he lost 35 pounds in weight and his strength ebbed, but he suffered no particular hardship and now that he has resumed in very limited quantities he sees no bad effects.

**New Power Line Is Being Built**  
BEND, Ore., July 26.—(UP) Construction of the first power line to connect the towns of Redmond and Bend was under way today. It involves a cost of approximately \$75,000. The completion of the project is expected by the latter part of August. It will connect Deschutes, Jefferson and Crook counties electrically.
