Bill On Ballot

SALEM, Ore., July 31. — (UP) — The hydro-electric bill was assured a place on the November ballot when the supreme court yesterday held that 12,766 verified signatures is all that was needed on the initiative petition which was filed. Secretary of State Sam A. Koser refused to give the bill a ballot title on the ground that 14,500 signatures were necessary. The petition filed with the secretary of state contained 13,773 signatures.

Says Stuttering Can Be Stopped

BERKELEY, Cal., July 31. — Stuttering arises from a defect in personality. It is not a disease nor a bad habit, curable by endogenous medication of such Mother Goose formulas as "Peter Piper picked a peck of pickled peppers," etc.

This is the belief of Miss Pauline Camp, psychologist and authority on child guidance at the University of California summer session here.

"Stuttering arises from the inability of a child to face certain situations," Miss Camp opined. "It is a neurosis which should be given individual treatment by a psychologist."

Miss Camp believes that many stuttering children inherit stuttering from irritable or over-anxious mothers, but that it can be cured.
