### Dog's Cross Eyes Cured with Glasses

Glasses with special lenses, which were changed frequently, were fitted to a valuable Chow puppy to straighten its eyes. Several months' treatment was given and the owner is reported to have spent about \$200 for the cure.



### Which Wheel for New Tires

To obtain the longest mileage, the two best tires on a car should be placed on the rear wheels. Some drivers assert that the best tires belong on the front to minimize the danger from blowouts and the risk of losing control of the car, but this hazard is considered negligible, and the real fault usually lies in the driver losing his head. The spare should replace the more worn of the rear tires at the end of several thousand miles of driving. On new cars, all tires may remain as originally placed for several thousand miles, then the front ones should be put on the rear wheels.

### Mowing Heavy Grass

When lawnmowers are crowded to cut thick and heavy growths of grass, the stationary cutting bar and supporting roller frequently "jump" or "buck," leaving unsightly patches of long grass here and there about the lawn. By attaching the spring-and-roller device shown in the drawing, this trouble is readily overcome. The main leaf from a discarded wagon-ear spring is bolted to the underside of the mower handle so that the two small wood disks, or wheels, mounted on the free end of the spring, will rest upon the wood roller of the mower when the handle is pressed down. In ordinary use, the spring plays no part, but when the mower is driven into rank grass, the handle may be held low enough to bring the rollers in contact, thus holding the rest part of the mower against "bucking."

### Find Ancient Chinese Drug Good for Colds

Used by the Chinese for more than 5,000 years as a treatment for asthma, ephedrine has been found good for colds, as an anesthetic and for raising the blood pressure or arresting bleeding in cases of hemorrhage. These uses are partial results of research conducted with the substance at the university of Wisconsin. Experiments are under way to determine if the drug is beneficial in treating hay fever. According to Dr. Ko-Kuei Chen, scientist at the university, ephedrine is considered superior to adrenalin in raising the blood pressure as its effects last over a longer period. The ancient Chinese doctors found that the substance caused muscles around the air passages in the lungs to relax, thus promoting easier breathing. The same experience has been met with in tests conducted with the drug at large clinics in Pennsylvania and Minnesota.

### Cherokee Indians gave their children a concoction made from burs to strengthen their memory, under the impression that as a bur will stick to anything, a man lined with burs will be able to hold all useful information.

### Rubber Stamp Attached to Thumb

In canning factories, cold-storage plants and other places, where numerical or other identification stamps are used, the thumb stamp shown in the drawing will be found very useful. The small round rubber stamps are removed from the original wooden handles and are mounted on thimbles, the ends of which have been flattened for this purpose. The stamps are fastened with glue or rubber cement. The operator then provides himself with a pad, strapped to the hand as shown, for inking the stamps. This is made from a cross section of an old inner tube with the ink pad glued to it. With a little practice he can ink and stamp much more rapidly than in the usual manner, and both hands are practically free to move or turn boxes and crates.

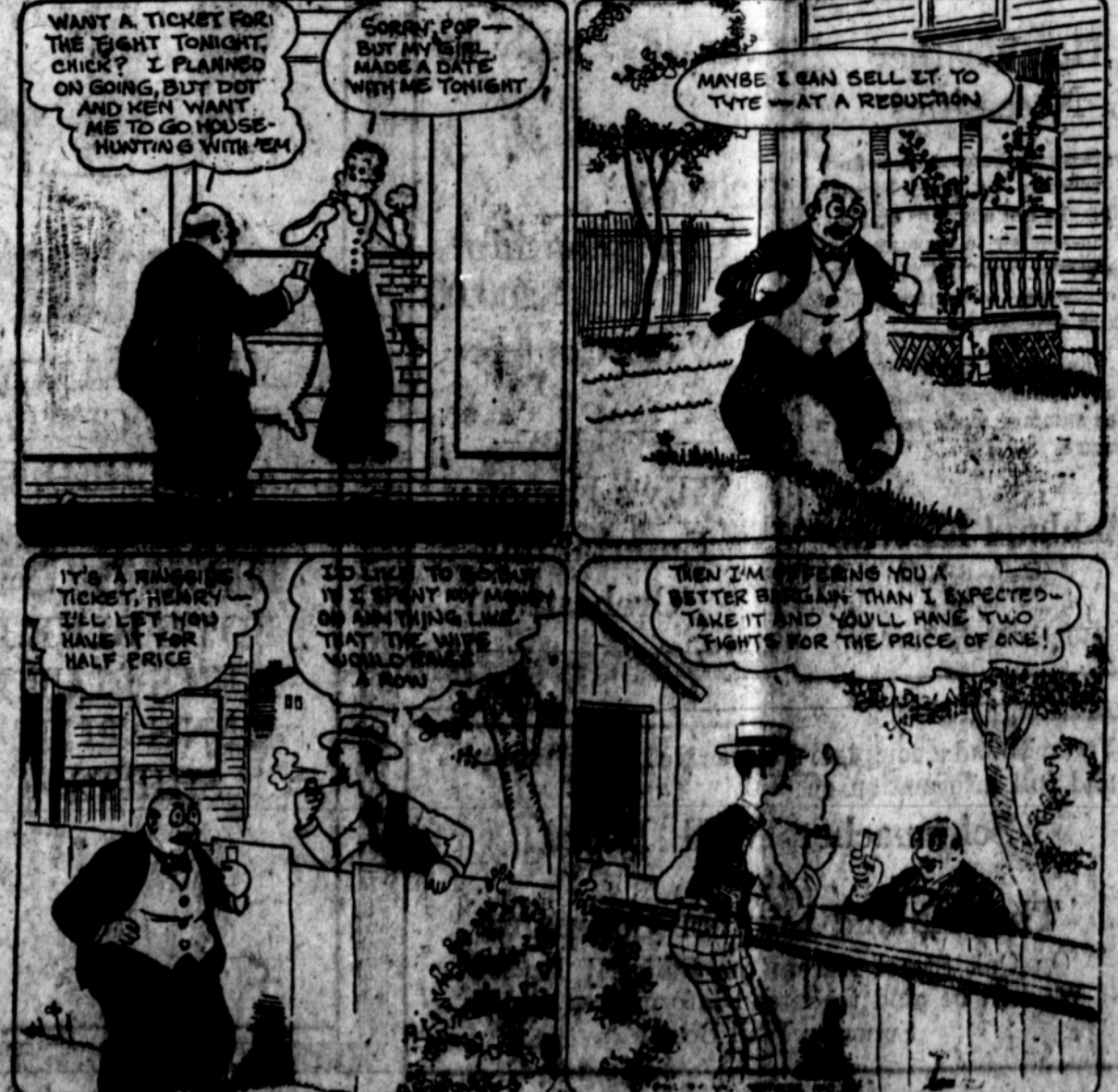
### Waxes Not Harmful to Eyes

If you can read, write or do other work without tiring your eyes, there is no harm in going to the movies, specialists in eye diseases say. Tests with 150 persons showed that those who suffered eye fatigue after watching a motion-picture film, also became tired when doing other work that affected the vision, so that the movies were not responsible for the trouble.

### Sawdust Soaked in Arsenic to Kill Mosquitoes

Sawdust immersed in a weak solution of water and arsenic and scattered on breeding places from airplanes, is being tried by the United States marine corps as a means of combating the mosquito. The method is said not to be injurious to fish, birds or persons, because the poison is diluted.
