BOY MAYOR PROVES FINANCIAL WIZARD

WASHBURN, Wis., July 30.—(UP)—Paul Ungrodt, "Kid Mayor" of this little city of 3700 having completed his first term has been returned to office by an almost unanimous vote of confidence. Ungrodt who was only 23 when first elected mayor in the spring of 1934 by a two to one vote over a man thrice his age, has so conducted municipal affairs that his administration will go into local history as the most remarkable the city has every experienced.

Graduating from Lawrence College, Appleton, Wis., in 1923, he returned to Washburn and went into his father's hardware store as joint manager. Ten months later he was swept into office on an overwhelming tide of public approval. The city's troubles were mostly of a financial nature and he went after them with youthful enthusiasm.

He and his councilmen served without salary and all expenses were cut to an absolute minimum. To raise necessary funds he boogied the tax rate to 7.15 percent, the highest rate in the state. Tax collections were increased \$12,000 and the city began to find its feet. The second year the rate was dropped to 5.15 percent but it was still the highest in the state.

By the use of unique advertising methods the Boy Mayor decreased delinquency 10 percent; and expedited the most optimistic estimate of tax collections by \$5,000. Through such stringent measures the city's total debt of almost \$100,000 was reduced about \$25,000 in two years. The city is now on a firm financial footing for the first time since pre-war days. In addition to his success as mayor, Ungrodt has been singularly successful in operating his

father's hardware store. By progressive advertising and aggressive salesmanship he has brought about a great increase in sales volume. In 1934, when hardware merchants throughout the Northwest were suffering an average decrease in sales volume of 5 percent, the Ungrodt store experienced a 25 percent increase as well as showing the first net profit since the boom days of the war.

The Boy Mayor's remarkable success has gained such wide attention that he has been mentioned as a possible candidate for congress from this district but his next step will probably be into the state assembly.

Ungrodt believes implicitly in the introduction of business methods into the affairs of government. He says: "The voters control the situation. They can elect men of business ability with an unselfish interest in the duties connected with the officers of government. Given the right

personnel, any governmental body can adopt itself to business methods."
