EUGENE, ORE.—The spirit of the old West will again be revived when the "Trail to Rail" celebration, marking the completion of the Southern Pacific's new Cascade Line between San Francisco and Portland via Klamath Falls and Eugene, will be staged here August 19 and 20. State, county and city officials together with representatives of the Southern Pacific and the Interstate Commerce Commission will participate in the two-day celebration which is expected to become the most elaborate affair ever produced in Oregon. A pageant "Klatawa," depicting the evolution of travel from the early days of the Indians to the present time, has been written for

Invitations have been extended by the celebration committee to members of Commerce and other civic, commercial and industrial organizations of the state to participate in the celebration. However, special trains from the north and south will be operated over the new line during the celebration. The new line opens up a vast area of undeveloped timber and farming land. It will lessen the distance between San Francisco and Portland by 217 miles as well as reduce curves and grades. Special reduced round trip excursion from all points on its lines to Oregon to Eugene will be put into effect by the Southern Pacific for the celebration.
