LONG SCHOOL VACATIONS ATTACKED BY EDUCATOR

PHILADELPHIA, July 28.—(UP)—Lengthening of the vacation period, with the resultant loss of time from study, constitutes a fundamental error in the recent trend of education insofar as the student is concerned, in the opinion of Dr. Charles Curtis Harrison, former Provost of the University of Pennsylvania.

"In recent years," said Dr. Harrison, "the average age of university graduates is between 21 and 22 years. This means that the majority of them are going to work just about three years later than was the custom when I graduated, 24 years ago. At that time the academic year was divided into three terms, while the intervening vacations totaled only a little more than 11 weeks."
