cured. He told of the hard preliminary work here in Oregon last fall and winter and of how the data finally was in suitable shape for presentation to congress in the Stanford bill. He had nothing but warm praise for Senator Stanford and other members of the Oregon delegation for their tireless work on behalf of the measure, and of their insistent fight against heavy odds at all times.

**A Just Measure**  
"One of the main reasons we won was because we had a just bill," declared the speaker. "We never misrepresented the measure in any particular and stuck to our guns even when it looked bad for the bill."

President O. F. Carson presided, praised highly the work of Mr. Gore and of the Oregon delegation in congress, and declared it was the cooperation and teamwork at all times which meant success for their efforts.

### Square Dances to Rule at Session

DES MOINES, July 27.—(UP)—Old time features of Civil War days, including square dances, horseshoe pitching and similar pastimes, are to be revived here for a week, from September 19 to 24, as a part of the 4th national encampment of the Grand Army of the Republic.

### ENGLISH RADIO FEES SHOW BIG INCREASE

LONDON, (UP)—Radio fans in England paid nearly \$5,000,000 for the privilege of listening-in last year. Revenue to the British Broadcasting Company from the collections of \$2.50 each from citizens possessing sets increased more than \$350,000 last year over the previous year. There are now 1,965,000 licensed sets in England. Nearly 300 persons were prosecuted for failing to pay the fee.
