## STUDENT THINKS MARRIED WOMEN ENTITLED TO WORK

This is a question which has vexed men for a good many years. "Should married women work?" has been argued with more or less heat and has ample supporters on both sides. Miss Ruth MacCollister, a student at the Southern Oregon state normal school, evidently favors the married woman at work, who has written the following article on "The Married Woman's Job."

### THE MARRIED WOMAN'S JOB

"You are not going back to teaching," her friends exclaim. "Not now when you have three children."

"But I am," the Modern Woman replies. "Carol is six and has entered school. Jane is 12 and quite capable of taking care of Carol after school until I get home."

"They will think your husband can't or won't support you." "Let them think what they please. I am living my own life." "But how will your family manage without you?" "They will not manage without me but with me. We will manage together. I shall send out the laundry, hire a cleaning woman once or twice a week and patronize the delicatessen and bakery more extensively. I've already taught Jane to do much of the household work. She will enjoy it thoroughly if she is not under such constant supervision and is left to work things out for herself. Then I shall be at home evenings, of course, and we can talk and plan."

"Well, I must say I'm sorry for Jane." "You needn't be," laughed the Modern Woman. "Dan will help her. I think a boy ought to know almost as much as a girl about the preparation of simple meals and ordinary household tasks."

"Well, my dear, I'm sure I hope your scheme works, but I am Scotch, and I 'hate me doots.'" "Several Years Later" "You look so young," her friend exclaims. "If I didn't know you were two years older than I, I wouldn't believe it. How do you do it?"

"I feel young. I think age is more mental than physical don't you? I keep my mind busy and I am interested in so many things. My work is fascinating. I would not give it up if Tom was making twice what he is. Then I try to keep up with the children's school work. Why, I even studied trigonometry last winter so I could understand what Dan was doing. And Spanish! Jane and I are reading Don Quixote is the original and it is such fun. Dan and his father have rigged up a radio which everyone enjoys, but especially Carol. She is our musician, you know. I was so glad I could give her music lessons. She has considerable talent; they tell me."

"Oh, if only Mary could have had piano lessons. But we never could stretch John's salary for that. My boy had to quit school last week and has gone to work in a garage. John did as well as he could for him but it is time for him to help in meeting the expenses now. Do you know I feel

of California may soon become scarce, in the opinion of William F. Harrington, assistant fisheries biologist of the state fish and game commission, who points out that the valuable Pismo clam fishery of San Luis Obispo, once the leading clam beach of the state, is headed for extermination.

The clam class, year 1924, comprising those brought out in 1924, are only one-tenth as abundant as were the clams of '19. As this 1924 class will not graduate into legal size for two or three years, and then will be relatively small in number, extermination is seen unless drastic action is taken to save the clams. Activity of commercial dealers, who can market only legal sized

clams, is not blamed for the decrease by Harrington. Tourists and amateur diggers who take clams that have not reached the spawning age are responsible, he said.
