#### Forestry Survey Is Made Public

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Publication of a Forestry Legislative Survey by states was announced today by the American Tree Association. This follows the suggestion adopted at the World Forestry Congress in Rome that collection of international forestry statistics be begun. The Survey is for free distribution to those interested. There are now nine states, says the Survey, with effective laws on their statute books intended to favor and encourage the practice of forestry, chiefly through the exemption of taxation on young growing stands of timber or replanted lands. Most of the recent laws enacted to relieve taxation have adopted the yield tax principle, the Survey points out. During the 1926 sessions of the Legislature greatly improved taxation laws with a yield tax provision embodied in them were enacted in New York, Mississippi, and Michigan. Forty-one states now have forestry departments or corresponding agencies. The states which do not maintain forestry officials or departments that do not handle forestry affairs, are: Arizona, Arkansas, Florida, New Mexico, Nevada, Utah and South Carolina. Thirty-two states in cooperation with the United States Forest Service now maintain forest fire patrol systems. The most important piece of Federal forestry legislation within the past few years is the

Clarke-McNary Forestry Act, according to the Survey. The act allows Federal appropriation of \$2,500,000 annually in this cooperative work. More than \$6,000,000 has been appropriated for the year 1926 to be used by the Federal Government in cooperation with states for adequate fire protection. The Survey prints the Clarke-McNary law in full, gives a list of state forestry officials and reviews briefly the legislative situation in every state.
