SUIT IN EQUITY TO FORECLOSE MORTGAGE

EARLY DAY RELICS LOCATED IN PRISON

SAN QUENTIN, Ca., July 31.—(UP)—Mute testimony of an unassuming "forty-niner" and relics of the famous roaring forties were revealed at San Quentin prison recently when a prison board clerk, delving into old records, discovered a rusty envelope. It was marked with the name of Charles Pratt, highwayman of El Dorado, who died "No. 7055."

Pratt, long feared by Wells-Fargo riders and traveling miners, six times entered the gates of this old prison. In 1876 he was sentenced for the last time. He died in prison seven years later still incorrigible.

The envelope containing Pratt's last possessions, is split with age and some of its contents are visible. Disposition of it troubles prison authorities.

In the yellowed container is a thick wad of papers, creased and stiff with age. It bears zigzag marks and is believed to be a location map of some mine perhaps worth a fortune now. The bottom of the envelope is heavy and may contain old minted \$20 gold pieces. A lump indicated where a small nugget may repose.

Unless some relative should appear envelope will remain in the state's possession.

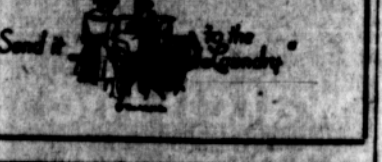

CHICAGO, July 31.—(UP)—To pick the star youngster from that vast horde of minor league ball players who cavort in the various circuits over the country is a real job.

So when the time came for Kamm to go back in the game, there was nothing to do but move Hunnefield to short.



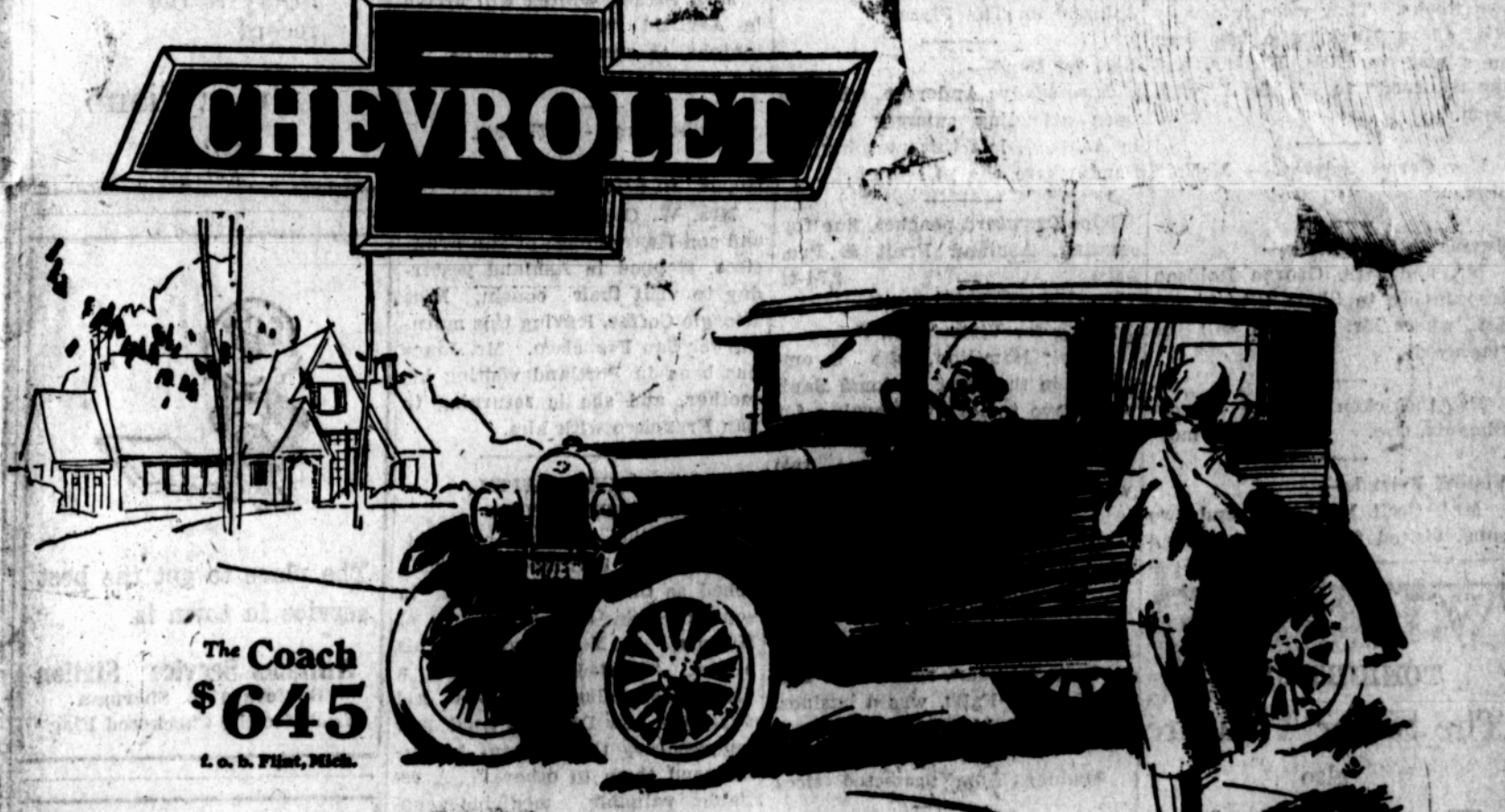
